

INDICATIONS ARE THIRD LOAN TO BE OVERSUBSCRIBED

Approximately \$2,225,000,000 Had Been Pledged at Close of Saturday's Business.

SIX DAYS OF DRIVE LEFT

Four New States, Kansas, New Mexico, Mississippi and Delaware, Now in the Honor List.

Washington, April 27.—(U. N. S.)—Under the third Liberty loan will be oversubscribed, according to indications tonight at the treasury department.

Approximately \$2,225,000,000 had been pledged at the close of business today. Liberty loan day, celebrated throughout the country by millions of people, was just beginning to show results late this afternoon in scattering reports that drifted in from individual centers. Full confidence is expressed that, while the goal is still a long way off, the final sprint will bring in the three quarters of a billion dollars still required to make up the minimum of \$3,000,000,000.

Officials would not predict when a fourth, fifth and sixth loan would be necessary, but they unofficially said that logically in the strides in the war machine might be expected to call for still further enormous expenditures of money on the part of the allies to overcome the German machine, which is spending its millions every day.

Four States Join Honor List

America is responding to the appeal joyfully. Almost the first tabulation today showed a jump of something approaching \$100,000,000 for the day, or \$2,113,000,000. No full report from the 12 federal reserve districts can be expected until about Tuesday to show exactly what the millions of gray papers are doing in the subscription.

Four new states were added to the list of honor states—Kansas, New Mexico, Mississippi and Delaware—making a list of 16 so far. Others are expected to be recorded in the announcements of Monday. Delaware is the first eastern state to have put its seal. The Kansas City district has exceeded its quota, the third district making this record. South Carolina and Idaho reached their quotas on Liberty day and San Francisco has attained 100 per cent.

Maryland's total was brought up to \$13,900,000 and the District of Columbia reported \$9,500,000. Virginia, \$21,500,000; West Virginia, \$3,000,000; North Carolina, \$13,500,000; and South Carolina, \$7,800,000. More than two days will be required to get the full report on the Friday drive.

30,000 S. P. Employees Buyers

land diet by the chief of the German administration.

Treaties guaranteeing close economic and military connection between Germany and Courland will be drafted by the Germans.

Washington, April 27.—(U. N. S.)—Reports of a Russian revolution seeping through the cable service to Constantinople aroused greatest interest here tonight.

The state department was without information on the subject, the last cable from Ambassador Francis at Volodga arriving here today after being en route five days. It contained no indication of a new upheaval in Russia. The Russian embassy, almost completely out of touch now with the government, had no news.

Russian officials, however, have declared repeatedly that the Bolshevik government could not long survive after the people awoke to the depredations of the plundering German forces pounding and slaughtering their way into the country even though peace has been declared. American officials were silent on the possibilities.

In allied and American official quarters it has long been the belief that the only order that could come out of Russian chaos now in mind to accomplish a positive result to the allied cause would be at the head of a strong military leader, a virtual dictator, who had the confidence of the Russian people as a class.

So far as the effect of another Russian revolution is concerned, it would serve, according to belief here, merely to further embarrass the Germans in their effort to dominate the country and postpone any active service the Kaiser might hope eventually to get from Russia.

Copenhagen, April 27.—(U. N. S.)—Reports from Finland show that the Finnish upper classes favor the establishment of a "Kingdom of Finland."

The city of Tavastehus, 78 miles north-east of Abo, has been captured by White Guards, according to Helsinki reports. The red guards' front is reported broken near Viborg (74 miles northwest of Petrograd) upon which city the white guards are now advancing.

Berlin, via London, April 27.—(U. N. S.)—War office statement on east: "In Finland attempts of enemy (Red Guards) to break our lines failed."

GERMANS KEEP UP AWFUL SLAUGHTER AND GAIN LITTLE

Morale of Allies Is Unshaken; Faith Maintained in Ability of Gen. Foch to Meet Situation.

GAINS ARE NOT MENACING

Little Victories Tempt Von Hindenburg to Continue Sacrificing His Man Power.

New York, April 27.—(U. P.)—Von Hindenburg continued his ceaseless slaughter of German manpower this week by developing a double offensive toward Amiens and Ypres.

No success of tactical importance resulted from the Amiens operations, but the capture of Mont Kemmel in the northern area of operations, has emphasized the German threat against Ypres. The net result of the week's operations, however, has not given to the Germans sufficient territory to justify their losses. The capture of Amiens is as far off as ever, and the fall of Ypres would not have important strategic consequences for the Germans as long as the British lines hold immediately to the west.

Merely Slaughter of Humans

The small sectors of territory occasionally yielded by the allies are far more worrying to the nerves than their importance justifies. It is uncomfortable to read of the German advances, but if these little victories were not won they would be no temptation to Von Hindenburg to continue the merciless slaughter of his troops.

There are two possible ways by which Von Hindenburg can win the war in the west—first, by separating the French and British armies and annihilating one or the other of them; second, by wearing down the morale of the allies. The first method has been made practically impossible with the appointment of General Foch to the supreme command of the allied forces. To win by the second is Von Hindenburg's purpose in incessantly hammering at the western lines for petty gains. If attacks of this character continue long enough, it sometimes happens that demoralization sets in among armies on the defensive.

Morale Being Maintained

No indication of such a condition has been shown on the west front, and by continuing to guard against it, the allies can eventually bring the game back into their own hands. The more the Germans are induced to attack, the sooner will German manpower begin to approach its inevitable end in military exhaustion. The territorial gains Germany is winning are in no sense menacing as long as General Foch is able to maintain the morale of the allied armies at a high level and the present series of defensive combats.

Foch is demonstrating more and more his abilities as a defensive leader. In this week's battles the renewal of spirited resistance by the allies after the disheartening loss of Mont Kemmel, has been very encouraging. Foch can recover this sector of ground by the employment of a sufficient number of reserves, but it is questionable whether he thinks the tactical gain would compensate for the future lessening of his reserve powers.

Foch is conducting his defensive operations.

TERRITORY NOT TO DECIDE THIS WAR, DECLARES BAKER

War Will Not Be Lost Until Democracy and Hearts of the Allies Are Broken.

WE MUST NOT COUNT COST

More Important to Win the World for Human Rights Than to Win This War, Says Secretary.

Cleveland, O., April 27.—(U. P.)—"I have a greater task than that of organizing the military forces of this country and sending them to France," Secretary of War Baker said in two speeches here tonight at the Democratic dinner.

"It is more important for us to win the world than to win this war. To accomplish this and make us fit architects of the new civilization after the war, we must organize the great force back of our army in France."

"On the outcome of this war depends the great, eternal principle upon which

we are going to be governed through the future. On the one side is the German philosophy that the individual and all he represents exists for the greatness of the state, to magnify the state, and for its aggrandizement.

Individual Rights, Our View

"On our side is the philosophy that human happiness and the rights of the individual are more important than the advancement of the state, and that the individual should have to give up a minimum of his rights for the state."

"If Germany is the victor, every nation would have to adopt its policy and political philosophy."

"Daily we watch how the line on the western front is bent or forced back as though that were important and as if the outcome depended upon that."

"This war isn't going to be decided on the amount of territory taken. Much more territory could be taken by the enemy than it is possible for him to take and yet the war would not be ended."

Hearts, Not Land, Spell Victory

"Until you have broken democracy, until you have broken the hearts of the British, French, Italian and American people, this war isn't ended, no matter how much land is taken by the enemy."

"All of us must believe in this cause for which we are fighting, deeply, utterly and without counting the cost."

"It is the intention of the American people to win this war and win this war they will."

"Force is the only philosophy the German knows and with cold, relentless, adequate force we shall answer the German. When we have demonstrated that the German philosophy of the state above the individual and of force is wrong, the war will be ended and we shall remodel civilization to make forever impossible the things I saw in France."

"In addition to sending men and

munitions and supplies over there we are going to send brains. We are willing to make all necessary sacrifices, but not any unnecessary sacrifices."

Senator Pomeroy of Ohio, and Governor Cox were other speakers.

PIONEERS TO DEDICATE MEMORIAL BUILDING IN CHAMPOEG THURSDAY

Day Will Also Mark 75th Anniversary of Founders' Day for Old Oregon.

The greatest event in the history of the Oregon Pioneer association and the Oregon Historical society is scheduled next Thursday, when the Pioneer Memorial building at Champeog, in Marion county, will be formally dedicated.

The date set for the dedication of this building falls on the seventy-fifth anniversary of Founders' Day and the eightieth celebration of the same day at Champeog.

Judge P. H. D'Arcy of Salem, pioneer of 1857, and president of Oregon Pioneer association, will be president of the day and will be in charge of the exercises.

Although the actual program will not begin until 1:15 o'clock, a concert will be furnished by the Fernwood band of

Yamhill county between 11 and 12 o'clock.

The afternoon program will open with the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner," invocation, brief dedicatory address and informal five minute speeches by well known veterans. The Veteran quartet of Portland will also participate.

The event is open to all pioneers, sons and daughters of pioneers and patriotic citizens in general. The steamer Pomona has been chartered for the occasion and will leave Portland at 8:30 or the north bound train leaving Salem at 9:45 a. m. Every effort will be made to arrive in Champeog at 11 o'clock.

In returning, the Pomona will leave Champeog at 4 p. m. and make close connections with the Oregon Electric cars at Wilsonville.
