Recent custom has made the second Sunday in May "Mether's Day" and the announcements that have been made would indicate that the day will be observed by more churches this than ever before. This day was originated by Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia in May, 1907. the second Sunday in May she invited a friend to her home to hold a quiet memorial service in honor of her mother. The reverance of this young woman was so well received that churches seized on the plan and now it is a widely recognized day, one that is growing in popularity every year. At the years passed the plan was broadened to include all mothers.






