New Offerings on Screen and Stage

Story of Russia Told in Film At Liberty

Disruption of Empire With Stirring Scenes of Romanoffs Is Shown.

THE true story of the disruption of the Russian empire, and the birth of Russian freedom and democracy is shown in Herbert Brenson's "The Fall of the Romanoffs," which opened today at the Liberty.

Its great strength is in its truth. With infinite pains Mr. Brenson has followed minutely every incident, every phase and every detail of the great drama as revealed to him by the monk Ilodor, a political refugee from Russia.

Ilodor, generally known as the Russian Monk, is the former confidant of Rasputin, upon whom rest the responsibility of the worst of the weak czar's crimes, his treachery, his dissipation and his tyranny. Rasputin was the uncrowned monarch of Russia. He was the real power behind the throne. Ilodor as his intimate friend and adviser was the one man in Russia who was in a position to know to what length this impostor's unscrupulous nature carried him.

In "The Fall of the Romanoffs," staged on a massive scale, replete with thrilling and historical incidents presented with typical Brenson skill and artistry, and containing enough action for any two photoplays, such questions as these are disposed of: Who was Rasputin? Where did he come from? How did he come to wield so powerful an influence over the czar and the royal family? How could he, a rough peasant, come to settle questions of state? How did he dare to interfere with the destinies of a nation by negotiating for a separate peace with Russia, he an ignorant moujik, who could not read or write correctly? How did he meet his doom? Who killed him and why? Was his influence over women as great as reputed? Did he really possess hypnotic power, and was he as evil as he is made him? The answers to all these questions are contained in "The Fall of the Romanoffs."

High Heels Evil Demonstrated In Movie.

Absurdity of Wearing Shoes That Cause Deformity and Lameness Illustrated.

"WE TOLD you so, but you never believed us." That is what physicians all over the country are saying. For many years they have been vainly trying to bring home to women the absurdity of wearing high heels, and this unhygienic and esthetic fashion continues as popular as ever.

Several years ago Dr. Dagon enumerated the sufferings which these stilts inflict upon their wearers. Initial pain develops into slight lameness, which increases until the shortest walk is quite impossible. The muscular action, the orientation and the mutual relationships between the elaborately articulated members of the human foot are thrown out of gear. The tibia is forced backward, there is a tendency to bend the knee, and in order to maintain the center of gravity within the area of support it is necessary to throw the upper part of the trunk backward, exaggerating the curve of the spine and causing the abdomen to protrude.

Maude Made Hit From Start In America

New York Insisted on Continuance of "Grumpy" for Year and Demand Return Date.

THE success of Cyril Maude's "Grumpy" in this country sounds more like a press agent's advance enthusiasm than like the recounting of actual facts.

Until three years ago Mr. Maude had confined his stage career exclusively to England, and in fact made the major number of his appearances in London, where for the past 15 years he has controlled his own theatres and made his own productions.

His first American tour, as planned, was to include a short season in New York and visits to a few of the larger cities of the eastern part of the country, but fate had written differently and the third week of his engagement, at Wallack's, New York, saw the production of "Grumpy" and at the same time witnessed one of the most substantial successes that Broadway had known for a decade.

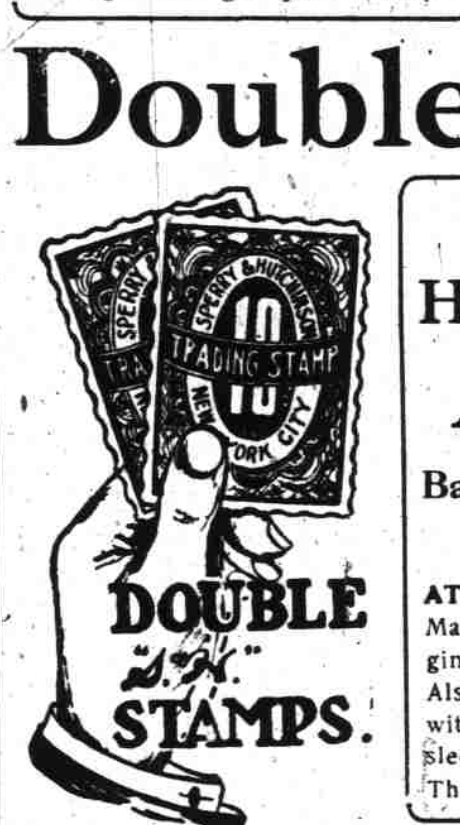
The tremendous appeal of his lovable "Grumpy" characterisation caused Manhattan theatregoers to clamor for the continuance of that play. Consequently other productions contemplated by Mr. Maude were abandoned, his road tour, and later London engagements, were cancelled, and "Grumpy" ran the year at the house of its first production.

The following May saw Mr. Maude back in London, at the New Theatre, where the charming comedy was accorded the same praise that had been its portion on this side of the Atlantic. Two years ago Mr. Maude returned to the United States and played practically the entire season in Boston and Chicago. So insistent was New York's demand for more "Grumpy" performances that Mr. Maude opened last season by playing a limited engagement at the Empire theatre, where he appeared before a succession of capacity audiences. This year he is on his fourth "Grumpy" tour.
