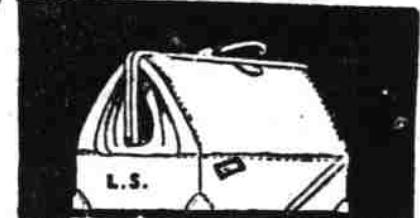

TROOP MOVEMENT TO FRONT EXCEEDS HOPE OF WAR DEPARTMENT

American Soldiers Going Across
Faster Than Officials Be-
lieved It Possible.

Washington, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—
Complete reports summing up the in-
creased activities of the war machine
of the United States since President
Wilson took it in personal charge 10
days ago were compiled today.
While it is impossible to cite statistics,
it is intimated in official circles that
the speeding up movement of troops is
far in advance of the strongest hopes
of the war department officials in
charge. Men are going forward by
regiments and brigades and supplies
and munitions are going overseas at a
rate that is inspiring to the men in
charge. Thanks to the new conveyer sys-
tem, it is possible to move both men
and supplies at double the rate of speed
formerly possible.
The United States will meet German
force with equal force, officials in di-
rect charge of the situation declared
today. The shipping problem has been
temporarily solved and today there are
more vessels engaged in the transport
trade than at any time since the nation
entered the war. Loading and unloading
time has been cut down to a mini-
mum and every promise that has been
made to the British and French regard-
ing supplies, men and munitions, is be-
ing carried out and in certain cases al-
ready have been exceeded, it was de-
clared in official circles today.

Move to Unionize All Steel Workers

Chicago Federation of Labor Calls
Upon Samuel Gompers to Launch Or-
ganizing Campaigns.

Chicago, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—The
Chicago Federation of Labor has taken
preliminary steps to organize the 500-
000 steel industries' employees in the
United States, it was announced today.
Resolutions have been adopted re-
questing Samuel Gompers, president of
the American Federation of Labor, to
call a meeting of representatives of all
international unions involved and of
central labor bodies in steel districts to
"launch an organization campaign in
every plant."
It is declared by the resolutions that
the "unionizing of the steel industries is
absolutely necessary to spread industrial
democracy in America."
Chicago telegraphers sent out a warn-
ing today to all in that occupation in
the country to have patience and not
encourage trouble at this time because
of the discharge of union men in several
cities.

Governor Lister In Spokane Today

Washington Executive Confering With
Local Authorities Regarding the I. W.
W. Situation; Asked to Intervene.

Spokane, Wash., April 8.—(U. P.)—
Governor Lister arrived here today for
another consultation with city and
county officials over the I. W. W. situ-
ation.
Reports preceding him from Olympia
declared he intended today to take over
the authority of the police chief and
sheriff.
These officials recently asked the gov-
ernor to intervene, but later receded
from this position. They now declare
they will resist an attempt by the gov-
ernor to take charge.
City authorities last week arrested
more than 50 alleged I. W. W. and
closed the I. W. W. hall and headquarters.
Twenty-six of those arrested are
held for trial. The local authorities now
maintain they are able to handle the
situation.

Triple Murder and Suicide Ends Grief

Mexico, Mo., April 8.—(I. N. S.)—Do-
mestic troubles are said to have caused
Derby S. Adkins, 23, to shoot and kill
his father-in-law, Nolan McGowan, his
mother-in-law, Mrs. Ruby McGowan,
and his 17-year-old wife, Mrs. Gladys
Adkins. Adkins then shot himself, dying
instantly. The tragedy occurred on a
farm south of here Sunday.
Adkins leaves a five-months-old
baby.

Six Killed When Train Hits Auto

Fort Wayne, Ind., April 8.—(I. N. S.)—
Six persons are dead and four others
are believed to be dying today as a
result of a collision between an auto-
mobile and a Washburn train at a cross-
ing near here. All were from Fort
Wayne. The dead are: H. J. Steag-
man and wife, Rudolph Alexander, Otto
Fatzner Jr. age 7, Mary Fatzner age 4,
and Mrs. Max Brand. The injured are:
Otto Fatzner and wife, Ida Fatzner and
Albert Brandt.

Powdered Glass Is Cause of Illness

San Antonio, Texas, April 8.—(U. P.)—
Powdered glass caused illness of 50
persons at Camp Travis, according to
Major Noel Gains of the military po-
lice. An Austrian and two Germans
employed in analyzing food at the Fort
Sam Houston laboratory "have been
dealt with," Major Gains stated.
A carload of flour consigned to the
camp was under guard today, following
its arrival with seals broken.

Tar Cost Given Germans
Seward, Neb., April 8.—(U. P.)—Wil-
liam Grots of Germantown and Louis
Niebour, a farmer, were taken from
their homes during the night by a party
of about 20 men and given a coat of
tar and feathers for alleged pro-German
statements and spreading of propaganda.

Chinaman on Trial for Life
Chaverville, Cal., April 8.—(U. P.)—
The second trial of Lorett Freyer, 18,
charged with the murder of Lem Sing,
a wealthy Chinese mine owner, on No-
vember 8, 1915, began here today. At
the first trial Freyer was convicted and
sentenced to life imprisonment.
