Washington, Feb. 7. — (I. N. S.) — Representatives of 30 of the largest egg and poultry and shipping interests conferred with Food Administrator Hoover upon plans which the latter has projected to regulate that industry during the remaining season. Hoover is seeking their cooperation in framing such regulations as will insure proper distribution and to curtail unnecessary handling expenses.

Extinction Menaces Shad and Lobsters

St. John, N. B., Feb. 7.—That shad and lobsters will be extinct within a few years if measures are not taken to protect them, was the feature of addresses at the final session of the international fisheries commissions here today. It was estimated that a closed period of three or four years be enforced to protect lobsters and shad. The committee will meet again on April 24 in Seattle, Wash.

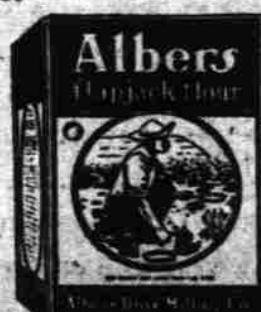

THE Junior Red Cross is growing like a wildfire. It has captured the fancies of youngsters throughout Oregon. Especially in the counties of Multnomah, Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington, Tillamook and Columbia has the work taken hold.

Pupils of the manual training departments have seized avidly on the opportunity to make the great packing cases that carry the work of the Portland chapter in surgical dressings, hospital garments and knitted goods to France, while girls are making infants' layettes for babies in France and Belgium, gun wipers, hospital garments, etc.

Mrs. J. C. Elliott King is chairman of the Portland chapter school committee and with supervising the work, distributing buttons, addressing meetings, answering letters, etc., the campaign keeps her and her co-workers energetically on the run.

The first district school to report itself 100 per cent Red Cross is district 47, Washington county, Laurel Ridge school, Sherwood, Or. Miss Frances Sharp is teacher.

A window display of the work already accomplished in the brief life of their existence by the Junior Red Crossers will be made in the windows of Moler & Frank company, February 12 to 22, under the superintendence of Miss Grace Gillette, while Miss Esther West will make posters.
