WEATHER CONDITIONS High pressure prevails on the middle and north Pacific Coast and over most areas in the northern plains states and lower Mississippi valley, and off the New England coast. Elsewhere the pressure is moderate. The lowest readings being in Manitoba. Precipitation has occurred in the Mississippi, Ohio and lower Kansas valleys, the Lake region, Tennessee and the Gulf states, and locally in Wyoming. The temperature is below normal over almost the entire country, the greatest deficiency being in the upper Mississippi valley, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. Conditions are somewhat unsettled, but fair weather may be expected in Oregon and its vicinity tonight and Tuesday.

to punish the American aviators, the enemy planes are changing no combat except far behind the Boche lines.

On the Verdun front the Americans have been fighting a white and a yellow front. The German lines are apparently held. The Boches are receiving frequent bombardments of high explosives and gas for German troops.

In all sectors the enemy's outer positions, trenches and gas projectors have been badly damaged by the American artillery, without causing any reprisals from the Germans.

New Type of Shells Sent Over American patrols this morning penetrated the German wires in the Toul sector and found a number of German batteries in the advanced positions.

Shells heaved over by the German gas projectors recently are of a new type, now popularly designated as "tin cans."

Trick Falls on Doughboys The gas is a form of phosgene and is capable of spreading a dangerous vapor over an area of 50 yards.

Slav-German provinces deny such a possibility. One party desires to see the state consist of small sovereign principalities, each having a foreign policy of its own; the other demands a return to the German federation. The outcome is uncertain.

German War Lords Meet Paris, May 13.—(I. N. S.)—The German chancellor, Count von Hertling, and Foreign Minister von Kuehlmann, arrived this morning at the German headquarters in the field, where the kaiser has been since Thursday.

The chief topics of discussion were, besides the western offensive, the Russian peace, the situation in Austria-Hungary and the fate of the Russian electoral reform. The Boches are confident that the Prussian diet is believed certain when it comes up for the third reading tomorrow.

Dr. Erzberg, the centrist leader, has rallied about him the Socialists and demands the center of the government for support against the government.

Charles Would Expiate "Peace Letter" London, May 13.—(I. N. S.)—While it is announced that the conference of the Austrian and German emperors at German headquarters is to discuss Poland, the real purpose is to consider the opening of an Austro-Hungarian offensive in Italy simultaneously with the resumption of the German drive in France.

May 20 May Be Date Paris, May 13.—(I. N. S.)—The Gaulois says the general staff knows of 150 German divisions placed between the North sea and the Oise, as follows: Ten between Nieuport and Ypres, averaging two men to the yard; 40 between Ypres and LaBassee canal; 100 between LaBassee and the Oise, averaging six to the yard.

Shoots Boy Four Times Kansas City, Mo., May 13.—(I. N. S.)—B. H. Everman, a building contractor, this morning fired four bullets into the body of Robert Williams, 12 years old. The contractor justified the shooting by saying the boy was taking the milk from his porch. The boy is in a dangerous condition.
