

UNDER SENTENCE THOUGH PAROLED HOLDS PRISONER

Majority Opinion of the Supreme Court Denies Right of Extradition of Convicted Person.

STATE IS DENIED REHEARING

Petition of Defendants and State in Hyde Land Fraud Cases Was Denied.

Salem, Or., March 19.—When a person is under sentence to the penitentiary and paroled he cannot be taken from Oregon by extradition to answer a charge of crime in some other state. This is the majority opinion of the supreme court handed down today in habeas corpus proceedings instituted in 1914 by Ida Carpenter against Frank Lord, state agent from California, and T. M. Word, as sheriff of Multnomah county, to prevent Lord from taking her husband, E. H. Carpenter, to California to answer to the charge of forgery.

Circuit Judge Kavanaugh had sustained the demurrer to the writ of habeas corpus, which would have left Lord free to retain custody of Carpenter, and Mrs. Carpenter appealed to the state court. The case was first argued before department 2 of the supreme court in October, 1917, and was reargued before the court en banc February 27, 1918.

Judge Kavanaugh reversed. Justice Burnett wrote the majority opinion which reverses Judge Kavanaugh's suit to collect on promissory note; opinion by Justice Moore; Circuit Judge Bagley affirmed.

Arthur M. Churchill, vs. Minnie A. Meade and T. B. Meade, appellants; appealed from Tillamook; suit to foreclose on mortgage; opinion by Justice Burnett; Circuit Judge Bagley affirmed.

Ashley & Rumell vs. F. A. Lance et al., appellants; appealed from Multnomah; suit to collect on promissory note; opinion by Justice Moore; Circuit Judge Davis affirmed.

Henry Johnson, et al. vs. Walter Crawford, appellants; appealed from Multnomah; suit to enjoin defendant from blocking land claimed to be roadway; opinion by Justice McCamant; Circuit Judge Morrow reversed.

Johanna York, administratrix of estate of Lewis York, appellant, vs. Southern Pacific company, appellee; appealed from Tillamook; petition for rehearing denied; opinion by Justice Moore.

J. W. Morton, et al. appellant, vs. Hood River county; appealed from Hood River; proceeded to review action of county court in location of county road; opinion by Chief Justice McBride; Circuit Judge Wilson affirmed.

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Attorney General Brown asked for a rehearing in order to get the court to go into more detail as to a portion of the lands involved in cases over which the court held in its original opinion that it did not have jurisdiction because the United States government was not made a party to the suits.

This involved base lands which were acquired fraudulently but title to which had been conveyed to the general land office. The court declined to recede from its former opinion.

Feeney & Bremer company, appellant, vs. C. F. Stone; appealed from Tillamook; suit to collect money for machinery delivered; opinion by Justice Harris; Circuit Judge Bagley reversed and case remanded.

Nettie E. Gillard vs. William H. Gillard, et al., appellants; appealed from Linn; suit to partition real property; opinion by Justice Moore; Circuit Judge Galloway affirmed.

L. C. Weyand vs. Ira B. Bartle, appellant, appealed from Coos; suit for damages for personal injuries; opinion by Justice Bean; Circuit Judge Skipworth affirmed.

In matter of Hattie E. Sharp for widow's pension vs. Marion county, appellant; appealed from Marion; case in which circuit court granted larger pension than allowed by juvenile court; opinion by Justice Bean; Circuit Judge Galloway reversed.

The officials include M. Steinberg, M. Algasoff, M. Schneider, M. Trutovsky, M. Kalgayeff and M. Karelin, Social revolutionaries of the left, who resigned from the ministry after the ratification vote at Moscow, together with M. Dibenko and other dissidents.

Minority Report Anti-Ally Fifty dissenting Bolsheviks have adopted a minority report to the pan-soviet peace ratification. It reads: "International capitalism is advancing with the Germans from the east and with the Anglo-French from the north. "With unified interests, the pan-soviet congress should order mobilization of Russia's defenders, arming the peasants and workers."

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The Russian retreat from Odesa was orderly. The Black sea fleet refrained from bombarding the city after German occupation because it was loath to destroy it.

The fleet is awaiting the arrival of the social revolutionary officials who refuse to ratify the peace treaty and who are now en route southward from Moscow.

Bachmatich is 100 miles northeast of Kiev. Konotop is 25 miles east of Bachmatich. "Kursk" the capital of the province of that name, is 100 miles east of Konotop. Charkoff is 100 miles south of Kursk and 350 miles northeast of Odesa.

Hertling Discusses Russia. Copenhagen, March 19.—(U. P.)—Chancellor Hertling, addressing the German reichstag Monday, declared he did not wish to discuss the enemy's opinions regarding the Russian treaty, according to dispatches received here today.

The chancellor said the treaty did not contain terms disgraceful to Russia and that if certain provinces were breaking away from Russia it was in accordance with their own wishes.

"If the reichstag adopts the treaty of peace, the whole east front will be restored," Hertling said.

But among the entente allies there is not yet the inclination to the terrible war. The responsibility for continuation of bloodshed will be on the heads of those wishing to continue it," Hertling's declaration was received with loud cheers, except from the members of the extreme left.

German Prisoners Fighting in Siberia. Copenhagen, March 19.—(L. N. S.)—Fighting for the control of the trans-Siberian railway at the point where it skirts the southern shores of Lake Gaikal, in mid-Siberia, is in progress, according to information received here today. The anti-Bolshevik forces are outnumbered and it is estimated that there are nearly 150,000 German and Austro-Hungarian prisoners to the east and west of the Lake. The prisoners east of the lake (between the Balkal region and Vladivostok) are attempting to get arms, and officers are starting to organize them into an effective military force.

White Russia Appeal Refused. The Hague, March 19.—(L. N. S.)—A deputation representing White Russia called upon the German government requesting that German aid be given to help the people of White Russia establish an independent government, but the petition was refused according to a dispatch from Berlin today.

White Russia is that district of the empire lying between Poland, Finland and Ukraine. As it is under the control of the Bolsheviks, who have concluded peace with Germany, the sense of the dispatch is not plain. However, it is indicated that the Bourgeoisie (the anti-Bolsheviks) invited the Germans to enter the district for some purpose or other.

Licenses Granted Oregon Persons. Chehalis, Wash., March 19.—Marriage licenses were granted here Monday to Edgar T. Hindman of Baker, Or., and Camilla J. Williams of Centralia; Charles Youngman and Mary Kathryn Norton of Portland.

NEUTRALS INVITED TO SEE BIG DRIVE

German High Command Calls in Newspaper Men to Witness Offensive on West.

Copenhagen, March 19.—(U. P.)—The German high command has invited a number of neutral newspaper correspondents to witness the "German offensive on the west front," according to information reaching here today. The correspondents will leave for the front Wednesday.

By Henry Wood. With the French Armies in the Field. March 19.—(U. P.)—Germany has massed armies on her front in France in such positions and in such strength that she would be able to launch a surprise offensive against the allied forces within 24 hours if desired.

Detailed information now in the possession of the French shows this fact. The indications, however, are that the German staff has not yet decided to launch an attack, failure of which would irretrievably compromise the recent successes in the east, as well as those of the entire war. Instead, indications are that Germany is likely to undertake to complete the conquest of the Balkans through a Macedonian offensive and a peace offensive.

French Fortifications Massive. The French front is protected by the greatest defensive organization in the history of the world. In the four months since the first announcement of the German intention to attack, the work of fortifying has been pushed to the utmost. All details that modern science and experience dictate have been added.

I have made personal visits to the front, where successive defense lines extend to the rear, each fully organized and equipped, awaiting only the presence of troops to render them practically immune to capture.

Early Successes Expected. Should the Germans launch an attack it unquestionably would be the greatest shock sustained since August, 1914. The French then were in a state of disorganization. Today they are prepared to the highest point. Modern methods of artillery concentration are such that if any belligerent undertakes an offensive on a grand scale he is almost certain of first-day successes. The French admit a supreme effort from the enemy would result in first advances, but unless these should be extended and maintained the result would be negative.

British Get Prisoners. London, March 19.—(U. P.)—English troops successfully raided enemy positions in the neighborhood of Villers Guislain, capturing and holding a number of prisoners, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

Portuguese troops conducted a raid east of Neuve Chapelle, capturing prisoners and two machine guns. In the neighborhood of Fleur Baix and Boisgrenier three attempted enemy raids were repulsed with considerable losses to the raiders last night.

Hostile artillery occurred in the Ypres sector.

Americans Cited for Bravery. With the American Army in France. March 17.—(Delayed)—(L. N. S.)—Major William J. Donovan of Buffalo, and Lieutenant Colonel Matthew A. Tingley of Council Bluffs, Iowa, both connected with infantry units on the Lunenburg front, have been awarded the French war cross and have been cited for bravery in French army orders.

Major Donovan "showed brilliant military qualities, notably on the 7th and 8th of March during violent bombardments and gave a remarkable example of bravery and presence of mind."

Lieutenant Colonel Tingley "during a violent bombardment and enemy attack, directed with coolness and calmness defensive operations and, thanks to the brilliant way in which the orders were given before and during the fight, succeeded in keeping the lines intact, despite the efforts of the enemy who was aided by powerful artillery."

Heavy artillery firing continued on Saturday, the Germans using some of their biggest projectiles. The enemy fire was especially heavy against the positions of American batteries.

Details of the raid which the Germans made on Saturday morning are now at hand. The attack was made against the American right wing in the Toul sector after a violent bombardment. Only a few Germans were able to enter the American lines, however.

The Germans have been using gas shells lavishly on the sectors east of Lunenburg and north of Toul. Hundreds of these shells have been thrown into the American position northwest of Toul.

Five Deaths at Army Garrison. Vancouver, Wash., March 19.—Five more deaths due to pneumonia were reported in the Garrison hospital today. James H. Wheeler, 25 years of age, died March 16. The body has been sent to Aylesworth, Oklahoma.

Edgar Baker, 24 years of age, died March 15. His body was sent to Dayton, Ohio.

Carl Trimmer, 25 years of age, died March 16. The body was sent to Warren, Ind.

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Red Cross to Meet. Vancouver, Wash., March 19.—An all-day meeting will be held tomorrow at the Red Cross workrooms in the basement of the First Baptist church at Twenty-seventh and Main streets. The day will be spent in making uniforms, dressings under the direction of Mrs. Irene Cates. Lunch will be served.

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NATION'S EYE ON WISCONSIN TODAY

Senatorial Primary Regarded as First Big Referendum on The Issue of War.

Washington, March 19.—(L. N. S.)—The first big referendum on the war is being held today in Wisconsin. Primary elections are being held today in several counties for the election on April 2 to fill the vacancy in the United States senate caused by the accidental death of Paul O. Husting last fall.

Political Washington is watching the returns today with anxious interest. The war issue on the Republican side is clear cut and the outcome will serve in the opinion of observers here, as an important barometer of popular sentiment.

Senator La Follette, the leading pacifist of the senate, now under fire on disloyalty charges, has publicly endorsed James Thompson of LaCrosse for the Republican nomination. He is opposed by Representative Irvine Lenroot, whose platform has been expressed in one word—"Loyalty."

On the Democratic side, the nomination of Joseph Davies, former chief of the federal trade commission, is practically conceded. Victor Berger of Milwaukee, the first Socialist who sat in the house of representatives, has no opposition in the Socialist primaries.

Labor Leaders Support Davies. Madison, Wis., March 19.—(L. N. S.)—The polls opened early today and excitement ran high not only here but in Milwaukee and other cities in the state.

Only secondarily a battle of candidates, the contest is primarily a referendum on the war.

An eleven-hour development in the campaign is the action of a number of prominent labor leaders in announcing their support of Joseph Davies, Democrat, whose nomination is expected over Dr. Charles McCarthy by many leading Democrats. These men say they are supporting Davies because he gave great service to labor while a member of the federal trade commission in connection with price fixing on steel, copper and other products.
