

# THRIFT STAMPS TO BE PAID FOR RAGS AND PAPER

Arrangements to Give Young Hustlers Opportunity to Earn Start in Campaign Are Made.

SATURDAY TO BE SALE DAY

Waste Material May Be Disposed of at Any Fire Station in City; Benson Girls Make Record.

Uncle Sam's war-winning Thrift Stamps, instead of cash, will be the youngsters who turn in waste paper and rags on Saturday next. For the annual "waste paper and rag day."

Arrangements for giving young hustlers an opportunity to earn a start in the thrift campaign have been made by the Oregon War Savings committee and M. L. Goff, Portland manager of the California Paper & Board Mill company, the company that buys the waste paper and rags. The First National bank has agreed to advance the cash necessary to put in a supply of Thrift Stamps at every fire station in Portland, where payment will be made as usual, and 500 Thrift Cards have already been distributed among the stations for a starter and more will be supplied if there is need of them.

Good Results Many Fold The youngster who turns in old paper worth 25 cents will receive a Thrift Stamp. If he falls short of the 25-cent mark, he will be paid in cash, and he will be given cash for odd cents over that amount, but so far as possible 25-cent stamps will be made the basis of payment.

The good results of clean-up day will be many-fold. Many an old accumulation of rubbish, waste papers and rags, always a fire menace, will be cleaned away; the youngsters doing the work will be paid in Thrift Stamps and so taught a lesson in thrift and economy; and the several thousand dollars that will be distributed as a result of the day's activities will be sent to Uncle Sam for winning-the-war purposes.

It is estimated that from 200,000 to 300,000 pounds of paper will be collected during the day.

Districts to Be Canvassed "Waste paper and rag day" has been announced in all schools, and each school neighborhood will be thoroughly canvassed by the children. Householders may be of great assistance to the clean-up crusade if they will assemble the waste materials in preparation for the visit of the youthful solicitors.

School children have been urged to spend some time in preliminary campaigning, locating supplies of material, so that Saturday may not be a day crowded with affairs of business, but a smoothly running occasion that will have most of its problems settled beforehand.

Following are the prices that firemen have been authorized to pay in Thrift Stamps and cash for paper and rags: Magazines, securely tied in bundles, 25 cents per 100 pounds. Newspapers, securely tied in bundles, 25 cents per 100 pounds. All kinds of wrapping paper, paper bags, cardboard boxes, old letters, etc., securely tied in bundles, 25 cents per 100 pounds.

Rags of all kinds, tied up in old gunny sacks, \$1 per 100 pounds. It is urged that plenty of string be used in tying up bundles of paper, to prevent bursting and the scattering of contents.

## LEUTENANT BEAN FELT THRILL WHEN CUT OFF BY FIRE

Portland Physician Who Served in British Medical Corps Returns From Front.

"We expected to be taken prisoners at any minute and destroyed all letters and other possible marks of identification that might be valuable to the enemy when for 90 minutes we were cut off from our troops by German machine gun fire," said Lieutenant Harold C. Bean, Portland man, who left last July with American physicians to fill vacancies in the British medical staff at the front.

High tribute is paid the stretcher bearers by Lieutenant Bean. "They are deserving of more credit than they receive," he said. "When they go out in No Man's Land to pick up the wounded they are exposed to the same fire as the soldiers, yet they are unarmed. They are constantly in the thickest of the fight and have no chance to defend themselves."

Lieutenant Bean says that great courtesy is shown the Americans by the French and British no matter what branch of service they belong. He praises the work of the British physicians.

"Not only do they give all wounded the best of care but also the Germans. Orders are to give the enemy wounded the same attention as that given our own men."

Lieutenant Bean returned to the United States last November after being pronounced physically unfit to carry on the grueling work of a physician at the front. He has spent several weeks at an eastern hospital before coming to Portland.

Hillsboro Appeal Rejected The committee adopted the following statement relative to the number of hours of work:

"Where business conditions render it impracticable for an employer to furnish to any employee full time employment, the employer shall not be required to pay such employee any greater sum than the hourly wage for the number of hours of actual employment, provided such employer shall so arrange consecutive hours of continuous employment that each employee may have a full opportunity of securing other employment as will enable her to earn a full week's wage."

The committee rejected a request of Charles E. Wells of Hillsboro that the payment of a smaller wage to telephone operators in rural exchanges than in the city be permitted.

Judge Gatens Cuts Bootleg Sentence "A mysterious stranger handed me an address on an envelope and asked me to have some baggage delivered," explained J. A. Horner in Circuit Judge Gatens' court Tuesday afternoon.

Judge Horner did not reckon with the sleuthing Deputy District Attorney Bernard, who traced down another address on the same envelope and found it had once before been in Horner's possession. Bernard also learned that Horner holds a mortgage on 1217 First street, where a case of alcohol was delivered several weeks ago in violation of the prohibition law, although the defendant at first denied knowledge of the building.

The jury quickly found Horner guilty as a bootlegger but recommended leniency. Judge Gatens assessed a \$100 fine, which was paid. The case was up on appeal from the district court where Horner was fined \$250 and sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

Before her marriage Mrs. Cole was Miss Louise Williams. She lived in Portland. She is said to be the niece of Gus West, a timber operator of Silverton, Or. She was married to Cole in Portland Thursday and came here Sunday with her husband.

## Reed College to Be Training School

Training for Technical Experts in Essential Industries Will Make College the Center of Useful Service.

In answer to a request from the secretary of war, Reed college has offered its grounds, buildings, equipment and administrative staff for the training of technical experts during the coming summer for the United States army. According to this plan, about 600 drafted and enlisted men will be detailed to the college for intensive technical training in order, as Secretary Baker says, "to avoid unnecessary disturbance to essential industries through withdrawal of skilled men." The federal board for vocational education, which has tabulated the needs of the war department for more than 200,000 additional experts, has notified Reed college of the probable necessity of using all the resources of the college during the coming summer.

Reed college has just opened, under the direction of the surgeon general, a new course for the training of reconstruction aides. A similar course of three months will be given during the coming summer. Reconstruction aides are women employed in army hospitals and other sanitary formations for aiding wounded soldiers to recover the use of their limbs and thus be prepared for reeducation. Reed college is the only institution west of the Mississippi river as yet approved for this work by the surgeon general. The course includes instruction in anatomy, physiology, personal hygiene, massage, corrective gymnastics and other remedial exercises.
