TODAY'S FORECASTS Portland and Vicinity—Tonight and Saturday, fair; westerly winds.
Oregon and Washington—Tonight and Satur-day, fair; moderate westerly winds.

WEATHER CONDITIONS A great low pressure area having its center in North Dakots covers the greater portion of the country. The pressure is moderately high in the Atlantic states and an important high pressure is central off the north Pacific coast. Precipitation has occurred from the Rocky Mountain states eastward to the upper Mississippi valley, and is reported from scattered places in the plains, southern Plateau and north Pacific states. The heaviest rainfall reported was 1.10 inches at St. Paul, Minn. The weather is much cooler on the north Pacific slope and in New Mexico and is much warmer in parts of Nevada, Montana and Illinois. Heavy frost is reported from eastern Oregon. The temperature is below normal in the Pacific and Plateau states and is generally above normal over the remainder of the country.


