War Time Cookery

Rice with Chicken Giblets—Prepare broth by cooking together the giblets, neck, tips of wings and well cleaned head and feet of the chicken: Two cups rice, one egg, giblets of a chicken, cooking oil or chicken fat, chicken broth, onion, grated cheese, salt and pepper.

Boil the rice in salted water until it is about half done. Then let the water cook away and begin adding the broth. Cut up a chicken into small pieces, bones and all; brown in fat, put into the vegetable mixture, add onion chopped fine, salt and pepper to taste, and let all simmer for two hours. When served put a tablespoon of boiled rice and a little garden pepper cut fine in each dish, dipping over it the chicken, vegetable and juice.

Oyster Jambalaya—Put a tablespoon of drippings in a pot. Heat and add a large onion chopped fine; brown and add a tablespoon of flour; brown, then add two or three tomatoes or their equivalent in canned tomatoes; stir carefully to keep the flour from thickening in lumps. Now add the hot liquor from 50 oysters with enough boiling water to make one and one half quarts. Boil until the ingredients are well combined and add one cup of washed rice. Boil until the rice is tender, stirring often. Season as desired with cloves, parsley, bay leaf and celery, chopped fine; pepper, salt and a pinch of cayenne. Add last of all 50 oysters and let them cook until the edges begin to curl, when it is ready to serve.

Scalloped Rice—To prepare this economical dish use two cups of boiled rice, one cup of white sauce and one fourth cup of finely shredded codfish which has been parboiled 10 minutes in hot water. Cover the bottom of an oiled baking dish with rice, then add the codfish and cover with white sauce. Sprinkle the top with bread crumbs and bake in a moderate oven until brown.

Conductor Uses Gun To Eject Passenger

Stearns, Ky., March 13.—(I. N. S.)—In a gun battle on a Southern railroad train Wednesday, George A. Lawhorn, conductor, shot and seriously wounded Mrs. Cinda Lewis and her son, Benjamin.

According to the latter, Lewis, drunk, tried to take possession of the train. Lawhorn threw him from the car. Lewis then made a second attempt to "own the train" and the conductor said, finally began shooting. Mrs. Lewis then appeared to reinforce her son. Several bullets were fired, some piercing the conductor's clothing. Finally he whipped out a revolver and shot the two.

Reed College Secretary to Have Secretaryship in National Council of Defense.

MISS FLORENCE M. READ, secretary of Reed college, will leave early next week to become a worker in the Council of National Defense. The college authorities have granted Miss Read an indefinite leave of absence, but she hopes to return to resume her Reed duties with the opening of college next September.

Early in February Miss Read received a communication from the Council of National Defense offering her a secretaryship with the medical division. She responded to her country's call with an acceptance. Miss Read will probably begin government duties March 25, at Washington.

The work of the medical division is closely connected with training camp activities and their relation to health. This branch of the service aims at a high standard of physical fitness among the soldiers. Major W. F. Snow is at the head of the division and Miss Read's duties under him will be administrative in character.

Mrs. Mattie A. Fay, War Bride of '61, Makes Remarkable Record

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 13.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. Mattie A. Fay, 73 years old, has earned the title of "the human knitting machine" by knitting 38 sweaters for relatives and friends in Uncle Sam's service.

For a period of three days Mrs. Fay made a sweater a day, the last one in exactly 114 hours.

Mrs. Fay was the war bride, in 1861, of Lieutenant William W. Fay, Thirtieth Massachusetts volunteers, and she served with her husband at the battle of Antietam. Later, while stationed at Fort Monroe, Va., she pulled the lanyard which fired the shot announcing Lee's surrender to Grant.

Archie Roosevelt Wins Decoration

With the American Army in France, March 13.—(U. P.)—Captain Archie Roosevelt, son of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, decorated with the Croix de Guerre by a French general for gallantry in action. The presentation was dramatic. No details of how Roosevelt won the decoration was permissible.
