## Huge Audience Hears Karle Sing

### Apollo Club Concert at Auditorium Will Remain Long in Memory of Those Present.

A HUGE audience greeted the Apollo club and Theo Karle, tenor, in the Auditorium, Tuesday evening, and enjoyed the musical treat of a well selected program rendered by conscientious artists.

Bits of the concert that will stay longer than others in the memory of the audience were the encore numbers of Mr. Karle, a Russian folk song by the chorus and a couple of choruses with solos by the tenor.

"The Prince of the Rose," by Mr. Karle and the chorus, was beautiful in subdued harmony. Accompanying the solo work of Mr. Karle in this song the chorus resembled a mighty pipe organ under the fingers of a master.

"Farewell to Minka," a Russian folk song, was ably given by the chorus, which brought out the faint trace of the oriental shades of Russian music.

Mr. Karle pleased more with his encore numbers than with those on the program. After he sang four French and Italian songs he responded to the encore with "In a Little Dutch Garden." With this he took his audience by storm and came back with a couple of negro lullabies.

He puts an appeal in his songs of the lighter variety, but fails to replace that quality with command in rendering the heavier compositions, leaving his climax disappointing.

The rendition of "Aprì La tua Finestra," by Mascagni, by Mr. Karle, was unusual in its accompaniment, bringing in a change of key every few measures.

Opening the concert, the chorus sang "The Star Spangled Banner" and closed it with "America," joined by the audience in a full diapason of tone that, figuratively, rocked the Auditorium.

The accompanying artists were Edgar E. Courson and William McCulloch, pianos, and Ralph W. Hoyt, pipe organ.

**Moroseo Triumph Coming**

Oliver Moroseo's never-dying dramatic triumph, "The Bird of Paradise," begins a three days' engagement at the Heilig theatre, Broadway at Taylor, Thursday, with a matinee Saturday. This marks the fifth visit of this Hawaiian play to Portland. "The Bird of Paradise," Richard Walton Tully, the author, presents a picture, both mournful and alluring, of a vanished regime in a lovely land. The scene is Hawaii and the tale of romance, intrigue and superstition unfolded with pictorial glamour and music hinges upon those machinations of American players and merchants whereby the ancient Kingdom of Hawaii became a possession of the United States. The period, therefore, is about 40 years ago. The scenes are all superbly mounted, nothing quite like it ever having been seen on the stage. The cast this season is said to be a most competent one and includes such players as Marion Hutchins as Luana, Forrest Stanley as Dr. Wilson, John Harrington as the beach comber, Robert Forrest as Diana, James Nelson, Rose Watson, Jack Ellis, Maude Farrington, James K. Applebee, Maud Melville, A. Francis Lens and James Glasgow, together with the Hawaiian singers, dancers and musicians who are credited with making their music popular in this country.

## Bushman's Wife Files Suit for Separation

### Mrs. Josephine Bushman Mentions "Certain Woman Member of His Company."

BALTIMORE, Feb. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Francis A. Bushman, the movie star, Tuesday afternoon was sued for a partial divorce by his wife, Josephine F. Bushman, in the circuit court at Towson, Md. The bill stated that Bushman is now living in New York with a certain woman member of his company, whom he has also at times brought to their Green Springs Valley home near here. Judge McLane signed an order requiring Bushman to pay his wife \$200 weekly for her support and that of her five children, and also granted \$5000 for counsel fees, pending final disposition of the suit. The bill states that Bushman's income is between \$60,000 and \$70,000 annually.

## Draws Sign With Tully to Play In Comedy

### Play Will Be by John Hunter Booth, Author of "The Masqueraders."

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Richard Walton Tully announced Tuesday that he had signed a contract with Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Drew whereby these popular artists will appear upon the legitimate stage under his managerial direction. It is doubtful if any other artists are better known or more beloved than the Drews, whose motion picture comedies have achieved a sensational success all over the world.

Tully plans to star the Drews in a new comedy by John Hunter Booth, author of "The Masqueraders," rehearsals of which will start immediately, the out-of-town premiere being set for the middle of March.
