

OLD WILLAMETTE U. IS ARRANGING DATES FOR COMMENCEMENT WEEK

Exercises Will Begin With Baccalaureate Sermon on Sunday, June 2.

Willamette University, Salem, May 26.—The calendar for the coming commencement exercises is about completed. Beginning Sunday, June 2, the Rev. Thomas W. Lane, D. D., minister of Centenary Methodist Episcopal church, Portland, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon to the Kimball School of Theology.

Some of the other leading events of the season will be President H. J. Talbot's reception to students and friends of the School of Theology, June 2. The last chapel will be held with special exercises June 5. On Friday, June 7, Bishop Matthew Simpson, Hughes of Portland will deliver the commencement address for the Kimball school.

Two days later, June 9, Bishop Simpson will give the baccalaureate address to the College of Liberal Arts at the Sunday morning service and in the evening Rev. William Wallace Youngson, district superintendent of Portland will address the college Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. organizations and friends. The senior breakfast and the president's reception (given by Mrs. Doney and Dean Alden, as President Doney is in France) will be on June 10. Tuesday, June 11, is reserved for the meeting of the board of trustees, the students' picnic lunch, class day, presentation of class gift and the senior play.

Wednesday, June 12, will see the final exercises of the college year with the commencement address to the colleges of law, music and liberal arts by Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Oregonian, in the forenoon, and the alumni banquet in the evening.

Former students and friends outside of Salem are especially invited to any and all of these events.

Rev. Moran Made Special Chaplain

Eugene Clergyman Receives Appointment for Overseas Work, Making Third Pastor to Go From That City.

Eugene, May 30.—Rev. J. A. Moran, pastor of St. Mary's cathedral, has received his appointment as a special regimental chaplain with the overseas forces. He will be supported by the Knights of Columbus. Mr. Moran is the third Eugene pastor within the past nine months to take up war work. Rev. H. W. Davis, former pastor of the first Baptist church, has been in the Y. M. C. A. work since September and is now over there. William Moll Case, pastor of Central Presbyterian church, has been ordered to report to New York for a week's training in June and will then leave for overseas duty.

At least three other clergymen have volunteered for foreign service but have not been accepted as yet. They are: George H. Parkinson, pastor of the First Methodist church; H. B. Dorkes, pastor of the United Brethren church; and P. D. Curley, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church. Lieutenant Chris H. Jensen, of the Officers' Reserve corps, now on duty with the signal corps, was pastor of the First Christian church at Springfield when he entered the officers' training camp.

Body of Drowned Man Is Recovered

Eugene, Or., May 30.—The body of Oscar E. Brewster, who was drowned in Silt Coos Lake in Western Lane county a week ago, was found Wednesday, according to a message which was received by Marion Veach, county coroner. Brewster was drowned while freighting a boat load of brick up the lake from Ada station. The boat foundered and sank. No particulars were received as to where the body was found.

Professor Daniels Will View Eclipse

Head Master of Hill Military Academy, Well Known Astronomer, Will Represent School at Goldendale.

Professor John William Daniels, head master of Hill Military Academy, will represent his institution at Goldendale, Wash., on June 8 to witness the eclipse that will attract the attention of scientists from many colleges and schools.

Professor Daniels is an authority on astronomy and has written many interesting magazine articles on the subject. Some of his most notable work was in regard to the appearance of Halley's comet. He is a former regent of the University of Idaho and has been connected with some large eastern colleges. In addition to his distinguished work in astronomy, Professor Daniels is well versed in other sciences and is in direct charge of instruction in this branch at the academy.

PAQUET CONCRETE SHIPBUILDING PLANT IS INCORPORATED

Portland Company Capitalized at \$50,000 to Build Stone Ships After "Faith" Design.

Capitalized at \$50,000, the Paquet Concrete Shipbuilding company was incorporated in Portland on Wednesday with Joseph Paquet, Julius Black and George N. Black as the chief figures in the organization. The matter of establishing a yard here immediately was taken up with the shipping board at Washington, D. C., and the company requested permission to work out its plans with federal assistance in securing steel for re-enforcing.

The possibility of the establishment here of a government concrete shipbuilding plant has gone glimmering since it is definitely understood that the federal site investigation recently conducted in the Northwest was designed only to appease the desires of the several interested communities and that the government has already decided to locate its two coast plants at Oakland and San Diego, Cal. The Paquet company, which has contemplated incorporation for some time, is the possessor of the plans of the concrete steamer Faith, the largest stone hull yet launched, and announces that it will work out its own destinies on the designs of the Faith. The date of operation is dependent upon the assistance the company can get from the government.

Mr. Paquet of the new company is an experienced shipbuilder. G. N. Black is a member of the American Shipbuilding company, which has a plant under way at Warrenton, Or.

The Port of Portland commission Wednesday took up the matter of providing a concrete hull for the dredge Columbia and the possibility of building such a hull will be determined by a survey directed by Captains E. W. Shaver and J. W. Shaver of the commission. This contract and others are said to be available to the first concrete ship plant ready for operation in this district.

More Generals Are Vetoed by Pershing

Washington, May 30.—(U. P.)—That General Pershing vetoed other than Major General Leonard Wood's overseas assignment was learned here today. Four other prominent generals understood to be J. Franklin Bell, Hugh Scott, John F. Morrison, Thomas H. Barry—were said to have been slashed from his list of desirables for important command overseas.

As a result Bell was first assigned to the western department command, though physically fit for overseas work. Later, he was shifted to Camp Upton, N. Y. Scott was shunted to command Camp Dix and the others will not get overseas duty. It is understood. Wood is slated for active service and will not have to take up the San Francisco post. He may not see foreign duty, however.

Three of these men formerly were chiefs of staff of the army and as such ranking officers of the army. They are Scott, Wood and Bell. Barry was once assistant chief of staff.

Treat to Go to Italy

Washington, May 30.—(U. P.)—General Treat, former commander of the western department, has been selected as military attaché to Italy. It was learned today.

Epidemic in Spain Laid to Germans

Madrid, May 30.—(I. N. S.)—German sailors from the interned submarine U-39 are charged with releasing disease germs which caused the epidemic now sweeping the country. The poorer classes are deeply enraged at the Germans, whom they hold responsible for the pestilence. However, if the Germans were responsible they fell victims to their own actions, for all of the sailors on the U-39 are ill at Cartagena.

There are 120,000 sick in Madrid alone, including the king and Ministers Dato and Alba. It was stated at the palace that King Alfonso is showing no improvement. The malady is affecting livestock and thousands of cavalry horses have fallen victims to the plague.

East Side Club to Put on Carnival
Portland noncombatants who are unable to join in the war against Germany will have the privilege of "killing the kaiser" and going "over the top" at the summer carnival to be held at the central east side district, June 17 to 20, the city council having granted the request of the East Side Business Men's club to close the street area between East Tenth to Twelfth street and Hawthorne avenue to Salmon street. The carnival will present the usual attractions of side shows and music.

Tornado Sweeps Nebraska
Fairfield, Neb., May 30.—(U. P.)—This vicinity was visited by a damaging tornado between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning. At the Roy Ridgeway farm nine were injured, some seriously. Only the foundation of the house was left. All outbuildings were destroyed.

STATE WILL RECLAIM 46,000 ACRES LAND IN JORDAN VALLEY

Contract With Government Is Received by State Giving 29,500 Acres for Purpose.

Salem, May 30.—A copy of the contract between the state of Oregon and the United States, relating to the reclamation of 29,500 acres in the Jordan valley Carey act irrigation project, has been received by State Engineer Lewis.

The contract has been signed by the state and government officials. Under the contract the government grants to the state of Oregon, without charge, 29,500 acres of land in Malheur county along Jordan creek, on condition that the state under the provisions of the Carey act will reclaim the land and dispose of it to actual settlers in tracts of not more than 160 acres.

The state is ready to sign up a contract with Maney Brothers, large contractors, for the reclamation of the lands. Practically all the details have been settled. As private lands are intermingled with the public lands, the entire project will cover approximately 46,000 acres. The project is to be constructed in units. The lower unit, embracing 28,000 acres adjacent to the Owyhee river, is to be watered through the conduit of an 80 foot dam and the storage of 127,000 acre feet of water in Antelope reservoir, immediately above the land. A 20 mile canal of 640-second feet capacity will divert water from Jordan creek into this reservoir. Storage for the upper unit will be in Idaho and the construction of this unit will be deferred until proof is furnished that the water supply is ample.

The Jordan Valley Land & Water company has agreed to file a bond within 30 days after the receipt of the contract from the government in the sum of \$100,000 as a guarantee for the completion of the project. The state desert land board has allowed a lien of \$71 an acre on the land. Of that sum \$5 per acre is to be applied to the construction of roads and \$1 is to defray the administrative expense of the state.

White Temple Pastor Also Invited to Address High School Students at Corvallis; Will Take Rest at Newport.

Dr. William A. Waldo, pastor of the White Temple, has been invited by the faculty of Oregon Agricultural college to deliver the baccalaureate sermon for the college graduates Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock in the college chapel. Along with this invitation came another from the Corvallis high school officials requesting him to deliver a similar address to the high school graduates Sunday evening in the auditorium of the high school.

Monday evening Dr. Waldo will be a guest at the brotherhood banquet of the First Baptist church of Corvallis, where he will talk on "The Value of Men to the Kingdom of God." This banquet will be held at 6 o'clock. At 8 o'clock he will address a large mass meeting in the church. Following these services Dr. Waldo plans to take a trip to Newport for a few days' rest.

Turks Beg Kaiser To Sue for Peace

London, May 30.—(I. N. S.)—The sultan recently urged the Kaiser to moderate his ambitions and offer a reasonable peace appeal, but received no response, said a Central News dispatch from Rome. The sultan based his appeal on the deplorable conditions in Turkey, it was said.
