

OREGON WILL GO OVER TOP AGAIN IN LIBERTY LOAN

Portland and All Rest of State in Accord That It Will Raise Huge Amount Allotted.

DETERMINATION MANIFESTED

People Grimly Face Task With No Thought Whatever That Failure Is Possibility.

The spirit of "Oregon over the top" has swept everything before it in state preparation for the Third Liberty Loan drive. In record time, state, county and community organizations have been accomplished by the pushing determination of campaign leaders. With April 15 as the probable date to begin what is expected to be a \$50,000,000 drive in the lives of Oregonians, the state and county committees will set themselves to a straightaway that every detail of the campaign will be attended to within the intervening seven weeks.

A telegraphic review of Third Liberty loan forces was conducted Saturday by Edward Cookington, general chairman. Every reply from every state central committee man rang with optimism.

Conferees to Be Held

Each state central committee man is chairman of the Liberty Loan campaign organization in the county in which he lives. Between February 25 and March 10, conferences will be held in each county drawing attendance of committee men from every community.

The spirit which has been manifested in every section of the state prompts me to say that while realizing the tremendous task to be performed, double our last quota, I am confident of the successful accomplishment of whatever the government expects of Oregon in this drive—the Third Liberty Loan.

Smile Is Imperative

"The fortunes of war," he said, "have brought Oregon to the point where supreme sacrifice and service are imperative. To invest until it hurts, but less than that, is to slacken in the government camp or to do less than our best in this hour of terrible trial."

Blaine Hallack, assistant executive manager, suggested that hard work now will assure celebration of victory after the drive. "No good general celebrates a victory until the sun has set upon the last day of battle," he said, "but we at headquarters cannot refrain from giving some expression to our feeling of confidence because of the splendid spirit of optimism and cooperation which characterizes the Third Liberty Loan organization. If energy and determination will accomplish results, Oregon's quota is already assured."

garian king shows an inclination to offer more acceptable terms to Serbia and Rumania, Bulgaria's chief enemies, than those previously offered.

Bulgaria today would be content with a peace which established the status quo at the beginning of the second Balkan war, despite the fact that she holds much more territory than she then claimed.

Amsterdam, Feb. 9.—(U. P.)—That Foreign Minister Leon Trotsky has been confronted with an ultimatum requiring full recognition of the German demands of December 27 is the belief expressed in the Vorwärts, received here today from Berlin. Failure to accept the German terms will result in resumption of war against Russia, according to the paper.

"If the peace negotiations are wrecked the German people will inquire thoroughly into the question who is to blame," the Socialist organ added significantly.

Full endorsement of the annexation stand of the pan-Germans was contained in the Nord-Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. It declared that no Bolshevik statements, nor further speeches can shake the central powers in their firm resolve not to agree to evacuation of Russia's western territory.

Today is Armenian Sunday, and in all of the churches the morning collection will go to the Armenian sufferers, and reports of the past week will be received at the headquarters in Hotel Portland Monday morning. At several of the shipyards the men receive their pay checks on Friday and Saturday, and hence had no ready money when called upon by the workers; but they were asked to return Monday, when they would receive liberal contributions.

At noon the workers, headed by General Wells Gilbert and led by the police band, paraded the streets, met in front of the buoy in the postoffice and moved it along to the \$57,000 mark.

Huns Make Known Troops' Position

Laidon, Feb. 9.—(U. P.)—Definite location of the American expeditionary forces in France was left to the Germans themselves.

A brief official announcement by the Berlin foreign office today declared that American prisoners were taken at Xivray. This is a small French town, located about eight miles east and a bit south of St. Mihiel and only 75 miles from the nearest point of German territory.

Hitherto, the sector held by the Americans was characterized by United States officers vaguely as "northwest Toul." This might have meant either that portion of the allied lines running from St. Mihiel east to Pont a Mousson or that part of the line that sweeps at St. Mihiel and runs northward toward Verdun. The German statement, however, definitely fixes the American sector as east of St. Mihiel—part of it at least.

tical ones a chance to show what they can do, and will save the eventual busting of first class material that needs a little seasoning before getting the more responsible positions.

The school has really been remarkably well conducted and too much credit cannot be given to the higher French, and United States officers who organized it, especially the French.

"From the American end, the idea seems to have been, accumulate as much knowledge as is possible for all, and then get some kind of a line on what type of work each man is best fitted for, liaison officers, officers for the lines of communication, battery command and junior battery officers, specialists in wireless and telephone and topographers, etc. Mistakes, of course, will be made,

but at least they will get a general line on us and when headquarters of the particular unit you are with wants something or some one, they will at least have something to go on. It won't be hit or miss entirely.
