Vern Marshall in France—Vern J. Marshall, Portland boy, who went to the Mexican border with the Third Oregon regiment and remained with that organization until it was mustered in for service in France, has written that he

has arrived safely "Somewhere Over There." Marshall was an employe of the Northwest Steel company before enlisting. His father is F. J. Marshall of 6500 First avenue, Astoria. "We spent Christmas at sea," writes the son. "We receive fine treatment here, plenty to eat and plenty of comfort. The Tommies were certainly glad to see us."

Lieutenant Bean in Hospital—Lieutenant Harold C. Bean son of United States Judge Bean of Portland, is in a hospital at Fort McHenry, Md., recovering from an illness with which he was stricken while on duty in the medical corps of the army in France. Lieutenant Bean is a graduate of the University of Oregon and of the medical department of the Johns Hopkins university, class of 1915.

Big Kolden Has Enlisted—Sig Kolden, boarder in business in the city, has enlisted in the army. Kolden is now in the aviation service and was last heard from at Fort Sam Houston, overland to his former employer, the Overland Pacific company. Albany, Or., Feb. 1.—Plans are reported under way for the building of a road from Detroit to Breitenbush Hot Springs, a health resort in the Cascade mountains 14 miles from the railroad, 50 miles east of this city. Local and Salem capital is said to be cooperating in building the road, which will accommodate automobiles. The Breitenbush hot spring and mud baths are said to be the equal of any in the world, and last summer several people came from New York to spend their vacation there. Dr. Mark Skiff of Salem owns the grounds on which the resort is located.

Varney V. Shumaker was manager of the Lyceum department of the Ellison-White Chautauqua system of Portland. PORTLAND MAN IS KILLED IN WRECK

V. V. Shumaker, Lecturer, Victim of Crossing Collision at Sedro-Woolley, Wash.

Bellingham, Wash., Feb. 1.—(U. S. S.)—Slippery rails are declared by trainmen today to have been responsible for the wrecking last night of a Great Northern passenger coach by a Northern Pacific freight train at Sedro-Woolley, Wash. Six persons in the coach were killed and 16 others were injured, some of whom probably will die.

The dead are: CHARLES E. PATTON, Seattle lumberman; V. V. SHUMAKER, Portland, lecturer; HENRY THOMPSON, Birdsview, Wash., Skagit county commissioner; MELVIN BEST, Kent, Wash. G. O. TILLBORN, Seattle. Unidentified man.

The seriously injured are: George Corey, Northern Pacific brakeman; Robert Nestoy, vice president Nestoy Timber company, Bellingham; J. E. Powell, merchant, Sedro-Woolley; E. J. Harrigan, Northern Pacific conductor, Bellingham; B. H. Slater; J. J. Robinson, salesman, Black Manufacturing company, Seattle; M. J. Justice, laborer; D. P. Pierce, manager Portland Superior Cement company, Concrete, Wash., and his wife and baby; Mrs. Walter Jones; A. H. Rayberger, Sedro-Woolley; Mrs. P. D. Cooper, Hamilton, Wash.; Robert N. Miller, Bellingham; Joseph Cosamos; Herbert W. Smith, Deming, Wash.

Great Northern passenger train No. 26 was standing on a crossing when the freight train on the Northern Pacific crashed into the coach and carried it several hundred yards on the pilot of the engine. Martin Hall, engineer on the freight locomotive, declared today he applied his emergency brakes, set the engine in reverse and jumped when he saw the crash coming. He said his train was traveling about 15 miles an hour but because of the grade and slippery rails the brakes had little effect in slackening the speed of the heavy train. Almost every passenger in the coach was injured.

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Exams for Operators and Police Applications for the municipal civil service examination for telephone operator must be filed in the office of the civil service board in the city hall, not later than Saturday noon. Men who have secured application blanks for the purpose of entering the class of men who will be examined for the police force should return the blanks by Monday, February 4. The class will probably number about 200 men.

Patten Prominent Lumber Man Seattle, Feb. 1.—(U. N. S.)—Lumbermen of the Northwest were shocked today when they learned of the death of Charles E. Patten, president of the Atlas Lumber company of this city, in a wreck on the Great Northern last night at Sedro-Woolley. Patten was one of the best known men in the lumber business of the west and always took an active part in activities of the industry.

Patten was born in Lesueur, Minn., in 1855, and came to Seattle in 1889. He was prominent in the organization of the Puget Sound Lumber Manufacturers' association, which now is the West Coast Lumbermen's association. In addition to his lumber business he was interested in mining properties in Oregon and was a director of the National Bank of Commerce of this city. He is survived by a widow and two step-daughters.
