Washington, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—To enlarge its reservoir of draftable men, the war department may soon hold a registration every three months instead of only once a year. Provost Marshal General Crowder has given this information to the house military committee explaining that the annual class of men becoming 21 would thus become available for service more quickly.

Committee members were impressed favorably with the plan. Representative Caldwell of New York, Democrat, suggested that the department go still further and require every man to register on his twenty-first birthday.

Crowder said he did not think the registration of all from 21 to 40 immediately necessary, although he admitted that his department had prepared itself for such a situation if congress should act.

Representative Kahn of California strongly urged extension of registration

to these ages. He said the 2,000,000 men available within the present age limits are wholly inadequate.

While the committee approved Crowder's general plans, he was raked over the coals vigorously for alleged favoritism in granting sons of influential and wealthy men exemption or deferred classification.

The names of Nelson Morris, son of the Chicago meat packer, and of Robert Scripps, son of a publisher of a string of newspapers and a news association, were discussed for more than an hour. Representatives Anthony of Kansas, Gordon of Ohio and Lunn of New York demanded a full explanation of why these men had been given deferred classification.

Crowder said they had received precisely the same treatment as all other young men, regardless of wealth. On further questioning, he said, Scripps presented papers which stated that he was an expert in news "essential to maintaining interest in the war," and Morris was an "expert in refrigeration."

"Does refrigeration mean the same as cold feet?" asked Representative Lunn of New York.

Crowder replied that Morris' services as an expert would not bring him a commission and that he is still subject to the draft.

He denied most emphatically that the president or any official in an administration or a political position had acted in either the Scripps or Morris matter.

BRITISH SINK SHIP IN HARBOR AT OSTEND

with explosives and through the planting of bombs by a boarding party.

The raid on Ostend, however, was frustrated when a high wind dispelled the smoke screen protecting the British ships and permitted the German shore batteries to sink the blockade ships before they gained their objective.

One British destroyer, two motorboats and two launchers were lost at Zebrugge and the casualties were exceedingly heavy. In last night's attack, only one motor launch was sunk, the admiral said, and the British casualties were light.

French forces participated in the previous raid, Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty announced, and from semi-official sources it was announced Americans had also taken part. In the first surprise of the previous attack, the Germans at Zebrugge believed the raid was being conducted by Americans, the defenders of the mole shouting "The Americans! The Americans!"

Ostend is located on the North sea, eight miles east of Westend, where the battle line touches the coast. It is 61 miles from Dover and 115 miles from London. Zebrugge is 13 miles east of Ostend.

Both Ostend and Zebrugge and connected with Bruges, the principal German submarine base in Belgium, by canals. Bruges is 13 miles directly east of Ostend. Unlike Zebrugge, however, Ostend is not protected by a big armed mole such as defends the former city from the west and north. Two short jetties project out on both sides of the entrance to the channel.

The channel is about 100 meters wide and 500 meters long. At the point where it joins the canal there are several rocky basins on each side.

The town, which has a population of about 45,000, lies on the west side of the canal. The old citadel Vindictive, which was sunk last night in the Ostend channel, was the "Vindictive" of the previous raid on Zebrugge, and landed the boarding party on the mole. She was built in 1897 and had a displacement of 5750 tons. She was 320 feet long, had three funnels and carried a complement of 480 men. Her main battery consisted of 10 six-inch guns.

Naval Officials Elated

Washington, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—Naval officials here were highly about today when they learned of the latest exploit of the British navy. The bottling of the German submarine base at Ostend, following so closely the sealing up of the Zebrugge base, was considered one of the most spectacular features of the war. It was pointed out that in addition to strategic results obtained, the psychological effect upon Germany would of necessity be marked.

The British navy has been discounted continually by Germany and even held up to ridicule. But now that it has asserted itself in two brilliant exploits in less than a fortnight the effect is certain to be highly discouraging to the Germans.

Naval officials pointed out that the sacrifice of the Vindictive was inconsequential in comparison with the results obtained.

Wins Prize for Selling Bonds

PACIFIC NORTHWEST MUST GO ON COAL OR WOOD BASIS SHORTLY

Changes in Plants Imperative
Wherever Possible, No Matter
What Is Costs.

Northwestern industries now using fuel oil must convert their plants to operate on a wood or coal basis wherever possible, no matter what the cost. This is the decision of the government, made known in a telegram to Fred J. Holmes, fuel administrator of Oregon, sent by D. M. Folson of San Francisco, federal oil director for the Pacific coast.

The urgent need of tank steamers for war purposes on the Atlantic seaboard will necessitate large withdrawals of Pacific coast boats, wires Folson, and will compel curtailment of oil shipments to the Northwest from California.

The telegram reads: "Am advised by Requa (director of fuel oil division) that he proposes to withdraw a large number of tankers from Pacific service in six months. Urgent need of tank ships in Atlantic makes this action necessary. This will necessitate conversion of Northwest industries to coal wherever possible, regardless of cost. Please advise all oil consumers in your state who are unable to convert to coal to submit to this office before June 10 a full statement as to nature of business and reason making it impracticable for them to convert to other fuel within six months."

Priority lists will be issued and all consumers will be required to show the possibility of their substituting other fuel for oil, regardless of their position in the preferred list.

Cyclops Rumor Is Still Unverified

Washington, May 10.—(U. P.)—After 24 hours, no verification has come from the navy department quarters today of yesterday's report that the United States collier Cyclops was safe, following a mutiny of the crew.

Renewal of Drive Is Due

London, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—It is now believed that the German offensive expected by the British and the French will be aimed at St. Pol with the evident design of reducing the Arras salient, said a dispatch from Paris today, quoting the military expert of the Echo de Paris.

A renewal of the German drive is due to commence today or tomorrow, it was reported. Advances from Rotterdam said that the Germans were massing troops on the Flanders and Salter salient.

It is expected that there will be a resumption of the offensive in Italy before long. There are only a few German troops in the south, but the Austro-Hungarian staff is controlled by Prussians.

The Germans are attempting to develop initial successes faster because now the surprise element is eliminated and it is necessary for artillery of all calibers to follow the infantry closely.

The artillery activity on the Belgian front, which indicated a few days ago that the Germans were preparing for a blow against King Albert's gallant little army, has died down.

A report issued by the Belgian war office at Havre on Thursday night said:

"During the past 24 hours the enemy's

artillery has been inactive. Ours have been busy, however. Enemy aviators unsuccessfully bombed many of our communications. Our aviators have been very active in retaliation."

AIR ON BATTLEFRONT IS ALIVE WITH PLANES

With the British armies in France, May 10.—(U. P.)—The most amazing air fighting is going on in the entire battle region.

For three days the weather has been ideal and the pale blue skies are literally alive with fighting squadrons of all nations.

The late Baron Richthofen's famous "circus" with a new commander, a busy east of Amiens, where 35 or 40 enemy machines are trying to block the allied scouts from the back areas along the Somme.

The number of German machines is increasing and new battle tactics are being employed. The enemy is putting up an exceedingly stiff fight.

There is little ground fighting. The artillery keeps pounding heavily in spots. There was a terrific cannonade between 8:30 and midnight south of Arras on a single corps front, while the harassing fire was unusually bitter in the region of Lens, Bethune and Hazebrouck.

German Attack Repulsed

London, May 10.—(U. P.)—British and French troops have completely reestablished their position wherever possible, and Voormezele, Field Marshal Haig reported in his night statement.

Regarding this fighting, the German war office said that "south of Dickebusch Lake, our local attacks were completely successful."

On the east bank of the Yverbeek (which flows northward into Dickebusch Lake), we stormed enemy positions on a front of two kilometers (one and a quarter miles), the Berlin statement said. "An enemy attack on both sides of the Renninghelst-Kemmel road was repulsed and we took 675 prisoners."

Haig reported that the Germans launched two local attacks yesterday morning in the neighborhood of Albert and Bousincourt (three miles north and west of Albert). The attacks were completely broken down, he said, while the former resulted in the capture of their forward positions on a 150 yard front.

The French war office reported only "marked artillery activity on the Hallue-Montdidier front (which takes in both positions occupied by the Americans in the Amiens sector)."

Ships Show Battle Scars

Dover, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—Bodies have been brought ashore from some of the ships that took part in the raid on Ostend. The number of casualties is unknown. One or two of the vessels engaged show scars of battle.

Proposal Not Made To Colonel Leader

Military Instructor at University Denies That Plan Had Been Broached to Place Him in Charge of Organization.

After the press of the state has made much of the proposal to put Colonel John Leader of the Royal Irish Rifles and military instructor at the University of Oregon in charge of unified state home guard organization, that officer yesterday appeared with a denial that the plan had been broached to him.

It seems that Governor Withycombe has suggested making Colonel Leader the chief of Lane County's Home Guard organization, comprising a number of companies, but that no greater authority than that has been offered to him.

"The only foundation for the rumor that I had been offered command of the state home guard was the fact that Governor Withycombe did suggest that I take command of the Lane County Home Guard," Colonel Leader said yesterday.

Zebrugge Mole Bombed Says Berlin

Berlin, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—"On Thursday afternoon and evening, strong enemy air squadrons carried out bombing attacks against the mole at Zebrugge without causing damage of military importance," the war office announced today. "As a result of the bombs, a Zebrugge church was damaged and three Belgians were killed and four wounded. Three hostile airplanes were shot down."

The mole at Zebrugge is a long sea wall, built to keep shipping and from filling up the harbor.

British Artillery Pleases

London, May 10.—(U. P.)—Field Marshal Haig today issued a special order of the day, conveying his appreciation of the "splendid service rendered by the Royal artillery at all stages of the Somme and Ypres battles, despite the difficult conditions of a defensive fight against greatly superior numbers."

Brussels Filled With Troops

Havre, May 10.—(I. N. S.)—All of the barracks in Brussels are jammed with German troops, according to information reaching here today. There is the greatest activity towards the southwest. German wounded are arriving in Belgium by the thousands.

NO ROSE FESTIVAL TO BE STAGED; SHOW AND BIG FOURTH PLANNED

Decision Reached That War Time
Conditions Do Not Justify
Pageant.

Portland's annual Rose Festival will not be held this year, but instead, efforts will be centered in putting on a rose show of unusual proportions. If plans materialize, a Fourth of July celebration also will be featured as an expression of the patriotic zeal of the people.

Decision to dispense with the three days' fiesta was finally made by a special committee appointed by J. E. Werlein, president of the Rose Festival auxiliary, consisting of Ira L. Riggs, E. J. Jaeger, Dr. A. K. Higgs, D. N. Mosson, F. D. McFarland, Mrs. C. B. Simons, and A. C. Bigelow.

The committee went into all phases of the festival subject and, after learning the views of numbers of prominent men and women of the city, decided that war time conditions do not justify the expense of pageants.

Mr. Werlein will take up with Mayor Baker the proposition of holding a big Fourth of July celebration. It is Mr. Werlein's idea to have this observance adequate but not too expensive.

Guilty of Sedition: Gets Five Years

San Francisco, Cal., May 10.—(U. P.)—Federal Judge Dooling sentenced today Otto Janson, wealthy Oakland manufacturer, to five years in McNeil's island prison for violation of the espionage act.

Janson was born in the United States. He was accused of making seditious statements.

Japanese Captured After Exciting Run

Escaping From Officer He Dashes Through Car Window and Jumps 15 Feet to Water; Tries to Swallow Note.

Tacoma, May 10.—(U. P.)—A Japanese named Motary Araki is held in jail here today for investigation by federal officials, following a sensational attempt to escape from a purposing officer. Araki was arrested on the Milwaukee docks late Thursday by Special Officer

Leo Slatkowsky of the O. S. K. Line. While being taken on a steamer to police station, the Japanese suddenly arose and dived head foremost through a window. Without hesitation the officer did likewise, then a hot chase began.

The Japanese was gaining, as Slatkowsky commanded an automobile, overtaking the fleeing Oriental just as the latter reached the middle of the Eleventh street bridge. Araki leaped to the railing of the bridge and dropped to the water, 75 feet below. He was fished out by a man in a rowboat and finally landed in jail. Here he attempted to swallow a paper taken from his pocket. The document was rescued, but its contents were not divulged.
