

O. G. JOHANNESSEN WINS DECISION ON APPEAL OF ACTION

Charge of Disorderly Conduct Is Not Substantiated, Is Decision of Judge Campbell.

O. G. Johannesen, arrested New Year's eve by the police at the Arlon hall and charged with disorderly conduct for having refused admission to Red Cross solicitors and convicted in the municipal court, was dismissed this morning by Circuit Judge Campbell, before whom the case was heard on appeal.

The testimony showed that four girls dressed as Red Cross nurses applied for admission to the hall, where a dance was in progress. It was their intention, so they announced, to solicit membership for the Red Cross in the drive then on. They were refused admission, although they said they offered to pay the admittance fee. They went to the police station and asked if they had the right to enter.

Police Officer Bender was detailed to accompany them to the hall. Johannesen, so Bender testified, refused to admit them on the ground that it was a private dance.

Johannesen said further, so the officer testified, that he (Johannesen) had exposed the Red Cross nurses and that he would expose them again. The defendant couched his refusal in a loud and offensive voice, Bender testified.

In dismissing the charge against Johannesen, Judge Campbell said that, no matter how reprehensible the defendant's actions as a loyal American citizen might have been, he was not on trial for disorderly conduct, but for disorderly conduct. No testimony had been introduced, the judge said, showing disorderly conduct and therefore he was obliged to dismiss the charge. In his opinion, a person acting in Johannesen's capacity as manager of the hall, had a right to exclude people from the hall.

Johannesen was fined \$25 in the municipal court.

STATE WITNESS RETURNS

Bill Patterson, Chief Witness in Criminal Prosecution, Held in Jail. Bill Patterson, chief witness for the state in the trial of Frank Gaudin, who was reported to have gone from the country and left the prosecution in the lurch, returned unexpectedly Tuesday and is now held in the county jail to prevent further mysterious disappearance.

Patterson was janitor at the Cadillac hotel at the time of the alleged murder of Lucy Carter, December 22, last. Frank Gaudin and another Italian were said by the prosecution to have been in a room with her. Her body was found subsequently on the sidewalk in the street below, the supposition being that the men had thrown her from the window. Gaudin is charged with the crime. Patterson was expected to testify that he heard the trio quarreling in the room and heard the sound of blows. The trial of Gaudin was postponed after the disappearance of Patterson, who was said to have joined the Canadian army. He vouchsafed no explanation of his absence except that he was afraid he would be killed by the Italians should he remain to testify against Gaudin.

The trial will be resumed shortly, according to a statement of Deputy District Attorney Collier who is handling the case for the state.

COMMISSION IS BASIS OF SUIT

Joseph C. Gibson Sues Charles Hilton for \$4500 as Result of Deal.

Joseph C. Gibson filed suit in the circuit court this morning against Charles Hilton, demanding \$4500 as commission on a real estate transaction. Gibson alleges that Hilton, who is the owner of a stock ranch at Wheeler, agreed with him to pay a 5 per cent commission should he find a customer for the place. Gibson alleges that Hilton, when a customer was found, would not pay him the commission agreed upon.

Humason and Orlando Humason, surviving husband and son. The estate was stated to be worth \$50,000, composed of notes, mortgages and other securities. The next of kin are E. F. Humason, Allen, Helena, Orlando, John F. and Harry Humason, Mrs. W. P. Tufts of Davis, Cal., and Mrs. James Harrington of Spokane.

JOHN R. HUGHES INDICTED

Former Portland Attorney Charged With Swindling B. P. John.

John R. Hughes, a former Portland attorney, was indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury Tuesday afternoon on a charge of having swindled B. P. John of the Doernbecher Furniture company out of \$1500 on a spurious note and mortgage. He is alleged to have forged the name of Mrs. Caroline L. Astell of Seattle to this and other notes and mortgages.

Others he is alleged to have defrauded include R. R. Hanson, \$500;

Laura E. Jones, \$500, and W. A. Fishburn, \$500. The alleged forgeries came to light when Mrs. Astell's attorney from Seattle was in town looking over the records in another matter. He discovered numerous mortgages against his client's property, which he knew she had not signed.

All efforts to locate Hughes so far have been futile. The only trace obtained, said Deputy District Attorney Pierce, was an inquiry from the war department at Washington, which stated that Hughes was seeking government employment and had made doubtful representations.

He is now thought to be "somewhere in France," said Mr. Pierce.

Deserted After 27 Years

Deserted after 27 years of married life, Effie F. Dougherty began suit for divorce against Charles E. Dougherty Tuesday. They have five children, one of them a minor. She asks for the custody of the minor child and certain household furniture. They were married in Phillips county, Kansas, in 1891.

Yvonne M. Mundy asks for a divorce from Harry O. Mundy, alleging numerous acts of cruelty. They were married May 7 last.

Stanley Before Grand Jury

Dean C. Stanley, arrested on a statutory charge preferred by the rescue board of the Salvation Army, was taken before the grand jury this morning without preliminary hearing. On recommendation of Deputy District Attorney Dempsey, Stanley's bail, which had been fixed previously at \$2000, was raised to \$4000 by District Judge Bell.

John Carlson Arrested

John Carlson, a logger who represented the Hoot River, was arrested late Tuesday afternoon at a department store by Deputy Sheriff Christofferson. Carlson, according to the officer, was attempting to pass a worthless check for \$100.

BOY SCOUTS, GUESTS AT LUNCHEON, SHOW RESULT OF TRAINING

Signal Work Wins \$75 From Dozen Spruce Men Lunching in Grill.

Thrill Stamp and War Savings Stamp sales in the Portland public schools for the week ending February 22 amounted to \$2974.64, making total sales in the city schools to date, \$14,020.29. Though sales at Washington high school for the week were only \$45.75, that school leads in sales to date with a total of \$2236.70. There are 55 teachers at Washington high.

For the week just reported Couch school headed the sellers with a total of \$281.77, with 23 teachers. Jefferson high school, with 40 teachers, was next with sales amounting to \$232.01, and Montavilla, 17 teachers, with sales of \$241.23, and Glencoe, 11 teachers, \$220.30, were the next schools in line.

Organization Is Progressing.

All but three schools are now organized for the W. S. S. campaign and these three will soon be in line. Twenty Scouts were guests at the campaign luncheon Tuesday and won the hearts of the men by their manly appearance and cleverness in horse and rider contests, in drumming and in signaling. Three boys, Orvil Boyle, Kirk Dunbar and Bob Hawkins, at one end of the grill at Hotel Portland, signalled to three boys at the opposite end—John Boy, Bill Turner and Nelson Page—and immediately the message was announced: "Will the spruce men give?" A group of a dozen spruce men, lunching in the grill, caught the spirit and intent of the signal and in unison cried: "Sure." The Scouts are organized among these men more than \$75 in cash and pledges.

C. C. Colt, general of the drive, urged the men to see every one of their prospects. Short talks to instruct and encourage the workers for further effort were made by the campaign managers, Horace Mecklen and Charles F. Berg. James E. Brockway, Scout executive of Oregon, said this morning in discussing the value of Boy Scouts:

"State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker says the Scout game-warden gave him more assistance in administering the state game laws than all of his deputies, and that they are actually responsible for a \$20,000 saving to the state by their good work. A survey of the juvenile court records of the entire nation does not reveal a single instance of a first or second class Scout ever having been brought before the juvenile court. There are in this country 300,000 Boy Scouts. These are some of the things that are inspiring the 75 prominent Portland men to give their time and energy to raising a \$30,000 three-year maintenance fund, \$10,000 to be paid this year, that the Boy Scout movement may so enlarge its activities and usefulness as to include the 15,000 Portland boys of Scout age."

Changes Are Made In Enlistment Orders

Registrants may now be inducted into the Coast Artillery Corps at Fort McDowell, California, according to instructions issued to the local divisional boards by the adjutant general's office.

The order for induction of men for the engineering corps at Vancouver barracks has been canceled until further orders.

The provost marshal general's office at Washington, D. C., has notified the adjutant general's office that it is not intended that compensation should be claimed by board members who can in fairness to themselves and families serve without it. The officers of the different boards are cautioned by the adjutant general's office to keep the cost in their respective jurisdictions down to the minimum, consistent with efficiency.

CITY WILL REGULATE ALL SOLICITATION FOR FUNDS IN THE FUTURE

Auditor to Pass on Applications, According to Terms of New Ordinance.

Solicitation of funds in Portland for any purpose is now regulated by the city council. An ordinance prepared by the Portland war emergency council was unanimously adopted by the city council at a meeting this morning.

T. B. Neuhausen, chairman of the coordination committee of the State Council of Defense and the Portland war emergency council, spoke in favor of the proposed ordinance.

"Portland is to be called upon to subscribe for \$25,000,000 in Liberty bonds," he said. "The success of this drive is doubtful and therefore it is essential that we conserve money and prevent the spending of funds for useless purposes."

Mayor Baker declared that a great deal of solicitation is done in Portland where none of the money goes to the object of the drive. Big drives, he said, could be regulated but the smaller ones were difficult to control.

The provisions of the ordinance adopted by the council are broad and are intended to prevent all unworthy enterprises. They authorize the city to pass upon all applications for permits to solicit money in Portland and will call upon the coordination committee, which now passes upon all large war drives, for advice. The ordinance gives the city power to appeal to the city council in the event applications are denied by the auditor.

"This ordinance is a safety valve on all solicitation in Portland," said Commissioner Biglow.

The ordinance prohibits the sale of tickets for benefit dances, raffles or bazaars conducted by churches or organizations without a permit from the city auditor.

Garbage Sale Banned

Garbage collectors in Portland will not be permitted to sell garbage with food value. The city council this morning denied such a request on recommendation of Commissioner Kellogg, in charge of the municipal incinerator.

Mary's Academy orchestra will offer a number of selections.

Front Street Shut; Shipyard Gets Room

Thoroughfare Closed From Municipal Dock North 46' Provide Space for the Willamette Iron & Steel Company.

Front street was ordered closed to general traffic from the Municipal Dock north, at a meeting of the city council today, to provide additional space to the Willamette Iron & Steel company for building ships for the government. Telegram from the Emergency Fleet corporation in Washington addressed to Mayor Baker stating that such action was necessary to provide room for three hulls in place of two now building, was read to the council. The telegram also requested the vacation of the western landing of the Lower Albina ferry and the closing of the street automatically vacates this landing.

The ordinance passed by the council requires the ship building company to erect and maintain gates at each end of the closed street and allow passage to all vehicles handling goods for firms located on the street.

The Willamette Iron & Steel company will also be required to deposit a bond for \$5000 with the city as a guarantee that all provisions of the ordinance will be carried out.

Farmers Want to Keep Plant Open

Efforts Made to Have Receiver Seelye Continue to Operate Western Condensed Milk Co.'s Factory at Newberg.

An effort is being made on the part of farmers and dairymen who are creditors of the Western Condensed Milk company plant at Newberg to keep it operating under the direction of the receiver, Mr. Seelye, a Newberg resident. The receiver was appointed recently by the Yamhill county circuit court on the representation by those who had sold milk to the condensery that checks given on a Seattle bank had been dishonored. It is declared that the company is incorporated under the laws of Oregon; it maintains its head offices and keeps its books in Seattle out of reach of the Oregon authorities.

S. C. Jackson, head of the company, is said to be in Newberg today attending to business of the company.

Fencing around storehouses where explosives are kept is required only when the inspector deems it necessary, according to W. N. Campbell, explosives inspector for Oregon. Prosecution for trespassing will be demanded of all.

Mr. Campbell has just returned from a conference of explosives inspectors of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana held at Spokane.

A license fee of 25 cents will be required of all persons who celebrate the Fourth of July with fireworks and other explosives. This was decided upon at the meeting of the inspectors, according to Mr. Campbell.

Meeting on Thursday
Mr. Campbell will call a meeting on Thursday of the advisory board of this state to talk over plans and discuss matters concerning rigid enforcement of the law. The meeting will be held at the Portland hotel, convening at 2:30 p. m.

The board now consists of four members, besides Mr. Campbell, but two more are to be appointed at this meeting. One of the members of the board will be delegated as a publicity representative.

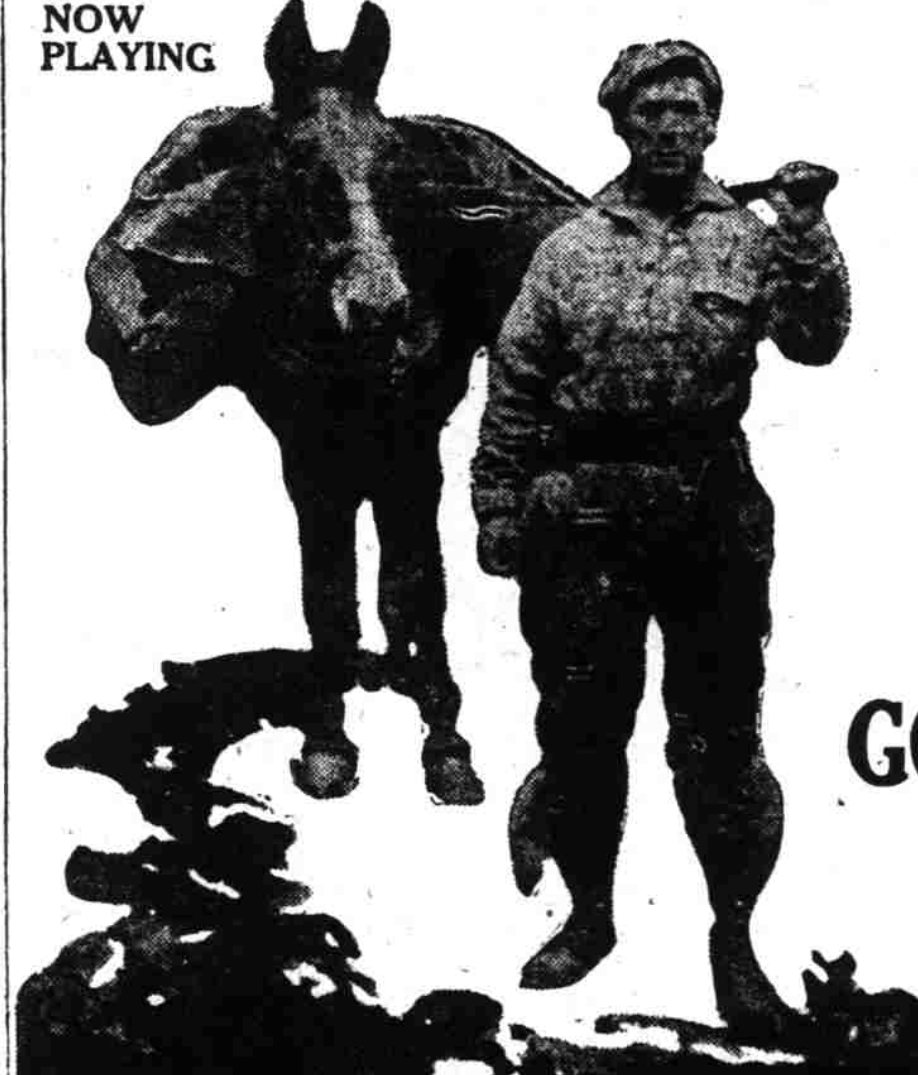
Mr. Campbell works in connection with the bureau of mines, department of interior. He says that the bureau is very anxious to start a publicity campaign,

so that the people may become thoroughly familiar with the law.

People Are Careless
"In going over the state I find that the people are careless in safeguarding explosives," said Mr. Campbell. "So many seem to think that to procure the license is all that is necessary. After securing the licenses and procuring the explosives, they are supposed to guard them, according to rules and regulations laid down by the department of interior. Explosives, under these regulations, must be kept under lock and key. Mr. Campbell makes his headquarters in the federal building at Medford, where his home is. Anyone wishing any detailed information may address him there."
