

REAL ESTATE TRADE CAUSE FOR ACTION STARTED IN COURT

G. R. Watt Charges Arthur Laidlaw With Misrepresentations in Exchange of Property.

Alleging fraudulent representations in a real estate transaction G. R. Watt began suit this morning in the circuit court against Arthur Laidlaw, demanding restoration of a house and lot in Salem, which he alleges he exchanged for a lot in Rose City Park and some orchard lands in Klickitat county, Washington.

Watt alleges that Laidlaw represented the lands in Washington to be adaptable for apricot growing and that they would produce 1500 baskets of apricots per acre per year from which a profit of 15 to 20 cents a basket could be realized. The plaintiff asserts that the land is utterly worthless for the purpose stated. He alleges also that the lot in Rose City Park was represented to be worth \$1000 and upward, whereas, he asserts, it is worth not more than the amount of a \$250 mortgage against it. Watt asks further for the sum of \$1050 in damages.

MANY SEEK SEPARATION

Five Uncongenial Unions Alleged in Suits Seeking to Obtain Decrees.

Minnie J. Beemer entered into a common law marriage with J. A. Beemer in May, 1914, so she alleges in her divorce complaint filed Wednesday afternoon. She asks the court to set aside the marriage contract because of specific acts of cruelty. He placed his knee on her chest and beat her, she says. On another occasion he persuaded her to go to California to save him, she explained, from a scandal in connection with another woman. It would be all right when she came back, he told her. When she returned, however, he refused to take her back.

She alleges further that she sold a tract of land to pay his expenses at a chiropractic school.

She now demands \$150 per month alimony, \$200 attorney fee, an automobile and other personal property.

Edward C. Henry demands a divorce from Eliza Henry on the ground of cruelty. She called him a loveless boy, he said, and would not cook sufficient nor suitable " grub" for his guests when he invited home to dinner. They were married in Portland, October 14, 1913.

Corra Cooper alleges that C. J. Cooper sneaked her clothes from the house and sold them for contraband. She says further that he has not contributed to her support for seven years, and that she has been compelled to live with her sister. They were married at The Dalles in October, 1897. They have a daughter of legal age.

John Robertson wishes a divorce from Pearl Robertson. She consorts with women of doubtful character, he alleges. Cruelty is the specific charge. They were married at Vancouver, Wash., April 23, 1917.

Dora Rouley alleges cruelty on the part of Andy Rouley. They were married also at Vancouver, in March, 1917.

HONEYMAN ESTATE IS CLOSED

Descendants Are Paid Legacies—Residue Divided Among Children.

The final account and report in the estate of Jane C. Honeyman, who died in this city December 9, 1916, was filed in the county court this morning. Legacies paid were: Etta Honeyman Lewis, a daughter, \$10,000; Mildred, Grace M., Helen A., Jane and Nancy J., granddaughters, and Ronald J., William and David E., grandsons, \$500 each.

The residue was left to Mrs. Honeyman's sons, Thomas D., Walter B. and David T. Honeyman, and to Etta Honeyman Lewis, in equal shares.

The report of the appraisers placed the value of the estate at \$76,191.85.

DEPOSITION IN FALING CASE

That Mrs. Xarifa J. Faling acted like a caged animal, believed she was incarcerated, screamed without cause and

was so feeble-minded she could not feed herself was the substance of the deposition of Mrs. Catherine Becker of Sacramento, Cal., read in County Judge Tazewell's court Wednesday.

Mrs. Becker is a beneficiary to the extent of \$2000 under the will of Mrs. Faling, which is now being contested.

"I feel sure that had Mrs. Faling been sane, she would not have left me a cent," Mrs. Becker declared.

Mrs. Becker deposed that she saw Mrs. Faling for the last time at the Multnomah hotel in 1916.

"Her mind was wholly gone then," said Mrs. Becker.

Hearing of the case was resumed before Judge Tazewell this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

G. W. Thacher Named Executor

The will of George Rae, who died on February 12, was filed for probate this morning. County Judge Tazewell issued an order appointing G. W. Thacher executor. The estate was stated in the petition to be worth \$20,000 in personal property. The devisees named in the will are Elizabeth E. Rae, widow; James Rae, a nephew of Harbor, Or.; William Rae, a brother of Toronto, Canada; and Maur Emerson, an adopted daughter, living in Paris, France.

Contract Breach Charged

Demanding \$6300 for an alleged breach of contract, the Master Equipment company has filed suit against Ballow & Wright, automobile supply dealers.

The Los Angeles concern alleges that the defendants agreed to buy 12 of a certain automobile accessory each month at an agreed price of \$125, and that the defendants refused to accept and pay for the same.

Bertha R. Thompson Seeks Separation

Alleging that her husband, John W. Thompson, a special policeman, got in a rage and broke the furniture and that he would not let her associate with her own sisters, Bertha R. Thompson began suit for a divorce this morning. She asks for \$35 per month alimony and an order from the court restraining the husband from molesting her.

MUNICIPAL MARKET IS ONLY WAY TO CUT COST OF FISH, SAYS OFFICIAL

California Director Writes Here Seeking Information Regarding Phases of City's Institution.

After five years' effort to reduce the high cost of fish, Harris Weinstein, state market director for California, has concluded that the Portland municipal fish market is the only true solution according to a letter received by Dan Kellaher, commissioner of finance.

Mr. Weinstein asks Kellaher for information on all phases of the Portland fish market. He says he has followed the progress of the market and the results obtained through newspaper reports and advices received from Portland friends. Intimation is made that a series of municipal fish markets will be established in California under joint supervision of state and city officials.

A large shipment of fresh smelt was received from Columbia river points this morning and were placed on sale at the city fish market for three pounds for 10 cents.

The heavy run of smelt has not yet reached the Columbia river, where the principal smelt fishing has been done in past years. As soon as the smelt catch increases Mr. Kellaher plans to supply Portland consumers and also distribute smelt throughout the state.

The municipal fishing schooner Joseph Pulitzer left Astoria last night after a short delay pending insurance adjustment. The ship is now insured for \$5000, the amount of liability placed against the city if the ship is lost.

Jail Sentence Suspended

A. D. Sears was fined \$50 in the municipal court this morning by Judge Rossman for violation of the prohibition law. Sears was arrested Saturday night at Broadway and Everett streets by Officer Phillips. He was also given a sentence of six months, which was suspended.

AUTO TIRE FACTORY MAY GO ELSEWHERE IF OFFERS JUSTIFY

Henry Lambert, Inventor, Says Expansion Necessary to Supply Demand for His Product.

Henry Lambert of Portland, inventor and manufacturer of a new type of automobile tire, went to Everett, Wash., Tuesday night to discuss with the citizens of that place the proposition of locating a big factory there.

According to Mr. Lambert the Everett people have tentatively offered him 11 acres of land for a site and a guarantee of \$50,000.

Mr. Lambert says that he has also received a flattering offer from Peoria, Ill., where interested capitalists have offered to raise \$100,000 in stock for use in establishing the factory.

The Lambert factory is at present located at 125 Grand avenue north, where about 20 men are employed. The new tire, according to the inventor, has already attracted wide attention, orders for shipments having come from a number of big firms in the east. Mr. Lambert said:

"To meet the increasing demand of the new tire it will be necessary for me to build a large factory. The field is practically unlimited but it is impossible for me to get out the orders with the present force and equipment. A number of outside localities are now bidding for the factory. Eastern people have made attractive propositions and the citizens of Everett, Wash., appear to be very anxious that I establish my factory there. They have taken the matter up seriously and at their request I am leaving for Everett to talk the question over with them. I need at least 10 acres of land to assure ample room for expanding the business."

"While Portland is my home town I have thus far been unable to obtain a suitable location here without paying a good, round price for it. I like Portland as a residence place but it might yet become necessary for me to go elsewhere to get what I want and what I believe the enterprise is justly entitled to as an industrial adjunct to any community. In the city of Akron, Ohio, alone, there are two tire factories which employ 48,000 men."

Forty-Four Qualify For Police Positions

Grade of 75 or More Attained by 23 Candidates; All Will Be Appointed Immediately, According to Chief.

Forty-four men have been placed on the civil service eligible list for appointment as patrolmen in the bureau of police. The civil service board reduced the passing grade from 75 per cent to 65 per cent because of the difficulty in securing men. Of the 44 who passed, 23 secured a grade of 75 or more and 21 others scored 65 or above.

Major Edwards of Canadian Army Wins Two Signal Honors

On Return From Oregon Tour Finds Russian Decoration and New Post Awaiting.

When Major Edwards of the Canadian army returned to Victoria, B. C., after his month's trip through Oregon, explaining the needs of the war, he found awaiting him two signal honors.

The first was in formal recognition with the Russian order of St. Stanislaus, with crossed swords and bow.

The second was his appointment to be governor of the military hospital at Sidney, B. C., which takes care of wounded Canadian soldiers.

The information is contained in a letter to his friend, Mrs. J. Met. Wood of Portland, who was with the Canadian party much during its stay in Oregon.

Major Edwards was in Oregon during the month of January in company with Colonel MacMillan and Captain Cook. They conducted meetings at The Auditorium and later, under auspices of the state council of defense, made a tour of the state, stimulating a real conception of what the war actually means and what the patriotic duty of America is.

"While Major Edwards is too modest to say it," Major Cook said, "the decoration conferred upon him by the Russian government, and only just now formally presented, undoubtedly was for bravery in action, and the good friends of the state, stimulating a real conception of what the war actually means and what the patriotic duty of America is."

The campaign will be carried on in a manner which is designed to reach every home in the city of Portland.

Arthur Churchill, who is in charge of the campaign, has issued the following notice, requesting full attendance at the meeting Saturday:

"A new distribution of material to every home in the city is to be made next week. The campaign will be quick, short, but very important. Every lieutenant and worker should be present for instruction. In a few instances notices are late in being sent out. If any lieutenant has not been reached by his captain, he is asked to begin at once notifying his workers. If he has not preserved a list of these, their names and addresses can be obtained at the office of O. W. Davidson, general chairman for the city, 817 Board of Trade building. If any worker sees this notice and has not been advised by his lieutenant, he is asked to call the lieutenant's attention to this notice. Everyone should bring notebooks. An overflow meeting will be provided when the Lincoln high school auditorium has been filled."

Longing for Day When They Have Officers Educated

With the American Army in France, Feb. 12.—(By Mail.)—(I. N. S.)—How eager the soldiers of a certain American division were to get into action is demonstrated in a story told by a commanding officer who was watching a brigade maneuver just before the troops hiked to the front.

Six doughboys were resting on the side of a hill after spending a hard day climbing through mud to capture "Hindenburg" and "Mackensen" trenches that existed only on maps prepared for that particular problem. They had done the same thing many times before.

"Well, boys," drawled one lanky Southerner, "we're all anxious to quit playin' and go up. I suppose we'll get up some day when we get through educatin' these officers."

Committee Expects to Go "Over the Top" in Effort to Secure \$30,000; Interest Aroused.

Today marks the close of the four-day campaign to raise a \$30,000 maintenance fund for three years for the Portland council, Boy Scouts of America. Twenty ad club members volunteered for special work and many reported this morning in the headquarters at Hotel Portland. Others reported at noon. "The campaign has aroused interest in the Boy Scout movement and brought to light several men who have volunteered as Scout leaders," said James E. Brockway, scout executive, this morning, "but we need many more and I want the public to know that the campaign for leaders is always on. The task is not difficult. A man is required to give only one night a week, from 7:30 to 9 o'clock, to the program laid down by the national organization."
