REALTY BOARD GETS FIGURES IN DETAIL ON VACANT HOUSES

Plenty of Buildings Available but Too Many Are Not Habit-

GOVERNMENT FUND OFFERED

Emergency Fleet Corporation to Expend \$50,000,000 to Provide Homes for Shipworkers.

One of the most valuable pieces of investigation work done by the Portland Realty board during the past year, is shown in the report submitted to the board Friday last by the special housing committee, appointed for the purpose of ascertaining if it is necessary at this time to engage in an extensive dwelling house building program in this ity. The report of this committee was your approval. part as follows: Your special housing committee ap-

pointed to make a survey to ascertain the number of vacant houses and their condition in the City of Portland wish to submit the following report: First: We would ask that this committee is not to be confused with another committee, that has been appointed by Mayor Baker, as this committee's efforts were confined entirely to ascertaining the number of vacancies and the condition of the vacancies. The other committee is interested in a very commendable direction in trying to obtain better housing conditions by the enacting of a housing code.

Various Sources Approached The first work in preparing our was done through the co-operation of the Utilities companies and based on gas services, they showed vacancies of 4590 premises that were suitable for living purposes. This was somewhat confusing as, in a great many instances, the gas company may have four or five meters in one house, particularly where it was a large house and a portion of it was rented out for light housekeeping

We next obtained the co-operation of our water bureau and out of a total of 61,383 services they showed a vacancy of 5215 services for dwellings, flats, apartment houses and 33 vacancies for hotels, lodging and rooming houses. Our next survey was with the co-operation of the electric light companies and based on the information obtained from them there was disclosed a va-cancy of about 1800 houses. You will note there is considerable discrepancy between the calculations made, based on water, gas and electric services. Figures also indicated to us the necessity of making a further survey. We also had no report at that time as to the exact condition and location of the various houses that were vacant. rious houses that were vacant.

1326 Vacant Houses Found This brought out the information that there were 1326 vacant houses in the Lioyd B. Symmonds, L. 16, B. 16, City of Portland, 125 vacant flats and

4 vacant apartments. It is interesting to note that in going over these vacancies, as reported, the majority of them are in the hands of owners, which would indicate that if they would co-operate with the members of the Portland Realty Board they no doubt would be able to obtain tenants immediately for any vacancies that they have. As one of the first things the agent would do, and in fact insist upon is, that the owner should put his house

in good condition.

The members will be interested in the general outline of the plan for taking care of the housing situation as pro-vided in the measure recently passed by congress appropriating \$50.000,000 for this purpose. The act gives \$50,000,000 to the Emergency Fleet corporation to provide housing facilities in ship yard centers and also provides that the fleet corporation may acquire by such requisition or requisitions for temporary uses any improved or unimproved land for the construction of houses for the employes of shipyards in which ships are being constructed in the United States as follows: Construction on such land of houses

and necessary facilities upon conditions as to price, etc., as the fleet corporation may determine and soll, lease, or exchange such land, houses and facilities upon such terms as it may determine; Purchase, lease or requisition, includ-ing requisition of temporary use, or acquire by condemnation, houses and other buildings, together with the lands on which the same are erected, and also manage, sell, lease or exchange the same, as it may be determined;

Make loans to persons, firms or cor-porations upon such terms and security. for such time not exceeding ten years Compensation Is Provided

Provision is made for compensation for the property acquired. Whenever the fleet corporation requi-

Whenever the fleet corporation requisitions property it may take immediate possession of it and occupy the same until the validity of the title has been established.

The powers granted by the act cease with the termination of the present war with Germany.

No contract for construction shall provide for companions of a cost plus

vide for compensation of a cost plus basis, unless the contracts provide that

in case of any increase above a reasonable cost, as fixed by the board, the percentage of profit shall decline in accordance with a rate to be expressed in The board may, however, agree to pay a premium or bonus for speedy con-

SHOW BIG FALLING

Government Construction Makes Indicate a Building Spurt.

With the vast government construction activities omitted from the tabulation of building permits issued in the principal cities of the country and with war necessities, the showing made by the cities becomes necessarily unfavorable. The statistics of building per-mits issued now present only a partial view of the current work, whereas a year ago they represented an over-whelming percentage of it. And the volume of government work is still in Ordinary building operations -that is, private building-have shrunk to less than half the normal amount, when the increased cost of construction is taken into consideration. In estimated cost it is something more than 50 per cent. It is quite evident that the current amount of normal construction is considerably less than the actual requirements. Households are "doubling up" all over the land; business structures are not kept strictly up in repairs. The construction of needed buildings of all kinds is being deferred to more propitious times. But the crowding of necessary work makes a

very fair showing, all things considered In 110 principal cities of the United States the building permits issued in February, as officially reported to the American Contractor, Chicago, total \$29,074,332, as against \$52,739,254 for February last year, a decrease of 44 per cent. Of these cities, 32 show an ncrease over the corresponding period a year ago. In most instances this increase is due to the issuance of permits last month for one or more unusually large structures. Thus, in Baltimore the gain of 114 per cent is accounted for by the issuance of a permit for an addition to the Bartlett-Hayward/company munition plant, at a cost of \$277,-000, and a \$283,443 permit issued to the




