Then a move to send a representative to the Sound with the sole luty of constantly watching Portland shipments will be taken up.

The work of such a representative would be to prevent Portland goods from landing on the bottom of a pile in the congested docks and freight sheds of Seattle. Without such a person on the ground, it is pointed out. Portland goods, as well as those consigned to other ports, are often buried under the piles that quickly mount up under the congested conditions, and their delay is usually from a month to three months
