

NAME OF HUSTON MAY BE OMITTED WHERE POSSIBLE

Attorney General Rules, However, Ballots Need Not Be Reprinted to Make Change.

VALIDITY IS NOT AFFECTED

Opinion Is Given in Answer to Numerous Queries Received From County Clerks.

Salem, May 1.—In counties where the official primary election ballots have not yet been printed county clerks should comply with the request of S. B. Huston to withdraw his name as a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator. If the ballots are already printed, under no circumstances should the county go to the expense of having the ballots reprinted.

This is the substance of an opinion given today by Attorney General Brown to Secretary of State Olcott, who asked the attorney general for advice so he could inform the county clerks what course to pursue.

Prior to this time the attorney general had held that the matter had passed from the jurisdiction of the secretary of state and rested with the county clerks, but because of inquiries received from county clerks, Secretary Olcott obtained today's opinion for their benefit and he is advising them by wire of the attorney general's ruling.

When asked if the validity of the election might be jeopardized by the fact that in some counties the name of Huston will be on the ballot while in others it will not, Attorney General Brown said he was positive that it would not be.

Repeating Held Unnecessary

"Such a situation will have absolutely no effect on the other candidates, so far as the validity of the election is concerned," declared the attorney general. "You can say that positively."

In holding that Huston's name may be omitted if the county clerks have not had the ballots printed yet, the attorney general said he was giving chief consideration to the rights of the electors, and was following a statement in the original primary election law which says that the law should be liberally construed.

"Rights of the electors should be considered," said Attorney General Brown, "and when election officers hand the voter the primary election ballot it should contain the truth, as nearly as such can be ascertained. So I advise the secretary of state to notify county clerks of Huston's attempt to withdraw, and advise them that they need not print his name on the ballot, but under no circumstances to go to the expense of re-printing the ballots."

In explaining his reason for asking for a second opinion from the attorney general, Secretary of State Olcott made the following statement:

"As soon as S. B. Huston filed with this office his request to have his name withdrawn as a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator, I at once took the matter up with Attorney General Brown, who officially advised me that it had passed from my jurisdiction, as I had already certified the list of candidates to the various county clerks and that it was a matter which could be adjusted only by the county clerks."

"Since then many of the county clerks have wired me for information as to what action they should take, and on behalf of these county clerks, and to the end that there may be as little delay and confusion as possible in the determination of the matter, I requested the attorney general to give me his opinion as to what course they should pursue. That opinion reached me today, and I am sending telegrams to every county clerk in the state advising them of the attorney general's ruling."

"I wish to add that this office has received no request from the county clerk or any other person in Multnomah county asking if Huston had filed withdrawal, until late Tuesday afternoon, when a telegram was received from Mr. Beveridge, clerk of Multnomah county, and this telegram was answered by telegraph immediately upon receipt."

Teacher Alleged Draft Evader

San Francisco, May 1.—(U. P.)—Ferdinand A. Varrelman, teacher of biology in the Lowell high school here, was under federal arrest today, charged with evading the draft.

Walter Spreckels Is Barred by Order From Sugar Plant

New York, May 1.—(U. P.)—Walter Spreckels, nephew of Claus Spreckels millionaire sugar king, has been forbidden to enter the sugar factory at Yonkers of which he has been manager for 16 years. Federal authorities declared he was an enemy alien. Officials say Walter Spreckels had failed to take out naturalization papers, although he has been in this country 30 years.

ROTARY CLUB JOINS MOVEMENT TO HELP ORPHANED CHILDREN

Ernest DesBaillets Makes Strong Appeal for "Penny Fund" for Aid of Fatherless.

The Portland Rotary club acted favorably Tuesday in response to the urgent request of Ernest DesBaillets, speaking in behalf of the fatherless children of France and Belgium, that the organization start locally a campaign to raise a "penny-fund" for the little folks whose fathers have been killed in war.

There are thousands of little children in France and Belgium who must look to America for life itself, said Mr. DesBaillets, who explained that Rotary clubs in California have fostered the work.

"I have just returned from California," said Charles B. Waters, president of the Rotary club, "and in many public places there were little bowls for pennies contributed to buy food and clothing for the fatherless children of the war zone. Nearly every bowl was filled daily. It showed that even pennies can be piled up sufficiently to make in the aggregate a large sum."

Bert E. Haney, United States attorney for the district of Oregon, said that the federal department of justice is carrying a heavier burden of justice ever before in the history of the nation.

"In Oregon," he explained, "we find there is more unloyalty than disloyalty. The disloyal element is divided into two classes—the radical pro-Huns and the I. W. W."

"If the measure submitted by Senator Poindexter in the senate is enacted by congress there will be much less loose talking than there is now."

Prof. Stahl Will Enter Annapolis

Word was received in Portland this morning announcing that Professor J. J. Stahl of Reed college, who left Portland last August with Lieutenant Harold C. Jones of the navy as chief yeoman, had passed the navy examination for ensign and had been recommended for the Annapolis navy training class beginning in June.

Three Portland boys enlisted in the navy have been ordered east for assignment and are on their way. They are John E. Kenefick, assistant paymaster, and Harry W. Casson and Robert P. Morse, pay clerks.

Alien Enemy Sailor Put Under Arrest

Lack of proper alien enemy credentials resulted in the arrest of Carl Hopp, former member of the crew of the German bark Kurt, seized at Astoria when the United States entered the war, and his subsequent temporary imprisonment in the Multnomah county jail, pending investigation by federal authorities.

Hopp was arrested when he called at the Astoria police station to inquire if he would be allowed to work in a lumber camp. He was brought to Portland this morning by Deputy United States Marshal Mass.

Chicago Saloons Decimated

Chicago, May 1.—(I. N. S.)—With the opening of a new saloon license period today it is estimated that over 1000 Chicago "third parlors" will go out of business today. It is reported that the city treasury, already low, will be hard hit by the loss of the revenue from saloon licenses.

IMPORTERS ASKED TO ATTEND MEETING AT CHAMBER THURSDAY

Organization Will Be Formed to Combat Seattle Influence Against Portland.

Every exporter and importer interested in securing prompt shipment of merchandise consigned in bond to Portland and all citizens who will join in defending Portland against the delays that hurt the business of the city, and which are chiefly ascribed to Seattle's peculiar community competitive methods, have been asked by the Chamber of Commerce to attend a meeting for organization at the Chamber of Commerce, 4 p. m. Thursday.

One hundred and twenty invitations were issued by the Chamber of Commerce to exporters and importers and business houses handling imported goods. Fear that some who are directly or indirectly interested may have been omitted has caused the issuance of the general public invitation.

Collector of Customs Will Moore has called the city's attention to the fact that imports consigned to Portland must suffer delays in forwarding of from 4 to 40 days. Imports cleared through Seattle, so that the customs district there gets the credit, suffer negligible delays. As a consequence, many local importers have goods cleared through Seattle and the Washington customs districts get a credit that, it is feared, will react seriously upon this city. Aggressive organization to see that goods are forwarded promptly has been advised as a solution, pending the time when direct steamship service can be provided for the Columbia river.

Will Return With Sheep for Japan

Dr. Issa Tanimura, livestock commissioner of Japan, has returned to Portland after a tour of the country. He visited all the leading livestock centers and was the guest of honor of officials of the United States government at various places.

The object of his tour is to familiarize himself with sheep raising so that he can introduce it on a larger scale in Japan. That country has only about 3000 sheep at present. Dr. Tanimura has bought a number of specimens of blooded stock in America and will ship them to Japan. He believes that sheep raising can be made a profitable enterprise in Japan.

THRILLING DETAILS OF CAPTURE OF GEO. KYLE

did not often see the other Chinese captives that the bandits had with them. They understood, however, that there were 16 or 20 of them, some as young as 3 or 4 years. They were well treated according to the standard of the bandits. They were always given the best places to sleep; if there were beds they would have them and the bandits themselves would sleep on the floor.

"As Chinese food did not suit the party, the bandits allowed foreign canned provisions to be brought in, and would even commandeer a native to carry the food for the engineers. Water was always a luxury and a wash was not to be indulged in daily.

Bandits Curious

"The bandits would show a curiosity over the canned goods that the engineers would get and would invariably taste everything, though most of the things did not agree with bandit palates. There was always a guard of four bandits over them and an attempt to escape would have been fatal.

"Although they were well treated in the matter of food, the captives were subjected to all sorts of indignities and the hands of the bandits. They would be constantly searched; the bandits would feel their bodies and make insulting remarks. They would be taken to villages and made to sit down for an exhibition to the villagers. The bandits would explain to the villagers that those were captives and would have their heads cut off if their purchase were not effected soon, and the bandits would go through the motions of cutting off heads. They would also at times threaten the engineers by loading their rifles and pointing them at the Americans.

Conditions of Release

When the bandits finally consented to discuss terms of release, the following were some of the conditions imposed:

"The enlistment of the bandits in the regular army; immunity from punishment for previous crimes and safety of lives guaranteed by the American legation, copies of guarantees being in both English and Chinese.

"Guarantee by the Honan military government that official ranks would be bestowed and lives protected after enlistment.

"The issue of a presidential mandate, guaranteeing immunity from punishment both by civil and military officers, for previous crimes.

When soldiers began to surround the bandits, the latter induced their captives to write begging that the soldiers not interfere for fear the Americans would be killed.

During the fight, Kyle was separated from Purcell and Wu. The guard over Purcell and Wu was persuaded to throw away his gun and ammunition and go with them. Thus they returned to Yeh-sien.

Kyle Stood Trip Well

Purcell's story as told in the Shanghai newspaper, concludes:

"Mr. Purcell said that Kyle had stood the trip wonderfully well, but that continued imprisonment under those conditions would be a terrible strain on his nerves and exposure to unsanitary conditions is liable to cause sickness which a man of Kyle's age could not well weather.

"He spoke in high praise of the strength and bravery with which Kyle faced the situation from the very beginning, but said that the terrible experiences some through every day were already beginning to tell on him when last seen. He did not have strength to stand the daily trips over the mountains and at the first opportunity would drop down to rest or sleep. The highly strung nervous condition of both Purcell and Wu after their escape would give one an idea of the condition of Kyle after these added days of loneliness and continued imprisonment."

POPE EXPECTED TO TRY PEACE FEELER

Offer of Mediation Expected to Be Made With Possible Cooperation of Neutrals.

London, May 1.—(I. N. S.)—Pope Benedict intends to put out another peace feeler to all belligerents, containing a concrete offer of mediation with the possible cooperation of neutrals, according to a wireless message from The Hague, giving Cologne newspapers as authority for the statement.

The dispatch added that the information of the pope's contemplated offer was received sympathetically in Berlin. The peace feeler, it was stated, would be put out about Whitsuntide. (Whitsuntide begins on Sunday, May 26, and lasts until the following Wednesday.)

Regarded German Propaganda

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Henry E. Duke, Secretary for Ireland

London, May 1.—(I. N. S.)—The Right Hon. Henry E. Duke, former secretary for Ireland, has been appointed a lord justice of the appeal court. It was learned today. Lord Justice Swinfen Eady has been appointed master of the rolls.

Twelfth District Fills Quota

San Francisco, May 1.—(U. P.)—The Twelfth federal reserve district has "apparently" subscribed its minimum quota in the third Liberty loan, according to an announcement by Campaign Manager George K. Weeks today.

The smallest amount on which the district could pass muster is \$210,000,000. Last night the federal reserve bank had received \$194,950,000. Besides this about \$15,000,000 is en route to headquarters from various parts of the district. Weeks figured the total subscriptions to date at \$210,283,950. However, four districts in the United States were ahead of the Twelfth in subscribing their minimum quotas.

Oregon is still ahead of the six other states of the district both in subscriptions and number of honor flags awarded.

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Girl Forced to Wed By Father, She Says

Salem, May 1.—While fleeing to her mother from her husband, Rosa Damasco, a young Italian woman, was arrested by local police officers when she arrived in Salem Tuesday from Sisson, Cal. A charge of larceny was preferred against her by her husband at Sisson.

She said she was living with her father in Sisson when he recently compelled her to marry the man, whom she did not like. Her mother, who lives in Salem, urged the girl to come to her. She found an opportunity to slip away, taking only a few personal belongings and a small revolver in a satchel. It is in connection with the taking of the revolver that the larceny charge is preferred.

She was released on \$300 bail, awaiting the arrival of a California officer, who is expected today.

Polk County Youth With U. S. Force Dies

Dallas, Or., May 1.—Private Benjamin Hill, Company L, One Hundred Sixty-

second infantry, died of spinal meningitis in France, April 25, according to a telegram from the war department received by his father, A. Hill of Rickreall, Tuesday night. Hill is the first Oregon.

Polk county boy to die in foreign service. He was a veteran of the Mexican border service, where he served with the Dallas company of the old Third Oregon.
