

SOLUTION TO MEANS OF REACHING FIRE SOUGHT BY COUNCIL

Efforts to Reach Blaze Burning Underground in Garbage Dump Fail.

Solution of a subterranean garbage dump fire in a gulch at Hancock and Flint street, Albina district, which has been burning for more than two years, defying the efforts of the Portland fire department to extinguish it, was sought today by the city council and the department of city health and city engineer. The fire, with its attendant disagreeable smoke, is a source of annoyance to residents of the district.

The surface of the dump fire is about 75 by 100 feet. The fill is about 50 feet deep. For two years the fire has smoldered, from the seams of which the smoke issues. Three engines worked for a considerable time on the dump, but without effect, the water draining off before it had reached the vital spot. Blasting has been suggested as one means of gaining access to the furnace.

VOLUNTEER FIREMAN COSTLY

Breaks Windows, Causing More Damage Than Loss From Blaze.

Believing that he was aiding the fire department, which had been summoned, a volunteer fire fighter, on discovering a rubbish blaze at a residence at 91 Sixth street, owned by H. L. Pitcock, smashed with his foot every window which could reach, causing damage which will greatly exceed the loss from fire.

The blaze had been started by small boys who had entered the basement of the dwelling, where they built a bonfire. The boys fled after the fire got beyond their control. The man who discovered the blaze asked a neighbor to notify the fire department, then proceeded to smash in the windows. The fire damage is \$2.

Prosecution Is Sought

Enforcement of the new city ordinance which provides a heavy penalty for causing a building fire by throwing lighted cigarettes or other waste, was sought by the fire marshal in the case of a blaze at 245 East Broadway, early Friday morning. The fire department extinguished the blaze. The ordinance provides a fine of \$100 and imprisonment of not less than 30 days for those convicted.

other city employees in order to hold them in the service, for instance, was regarded as a necessary measure and supported.

On the other hand, free garbage collection, which included authority for a one mill tax, was apparently considered unnecessary at this time and at the same time a measure seemed to have effect.

The vote shows the unpopularity of the measures favoring the Portland railway, light, heat and power, and regulation and streetcar company exemption. Both are overwhelmingly defeated. The measure restoring jitney service was almost as strongly carried. The action of the voters on the city's financial measures indicates general approval. It had been felt by city officials that public study of the measures providing for adequate provision of bonds, the purpose of delinquent assessments and the transfer of balances would result in their being adopted. Apparently this study was made.

Earl Smith for Coroner

Thomas M. Hurlburt has defeated John Cook for sheriff.

Joseph W. Beveridge has won the nomination for county clerk over W. W. Hall.

Earl Smith has defeated Edward P. Smith and Richard J. Moore for coroner, and Sam B. Martin has won the nomination for county auditor.

The 13 nominees in the race for representatives in the state legislature are: Oron R. Richards, Joseph G. Richardson, P. O. Bonbrake, John B. Coffey, Herbert Gordon, Oscar W. Horne, O. W. Horne, H. L. Idemarr, E. K. Kubi, D. C. Lewis, E. L. McFarland and Dr. Charles E. Moore.

In Multnomah county David E. Lofgren has a lead over Dan E. Powers for joint representative, Multnomah and Clackamas counties, with little prospect for change from the returns in Clackamas county.
