

SEASIDE MECCA OF ODD FELLOWS

Grand Lodge of Oregon and Its Auxiliaries Begin Annual Sessions at Resort.

Seaside, Or., May 21.—The sixty-third annual session of the Oregon grand lodge of Odd Fellows, the forty-fourth annual session of the grand encampment of the Patriarchs Militant, the thirty-second annual session of the Daughters of Rebekah and the eighth annual session of the department council are being held in this city, and will continue until Thursday afternoon. A special train bearing fully 1000 delegates to the Odd Fellows and Rebekah grand lodges arrived in Seaside over the P., E. & S. road, from Portland, at 1:45 o'clock today, and the visitors were taken in charge by the local lodge and instructed as to rooms without a hitch in the arrangements of the reception committees.
