# PIGEONS RECEIVING MILITARY TRAINING AT AMERICAN LAKE

Jimmy Dunn Visits Camp and Watches Work of Experts Under Lieutenant Delhauer.

Pigeons which have been inducted into military service at Camp Lewis are adopting themselves to camp discipline and training in a manner befitting their nationality, according to Jimmy Dunn. hurst. Five birds were trained recently for division problem seven miles from camp, Sergeant H. L. Roush informed Mr. Dunn, two of which made the distance in seven minutes, two in eight

RESIDENCE PROPERTY IN ALL PARTS OF CITY IS IN STRONG DEMAND

Inside Business Property Shows Little Activity; Money in Abundance.

Movement of Portland real estate, so far as inside business property is concerned, is practically at a standstill. Since the transfer of the Alisky building some two weeks ago there has been no sale of down-town property.

Those in close touch with the situation do not look for any strong movehigh price of labor are almost prohibitive of building operations except for absolutely essential purposes.

While there is plenty of money looking for investment, the pulse of the investor is cool, and only enterprises of proven merit are receiving favor. There is a tendency to hold up prospective construction for business purposes until after the war.

Residence Property Active Residence property in all parts of the city is decidedly active and there is a strong demand for moderate priced The buying spirit pervades the atmosphere and thousands of prosperous wage earners, a large percentage of them new residents of the city, are shopping for homes. This movement is gradually extending to higher class property and dealers look for several important transfers in the near future. When this larger movement gets well under way it is anticipated that there will develop a greater activity in the market for inside business property. Wakefield, Fries & Co. are negotiating for the construction of 25 moderate priced residences, as the first unit of a supply to meet the growing demand for houses of this character. Other firms have plans under way for the construction of homes in considerable numbers in various sections of the city.

Government Takes a Hand The federal government's housing plan for the shipbuilding industry is expected to come to the relief of the Portland situation. Realty dealers generally will welcome the construction of homes for workingmen by the government in the shippard districts. The tendency on the part of property owners has been to boost the price of their holdings unreasonably, say the dealers, and the easing of the situation by the operations of the federal housing commission would give a healthier tone to the mar-
