

PETTY IMPOSITION BY OREGONIAN IS BROUGHT TO LIGHT

Charges "Two Cents for Reply Postage" on Publications Sent Free by the Government.

NO STAMPS ARE NECESSARY

Desired Literature Will Be Mailed Without Charge If Application Is Made.

Under the guise of rendering a service to its readers, the Oregonian is practicing a petty imposition. It is offering daily to send certain government publications upon receipt of a "2 cent stamp for reply postage."

Every publication thus offered can be obtained free by direct application to the proper department at Washington, and no "reply postage" need be sent. No intermediary is necessary. The United States government and its various bureaus are not adjuncts of the Oregonian's circulation department. Government bulletins are intended for free distribution without any petty ruse-off by individuals or newspapers.

Valuable information offered. Most of the bulletins which the Oregonian has been advertising are issued by the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C. They are filled with valuable information for the farmer, the housewife, the city or suburban gardener, the stockman, the chicken raiser, the dairyman, the sheepman, the apple grower. These bulletins are written by experts but they are simple, understandable and profusely illustrated.

To obtain any of these bulletins, it is necessary only to write to the department at Washington, giving the official number of the bulletin desired. The Oregonian has refrained from publishing the official numbers of the bulletins it advertises, for it would not get the 2 cent stamp if the applicant wrote directly to the department.

There is another class of publications, issued by the committee on public information. They give a mass of valuable information concerning the war, its origin, its causes, its cost, its chronology, etc. The journal publishes each day, at the bottom of the last column of the editorial page, a notice of some one of these publications. They, too, are sent to all applicants and no "reply postage" is necessary.

Appended is a partial list of the bulletins of the department of agriculture with the official number of each. If you wish to obtain any of them, write to the Division of Publications, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., and ask for "Farmers"

Holland Minister Sailing for Home

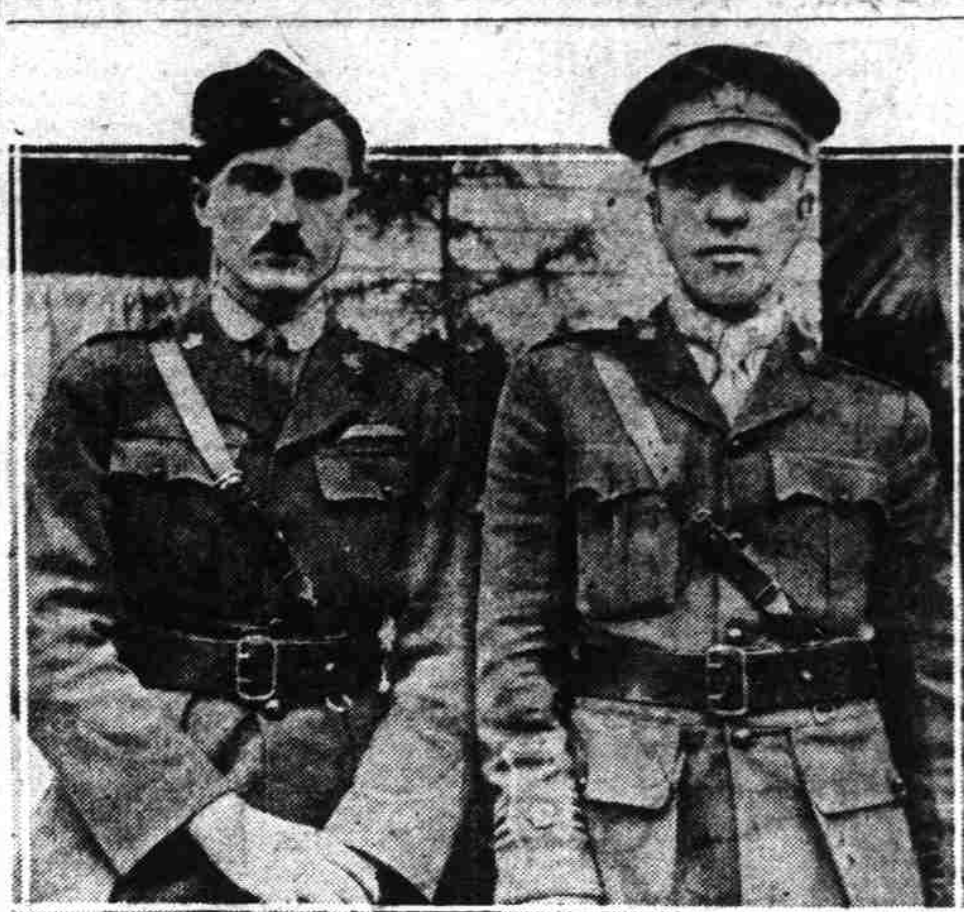
Washington, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—There were reports circulated about the capitol this morning that the Dutch minister, August Philips, is about to sail for Holland. It was understood that this did not mean he had been recalled, but it is known that he had not been in the best of health and may be undertaking the journey partly for his health and partly to confer with the foreign office at The Hague on the situation brought about by the seizure of the United States and Great Britain of Dutch tonnage.

Battle Line on 19th Day Is 95 Miles Long

London, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—The nineteenth day of the German drive found another extension of the battle front, which is now more than 95 miles long, taking into consideration the twists and curves. It stretches from a point north of the Scarpe river nearly to the western edge of the forest of St. Gobain.

CANADIANS URGE LIBERTY LOAN

Major D. F. Sturrock, of the 50th Canadian Overseas contingent, and Lieutenant J. W. Warren, of the Royal Canadian Flying corps, arrived in Portland this morning, being assigned by the Dominion government for duty in Oregon during the third Liberty loan campaign. The officers will be in charge of Milton R. Klepper and will be available for speeches in Portland and for short trips out of the city.

Major Sturrock enlisted in 1915 and was invalided home in September, 1917. He was gassed at Vimy ridge and suffered slight wounds in both feet. When asked how it felt to be gassed, the major said: "Well, my experience at Vimy was the first of the kind I have been through, and, besides, my powers of description are somewhat limited."

Major Sturrock said: "The most I can say is that it feels like hell." Referring to the injury to his feet, Major Sturrock said: "It was this way. A shell, which I am convinced was a regular Jack Johnson, was coming my way a great deal faster than I could run. I jumped into a shell hole to avoid contact with this projectile, and jumped too far, the bones of both feet being broken."

Lieutenant Warren enlisted in the royal Canadian flying corps in 1915 and was invalided home in September, 1917. He is suffering from nervous breakdown, a complaint common among flyers. He says, Lieutenant Warren has a splendid record as a flying man and has accounted for his full quota of Wilhelm's birdmen.

Both officers hail from Regina. They are quartered at the Multnomah hotel.

Boys Lost Report Thought Unfounded

City Grappler Brady dragged the Willamette river near the Inman-Poulter mill Sunday in search for the bodies of two boys who were said to have been drowned there when a canoe upset. The bodies could not be found. The harbor patrol officer stated this morning that the report was unfounded because no parents had reported two boys missing. Chief Johnson endeavored to find a young woman who reported the accident, but his efforts were futile.

Earl of Dunmore Speaks to a Large Audience at Chamber Luncheon.

"America's most important contribution to the success of the war in Europe is ships," declared the Earl of Dunmore, addressing a packed audience of business men at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon today. "No matter how many millions of men you have in your army, they will be of no help if you do not have ships to transport them and their supplies."

"We, of Great Britain know that you have undertaken a vast shipbuilding program and believe you will carry it out."

Colonel Murray, who is the Earl of Dunmore, spoke of America's raising an army of 1,500,000 men as a "great achievement."

"There was a time last year," he declared, "when if we had had 1,000,000 of your boys, or even half a million, we would have swept the German nation off the face of the earth."

Another of Colonel Murray's striking statements was "The evidence of your success in the business of peace is our absolute guarantee of your success in the war."

President Expressed British Ideals. The British people, he said, accepted President Wilson's statement of the aims of the war as being exactly expressive of their own ideals. He said that German propaganda and spy work caused Russia to doubt her own aims.

"Germany has Russia today or will have within a week," he declared significantly. "The Russian defection is one of the serious blows of the war."

The Earl of Dunmore said that the Germans won no strategic victory in their recent drive, although they penetrated the British line. The heavy loss of men that the drive cost Germany will put the final result on the credit side of the allies.

"I do not think the Germans will take Amiens," he said, "and if they do, while it will be a grave blow it will not affect the final issue. Upon British and American shoulders must rest the brunt of the war from now on, because these two nations have the greatest strength and the largest resources upon which to draw. France will stay through to the end."

"We must fight," he declared with the solemn impressiveness of one who has led a division at the battle front, "until our last man and our last dollar are gone, if necessary. France will. Great Britain will. America will. The Liberty loan today depends upon Liberty in Europe and the defeat of the Germans."

Has Fine Military Record. Wounded and gassed on the western front, and recuperating for further service in the great war, Colonel Murray arrived here from San Francisco Sunday night. He was received at the Union station by Harry L. Sherwood, British consul, H. L. Corbett, W. D. Wheelwright, Mayor Baker, L. C. Gillman, J. D. Farrell and John M. Scott and officially welcomed to the city and the state.

Colonel Murray rendered distinguished services in each of England's wars during the past 25 years. He is thoroughly familiar with the situation on the western front and expresses the firm conviction that Paris is safe from the invading German host. He states that the big Hun drive has been practically a failure, considering the immense losses in men and the meager results attained.

Colonel Murray is touring the country under the auspices of the National Chamber of Commerce. He will speak at The Auditorium Wednesday night.

Purse Lost in Theatre. While attending the performance at a downtown theatre Sunday, Mrs. S. Silver, 10 East Twenty-seventh street, was robbed of her purse. She claims that it contained a \$10,000 life insurance policy, \$4 in cash, Red Cross receipts and other personal belongings.

Accused of Operating Dice Board. Christ John, proprietor of the cigar stand at Fourth and Stark streets, was arrested by Officers Doyle and Bent Sunday on a charge of operating a dice board. He was released on \$10 bail.

The following official order to captains of the third Liberty loan campaign has been issued: "Captains are advised that the hour for reporting money and subscriptions to their colonels has been advanced to 7 p. m. Captains will therefore please instruct their workers so that workers will hand in their reports in sufficient time to allow the captains to check them and have them in the hands of the colonel by 7 p. m. at the banks designated to report to."

BOLSHEVSKI FNDS U. S. NOT SO BAD

Assistant U. S. Attorney Rankin Turns Radical Russian Into Bond Buyer.

When Gustav Blum, alien Russian of Dallas, walked into the office of Assistant United States Attorney Rankin this morning he declared the government of the United States is far inferior to that of the Bolsheviks.

Figuratively he waved aloft the flag of the dominating party of Russia and declared the allies should turn the other cheek to the Hun.

"Not so fast," said Mr. Rankin, and he spent 30 minutes enlightening Blum on a few points which the latter admitted threw a new and brighter light on the world war.

"Now that you are a good American in spirit, how would you like to do something for democracy?" Mr. Rankin asked him.

"That's just what I want to do," suggested Mr. Rankin, who is a solicitor for the bonds.

Fine, said the Dallas man, and he bought a \$100 one.

Blum was brought to the attention of federal authorities after he wrote a letter to his local exemption board in Tolk county declaring that the government could not make him serve in the war unless it obtained a permit from the Bolsheviks.

MISS ARNOLD SPEAKS TWICE WEDNESDAY ON FOOD CONSERVATION

Simmons College Dean to Address Teachers in Afternoon, Public in Evening.

Heralded as one of the most advised and interesting woman speakers in the country, Miss Sarah Louise Arnold, dean of Simmons college, Boston, Mass., will be in Portland Wednesday to address two food conservation meetings.

Miss Arnold is a national representative of the home conservation movement directed by the food administration.

On Wednesday afternoon at 3:15 o'clock, in the Lincoln high school auditorium, Miss Arnold will address the Portland school teachers. That instructors may attend, grade school classes will be dismissed early.

Miss Arnold has been attending the Inland Empire Teachers' association conference at Spokane, where she was listed as one of the chief speakers.

Miss Arnold will speak at the White Temple in the evening at 8 o'clock. Her address will have to do with food conservation in the home, although she will emphasize the educational feature of the work in the afternoon.

Turks Advancing Again in Caucasus

Constantinople, April 8.—Turkish forces are advancing over a broad front in the Caucasus, the war office announces. The Turks have occupied Ardahan after severe fighting. They have also taken Russian towns in Transcaucasia and have crossed the old Russo-Turkish line toward Batur. Nearly all of Turkish Armenia has been cleared of Russians, it is stated.

Automobile Driver Injured. In an effort to avoid a collision with the automobile of William Saub at East Seventh and Beech streets Sunday morning, R. E. Hahn drove his car into the curb and nearly wrecked the machine. Mrs. Hahn's arm was fractured, but the other occupants, Charles Hahn, age 9, and Frank Hahn, age 7, were not hurt. Mrs. Hahn was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

Hahn, who is leaving on a vacation to the southland, his old home, in a few days, with a special reception and presented him with a valuable golden fountain pen as a token of appreciation and respect. The presentation speech was made by the Rev. Mr. Joslyn in behalf of the district.
