

TWO GREAT CHICAGO NEWSPAPERS COMBINE UNDER ONE CONTROL

Herald Is Taken Over by Hearst and Arthur Brisbane Becomes Head of Editorial Staff.

Chicago, May 1.—The Chicago Herald was combined today with the Hearst morning paper here and will be issued hereafter as the Chicago Herald and Examiner. The paper will abandon the Herald plant, being issued from the Hearst building under the editorialship of Arthur Brisbane.

The announcement made by the Examiner says:

"The Examiner announces that there has been arranged a combination of the Chicago Examiner and the Chicago Herald."

"The newspaper thus combined, possessing the news franchises and service of the Associated Press, the International News Service, the United Press, the International Feature Service, the Newspaper Feature Service, the King Feature Service and the Keeley syndicate, supplemented by noted special correspondents at all important news centers, will dominate in the field of news, combining this unrivaled news service with the striking 'features' of both newspapers."

"The combined newspaper, of which publication begins tomorrow morning, will be known as the Chicago Herald and Examiner."

"The amalgamation of two great newspapers, making for still greater efficiency in news and other departments applies to both the daily and the Sunday editions."

"Consolidation in line with modern business and newspaper development offers opportunity for greater service to the public, simplifies the work of the news dealer in his distribution and concentrates the power of the business man in his announcements."

"Readers of the Herald will receive continuously from their news dealers and carriers and through the mails without interruption, the new and greater newspaper, the Chicago Herald and Examiner."

"The interests of the Examiner property will be represented in the new editorship by Arthur Brisbane."

"James Keeley has been invited abroad by two European governments for war work—to make certain investigation and report to the American people."

"Mr. Keeley will be absent from America for approximately three months. He will serve the Herald and Examiner in an advisory capacity, and it is hoped and expected that upon his return to this country Mr. Keeley will resume his work as editor."

"Mr. Brisbane and Mr. Keeley are experienced newspapermen. Combining the forces, facilities and all the properties of two great newspapers, in the new and greater newspaper—the Chicago Herald and Examiner, they should produce a publication of exceptional value in service to the city, state and nation."

HONORS FOR BOND QUOTA ARE OREGON'S

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—Oregon has subscribed 111 per cent of its quota, carrying away the honors for the Twelfth federal reserve district. Southern California is next highest, 95 per cent. The city of Portland has raised 117 per cent of its quota and Tacoma 101 per cent.

The largest over-subscription by any county of the district is Washington county, Washington, with a total of 600 per cent.

The honor flag total for the Twelfth federal reserve district was \$64, according to the announcement made at noon Tuesday.

Returns received to date indicate that the number of subscriptions for the third loan in the Twelfth federal reserve district will be at least 50 per cent in excess of the number for the second loan.

The state of Oregon already has reported \$9,500 subscribers, as compared with \$7,570 during the entire second campaign.

Nevada has reported 10,566, as compared with 7,660 for the second loan. Idaho has reported 49,572 as compared with 24,706 for the second loan.

Deputy Alexander Succeeds Sheriff

Hillsboro, Or., May 1.—Washington county court Tuesday appointed George Alexander as county sheriff to succeed former Sheriff Applegate, now serving a 10 day sentence in Multnomah county jail for violation of the deputy prohibition law.

Mr. Alexander, who has been a deputy sheriff for the past 18 months, will take the oath of office today.

Germans Approach City of Sebastopol

Zurich, May 1.—(U. P.)—The Germans are 40 miles from Sebastopol, the Vienna Reichspost announced Tuesday.

Sebastopol is an important port on the Black sea, on the tip of the Crimean peninsula, 200 miles southeast of Odessa.

Eighth German Loan Is \$3,690,000,000

Berlin, May 1.—(U. P.)—The N. S.—President Havenstein of the Reichsbank announced Tuesday that the subscriptions to the eighth German war loan amounted to \$3,690,000,000, exclusive of the subscriptions by troops on the front, which are not yet compiled.

PUBLIC RESPONSE TO REED COLLEGE CALL FOR FUNDS PROMPT

"War Work Begins at Home," Is Slogan of College Committee in Campaign.

So prompt has been the public response to the Reed college request for a \$50,000 fund to cover a budget, weighted with unforeseen war works which the institution has volunteered to undertake, that President W. T. Foster said the committee assisting him were enabled Tuesday to report total pledges of \$41,985. A balance of at least \$8,395 is required.

The college committee has adopted as a slogan "War Work Begins at Home," and in view of the many excellent works which have been assigned to the college staff it has been a simple matter to induce patriotic persons to see their chance for aiding in an important way.

The particular part of war work which the general of the United States has called upon the college to do makes a powerful appeal to humanitarian impulses.

In addition to the nearly \$10,000 still required to cover the college budget, which will hereafter be automatically taken care of by endowment properties and other permanent sources of income, a house for use during three summer months is needed. Such a house would be used as a hospital and clinic in connection with the training of reconstruction aides and for the treatment of wounded men and crippled children.

Costly Fire Sweeps Laskie Movie Plant

Los Angeles, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—Fire of a spectacular nature, originating, it is believed, in the color room, did \$100,000 damage to the plant of the Laskie Film corporation in Hollywood before it was gotten under control Tuesday evening. Only one of the 600 employees in the plant at the time was injured. Clyde Ewing, employed in the laboratory, fell 30 feet while fighting the flames, and was severely bruised. The plants units destroyed were the color building, electrical building, drapery and upholstery building, stock room and contents, purchasing office and the glass stage and eight property sets.

French Socialists Put Off May Event

Paris, May 1.—(U. P.)—The Socialist party has decided not to hold any May day demonstration, but to keep working. "We are now in the midst of a fresh, formidable offensive, by which German imperialism is seeking a crushing victory, similar to that gained on the east front," declares a manifesto issued by party leaders.

U. S. Steel Gives An Extra Dividend

New York, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—The United States Steel corporation Tuesday declared an extra dividend of 2 per cent on its common stock. Three months ago 3 per cent extra was ordered paid. The regular quarterly dividends of 1 1/4 per cent on the common and 1 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock also have been declared.

Government Nips Lumber Fraud Plot

Washington, May 1.—(U. P.)—Government officials are working on alleged frauds in securing lumber shipments in violation of the railroad embargo on nonessentials. Dealers are said to have obtained millions of dollars worth of lumber by faking names of army officials and through false order numbers.

Granges to Have Union Meeting

Warren, May 1.—Columbia County Pomona grange will be the guest of Yankton grange on Saturday. A livestock show with judging contests of thoroughbred stock will be the feature of the meeting. A large delegation from Warren will attend.

Payment in W. S. S. Opposed

Chicago, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—A fight is being made in various golf clubs here against paying the caddy in Thrift or War Savings Stamps. It is charged they need their earnings and should get the money.

Forest Grove Doctor Called

Forest Grove, Or., May 1.—Dr. H. R. Kauffman, who is being into training for service for Uncle Sam, has received orders to report at Fort Riley, Kan. He will enter the medical training camp there.

Irish Defense Funds Big

Dublin, May 1.—(U. P.)—The Irish "defense fund" probably now exceeds any similar fund ever collected here. Four towns sent in \$20,000.

Hanley Would Serve Government in War

Washington, May 1.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—William Hanley of Burns, Or., has volunteered as a "dollar a year man" to serve the government during the war. Accompanied by Representative Sinnott, he visited the department of agriculture Tuesday and tendered his services in any capacity where his knowledge of cattle growing and ranching will be of benefit. He has not received a final answer as to whether he will be placed.

S. P. & S. Asks Fare Increase

Washington, May 1.—The Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway has asked the interstate commerce commission to approve increases ranging from 40 to 50 cents in six months' excursion fares, from 25 to 50 cents in weekly round trips and an increase of \$2.50 in individual 5-trip commutation fares between Portland and points on its lines in Oregon and Washington.

Self-Convicted Army Veteran Ends Life

Washington, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—William D. Kramer, 57 years old, army veteran, committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid here Tuesday because he did not want to be "eating up a fighting soldier's rations."

A note found near his body in the bathroom of the soldier's home said: "I tried to get in the big shooting match, but failed because of age. I now find no valid reason for further eating a fighting soldier's rations."

Huns May Ask to Use Swiss Route

Washington, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—Germany will force Switzerland to abandon her neutrality if the Kaiser again is compelled to wage an offensive on the Italian front, a dispatch received here from Rome quotes German newspapers as saying.

The dispatch indicates that Germany, if her forces become engaged with the Italians, will demand use of Swiss territory to get them there.

Metal Price Bill Is Passed by 291 to 6

Washington, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—The administration's metal price bill, giving President Wilson price guaranteeing power, passed the house late Tuesday afternoon, 291 to 6.

The measure gives the president authority to guarantee a reasonable price for metals necessary in munitions making. It is also intended to stimulate war metal production. The house also voted to reduce the appropriation in the bill from \$50,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

Committee Named To Clear U. S. Ports

Washington, May 1.—(U. P.)—The United States shipping board Tuesday moved to eliminate port and harbor congestion by the appointment of a special committee of port, terminal and harbor improvement. Edward F. Carry, director of operations of the shipping board, was named chairman. Other members of the commission will be chosen from the army, navy, railroad administration and shipping interests.

Spring Wheat Estimate Higher

Washington, May 1.—(U. P.)—Spring wheat yields should increase 20 to 30 per cent over estimates recently made by the agriculture department, food administration telegraphic reports indicated Tuesday.

The winter wheat crop probably will be at least 140,000,000 bushels in excess of the forecast, officials stated.

GERMAN SPY CONFESSES MANY PLOTS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 1.—(U. P.)—Wilhelm von Linder Tuesday afternoon confessed to United States District Attorney Phillips of spy activities throughout the United States over a period of two years, during which he took numerous photographs of United States naval station barracks and other military establishments. To carry out his activities he had enlisted in the United States army and navy. He worked under the direction of the German embassy in Washington and gave the names of Captains Boyd and many other well known German agents in this country as directing his activities.

This man is now completing a year's sentence at Fort Leavenworth for desertion from the United States army.

Famous Airman of Austria Is Killed

Amsterdam, May 1.—(U. S. S.)—Lieutenant von Heller Schenach, most famous airman in the Austrian army, has been killed in action on the Italian front, said a dispatch received here Tuesday. He was brought down behind the Austrian lines.

Grain Ships to Sail For Holland Shortly

Difficulties Between Two Governments Concerning Proposal for Rationing Have Been Composed.

Washington, May 1.—(U. P.)—Announcement of the sailing of grain ships to Holland to be made shortly, indicates difficulties between the United States and The Netherlands governments concerning the proposal for rationing that country have been composed.

Officials are asking what effect this will have on relations between Holland and Germany.

It is expected that three United States ships, loaded with grain for Holland will sail in a few days. Their departure has been held up weeks because a corresponding number of ships did not leave Holland for the United States. Holland is reported now to be ready to make the exchange.

Warren Home Guard Is Being Outfitted

Warren, May 1.—The home guard, which consists of practically every resident of Warren between the ages of 16 and 60, is being outfitted with the regulation uniform. In connection with the organization a band is being organized under the leadership of Alpheus Wellborn. It is the intention to combine all the home guard companies in the county and have battalion drill once each month. All companies will be supplied with rifles and officers with sidearms. The officials of the county fair have offered prizes for the best drilled company in the county.
