TODAY'S FORECASTS

Portland and vicinity: Tonight and Sunday fair; variable winds.
Oregon: Tonight and Sunday fair; gentle showers near the coast; moderate winds mostly westerly.

WEATHER CONDITIONS

The most striking feature of today's map is a low pressure area having its center in Manitoba and reaching southward over the Plains States, the Mississippi Valley, and Lake region. The pressure is low also over the Southwest. Moderately high pressure prevails in the states south of the Ohio river and an important high pressure area over the north Pacific slope.

Precipitation has occurred on the north Atlantic coast and over an irregular area reaching from the extreme north Pacific coast eastward to Minnesota and thence southward to Texas. The weather is much cooler in the Rocky mountain and Plains states and is much warmer in the north Atlantic states and lower Lake region. The temperature is generally below normal over the western half of the United States and above normal over the eastern half. Killing frost is reported from Eastern Oregon and light frost from Southern Idaho.

Fair weather may be expected in Portland and its vicinity tonight and Sunday.

RAISIN BRANDY STILL FOUND IN OPERATION IN PHARMACY, CHARGE

J. H. Murphy, Proprietor of Harrison Pharmacy, Taken Into Custody.

The Harrison pharmacy, Sixth and Harrison streets, was raided this morning by Deputy Sheriffs George Hurlburt and Schirmer. Special Agent Geren and two federal agents and the proprietor, J. H. Murphy, was placed under arrest.

A still for producing raisin brandy was found in active operation, the officers reported. The still was found in the room, was held as witness. SUIT FOR CHILDREN IS LOST

Mrs. Inez Stanley Denied Custody of Her Three Minor Children.

A writ of habeas corpus, sought by Mrs. Inez Stanley, asking that custody of her three minor daughters, now held by the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, be restored to her, was denied by Circuit Judge Robert Tucker Friday afternoon.

The children, three girls, aged 9, 7 and 6, were given over to the custody of the society by the county court of Lane county as dependents.

No showing was made in the pleadings. Judge Tucker said, that gave him jurisdiction over the matter.

H. C. Bales, a motorcycle policeman, began suit in the circuit court this morning asking \$25,000 damages from the St. Charles hotel, and Charles D. Doty, a salesman, alleging that on November 3 he was run into by an automobile driven by Doty at Corbett Grover streets, receiving serious physical injuries.

Dan Cupid Losing in Race

During May 174 marriage licenses and 66 suits for divorce show Dan Cupid and family discord stand in the matrimonial race for the month, according to comparative figures compiled by County Clerk Beveridge.

In April 183 licenses were issued with only 77 divorce complaints filed. The divorce record for May is the highest of the current year.

Workers May Escape Jury Duty

Shipyard workers, who have been exempted for jury duty in the circuit court, will be excused if they can show that their services are actually needed by the government. Presiding Judge Morrow has announced. Fourteen have already been excused and a number of railroad workers have also been excused, he said.

J. F. MAHON, HARNEY COUNTY STOCK MAN, IS VICTIM OF DISEASE

Start as Ranch Hand at Age of 19 Leads to the Ownership of 7000 Acres of Land.

J. F. Mahon, 63, stockgrower and farmer of Anderson valley, Harney county, died at the Portland surgical hospital Friday at 1:30 p. m. after a three months' illness from cancer of the liver.

Mr. Mahon had been in Portland six weeks receiving medical treatment.

Mr. Mahon was a member of the B. P. O. E., the Oregon Consistory No. 1, Scottish Rite of Free Masonry and the Al Kader Temple of Portland. He was an active member of the Democratic party in Harney county and a close friend of ex-Governor Oswald West. Senator George E. Chamberlain, Will R. King, and the Phil Metcalf family of Portland.

Seven thousand acres of stock range and wheat land in Harney county were owned by Mr. Mahon and during the last few years he was said to be the largest taxpayer in the county. At one time he was engaged in raising horses and mules.

Mr. Mahon was born at Fayetteville, N. Y., in 1855, but set out alone for the West at the age of 19 to seek his fortune. When he reached California he hired out as a ranch hand until he got enough funds to farm for himself. He farmed successfully in California until 1879, when he came to Eastern Oregon and took up stock raising.

Mr. Mahon leaves a widow and three children—Ira Mahon, Anderson valley; Mrs. John J. McMahon, Omaha, Neb.; and Mrs. Claude Smith, Harney county.

Interment will be made at Burns under the auspices of the Masonic lodge.

FORMER HOOD RIVER MAN, MARSHAL PINEO, IS KILLED IN FRANCE

Brother at Camp Lewis Notified; Visits Home to Break the News.

Hood River, June 1.—Marshal Pineo, son of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Pineo of this city and a graduate of the Hood River high school, class of 1912, was killed in France on May 10, according to an official communication.

News of his death came first to his brother, Lieutenant H. D. W. Pineo, stationed at Camp Lewis. The latter came to Hood River to break the news to his father.

Marshal Pineo was 27 years old and had spent much of his life in Hood River. While attending high school here he took an active part in student activities and was business manager of the Mascot, the annual high school publication. After graduation he studied law and was engaged in the drug business at Victorville, B. C. Upon disposing of his business interests there he went to Frazier, B. C., where he purchased a drug store. About a year ago he enlisted in the Canadian medical corps and arrived in France just a month before his death. While details have not been received, it is believed that he was killed when the lines were bombed by German aviators last month.

Besides his parents he is survived by two brothers and three sisters.

J. L. Manion Is Now Serving in France

Assistant Surgeon in Medicine Reserve Corps, U. S. N., Writes to Friend Here Telling of His Travels.

J. L. Manion, assistant surgeon in the medical reserve corps, United States navy, son of Dr. Katherine Manion, and formerly examining surgeon with the local marine corps recruiting office in the Panama building, is now on duty in France with the naval aviation corps, according to a letter received from him by Lieutenant H. E. Potter, in charge of the marine recruiting station.

Mr. Manion wrote to Lieutenant Potter after seeing a picture in a Portland paper of the marines buying Liberty bonds. Mr. Manion is a graduate pilot of aircraft, having finished the Curtiss school at Newport News, before being sent to foreign fields. He was detailed as medical officer of the naval flying corps in September, 1917, and did duty as convoy in France. Last Christmas time he returned, only to receive orders to proceed immediately to London, from where he was transferred to France.

Turns Wedding Day To One of Tragedy

Keokuk, Iowa, June 1.—(U. P.)—Pansy Garrett, 20, and pretty, killed herself today by drinking carbolic acid a few hours before she was to have been married.

The prospective bridegroom was entering the room of his fiancée as she was drinking the poison. Objections on the part of the man's parents are said to have caused the annulment of the ceremony at the last moment and the girl's decision to end her life. She was recently divorced from a United States soldier to wed the man of her choice. She leaves a four-year-old son.

SENDING OF PATIENTS BY OUTSIDE CITIES TO PORTLAND PROTESTED

Commissioner Barbur Objects to Expense of Treatment and Care.

Commissioner Barbur voiced a strong protest at the meeting of the city council today against the plan of making the detention home for women the "goat" or cities outside Multnomah county in the matter of expense of treating and caring for the inmates. At the present time there are over 50 women at the detention home and more are being received daily.

According to a recent statement of Mayor Baker, however, outside points are privileged to send women patients here for treatment, providing the patients pay for the actual cost of the undertaking.

A proposition of enlarging the premises is now being considered. Chief of Police Johnson is now working on a plan to establish in a separate place a home for the treatment of men.

Commenting on the great amount of charitable and other similar work performed in Portland and Multnomah county each year, Commissioner Barbur declared that a plan of coordinating the efforts of the city and county, bringing them under one head, ought to be taken up.

IMPROVEMENT TO START

Grading of Marquam Gulch Playground to Begin at Once.

Dirt will soon begin to fly on the temporary municipal playground in Marquam gulch, in order that the retreat may be ready for the Fourth of July celebration which has already been planned in behalf of residents of the South Portland district. The city council let a grading contract to Nat Costanzo for the excavation of 60,000 yards of earth. He was the only bidder for the job and, according to Park Superintendent Keyser, he had to induce Costanzo to tackle the work. The council will pay for the work on the basis of 10 per cent plus the cost. Maximum pay for teams is \$8 a day; foremen, \$5; drivers, \$4, and laborers, \$3.75. The temporary park will be utilized in the general improvement plan for the playgrounds, which will be undertaken at a later date.

PROTEST AGAINST CLOSING

Shutting Up Street to Make Playground Said to Be Bad Policy.

Closing of a city street merely for the purpose of making the restricted traffic area a safe playground for children is bad policy and a precedent which, if established, could logically apply to any and all streets, is claimed by George S. Two performances, afternoon and evening, will be given on each day of the show's engagement here.

The circus is bigger than in previous years and an extra ring has been added to take care of the increased number of acts on the two-hour program. There are four rings, including the steel cage in which the wild-animal acts take place.

Word was received here today by a representative of the show that Miss Mabel Stark, who was painfully injured in a wrestling act with Rajah, a Royal Bengal tiger, at Walla Walla, Monday, has rejoined the show and will present her sensational act here.

Insane Man Takes Leave of Asylum

Salem, Or., June 1.—French L. Ewing escaped from the Oregon state hospital Friday afternoon while employed on the asylum grounds. He was committed from Multnomah county last March. Superintendent Steiner has notified Sheriff Hurlburt of Multnomah county of the escape.

Ewing is suffering from delusions. Imagining that he hears people talking about him and persecuting him. He is 38 years old and has no known relatives or friends.

It is thought Ewing was seen near Pratum last night.

Leland R. Burke Dies at Hospital

Camp Fremont, Cal., June 1.—(U. P.)—Private Leland R. Burke of Company B, 320th Signal Battalion, is dead at the base hospital here from pneumonia. He was born in Washington and was 22 years old. His mother is on her way here from Portland.

Enough Steel for All Purposes, Is Belief

Washington, June 1.—(U. P.)—The lesser essentials will get steel, a high official of the war industries indicated today when he declared that the needs of the government and the allies would probably take only 80 per cent or less of the steel output this year.

This statement was made following the address of J. P. Riegelle of the war industries board, to steel men in New York that the entire steel output would be needed.

This was taken to mean that the automobile industry, among others, would get a part of the surplus steel this year, for pleasure cars.
