

PLANS TO DRAIN OVERFLOW LANDS TO BE DISCUSSED

First Annual Field Drainage Congress to Meet in This City on Tuesday Morning.

MANY PROJECTS TO COME UP
Peninsula Development, Sundial, Multnomah and Others Will Come Before Meetings.

Plans and methods of draining tide and overflow lands so that about 150,000 acres of land lying along the Oregon coast and the lower Columbia may be reclaimed for agricultural purposes, will be discussed at the first annual field meeting of the Oregon State Drainage association at the Imperial hotel, beginning tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Among other things, reports will be made on the progress of various projects now under way, such as the Peninsula development project, the Sundial project, Multnomah drainage district No. 1, and experts from O. A. C. and the department of agriculture will address the meeting on the financing of drainage projects and successful drainage districts. Samuel H. Brown, president of the Oregon Drainage association, will preside at the drainage program at 2 p. m.

Land Is Productive
Areas of land similar to those in Oregon are said to lie along the coast of Washington and other Northwest regions. These lands are located under favorable climatic conditions and have great potential fertility, but require dikes and pumping in some places to make agricultural development possible. In places where drainage has been provided it is said three to four tons of field peas and oats or clover and timothy have commonly been produced.

Delegates who can attend are asked to send their names to W. L. Powers, secretary of the State Drainage association, at the Imperial hotel, not later than the night of June 3, so that adequate transportation and room at the luncheon can be arranged.

Paderewski Legion Of Poles to Fight

Washington, June 3.—The Polish legion of 15,000 men recruited in the United States is to formally join the allied armies next Tuesday, according to word received here Sunday from France. The Poles will fight under their own flag, but will serve with French units. All of them are ineligible owing to age or lack of training to fight in the American armies. They are receiving only 5 cents a day, with small allowances for dependents. Ignace Paderewski, the Polish pianist, was instrumental in organizing the legion, and is still recruiting Poles in the United States and South America.

Wool Man of Echo Secures Big Clip

Echo, Or., June 3.—The largest wool deal of the season was completed Saturday, when Thomas Ross, Echo wool man, secured 350,000 pounds of the Echo clip for shipment on consignment to a Boston firm. Fourteen cars will be required to move this wool, which is only a portion of the spring clip from the Echo district. The wool is now being shipped east fast as cars can be sent in for loading. This consignment includes the crop of six of the large wool growers of the district.

Wasco County Enters Upon Wheatless Basis

The Dalles, Or., June 3.—Merchants and milling companies of Wasco county have gone on record to go voluntarily, upon a wheatless basis until July 1. This action has been taken in compliance with the government's request to do with as little or no wheat, if possible, until the next harvest.

BILL TO SET ASIDE BULL RUN O.-C. LAND SOON TO BE PASSED

McNary Measure to Protect Portland Water Supply Progresses Toward Law in Congress.

Washington, June 3.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Senator McNary's bill to cover Oregon and California grant lands within the Bull Run reserve in the Oregon national forest is expected to become a law within a short time. Representative McNary, who had a similar bill pending, has asked to have the McNary bill substituted, as that is the quickest way to secure action.

Under the terms of the Chamberlain Ferris act lands of the grant desired for watershed protection of different cities were directed to be withheld from entry or other disposal for two years. This period will expire on June 2, but no apprehension is felt that the failure of congress to act before that time will result in the opening of any of these lands.

The general land office understands the situation and does not intend to open such lands while legislation is pending. In the case of Ashland, where a specific provision for withholding lands of this character was included, the same rule has been applied, and the land wanted by the city will not be opened until congress has time to act.

HONEST MAN FOUND AND ACQUITTED BY MUNICIPAL JUDGE

Another Offender Fined \$47 for Going 47 Miles an Hour on Linnton Road.

Honesty won complete acquittal for G. R. Barker this morning in the municipal court. He was arrested Saturday night by Officer Horack for driving his car 32 miles per hour on the Linnton road. When he appeared in court he looked the officer in the face and said: "Officer, you're right. I was going faster than that." Judge Rossman turned and said: "I admire an honest man and therefore the case will be dismissed." Barker is a lumber salesman from Washington.

R. Gilmore, arrested by the same motorcycle officer for driving his car 47 miles per hour on the Linnton road, was fined \$47 and sentenced to one day in jail and held on a charge of investigation. When the detectives looked over the men arrested this morning they asserted that Gilmore answered the description of a man wanted for forgery by the Washington authorities. The motorcycle officer traveled 61 miles per hour for three miles before overtaking Gilmore.

St. J. Claridge endeavored to prove to the court this morning that the officer's speedometer was not correct, so the motorcycle officer tested it once. A written report was brought back showing that the officer's speedometer was one mile off, so Claridge was fined \$15 for driving his automobile 35 miles per hour on the Linnton road. Automobile drivers arrested by Officer Horack Saturday and Sunday paid \$165 in fines this morning.

700 Deaths in Spain Due to New Malady

London, June 3.—(I. N. S.)—There are now 100,000 persons in Madrid suffering from the strange malady which is sweeping the country, said a dispatch to the Times today. In the past 10 days there have been 100 deaths from the epidemic in Spain.

The mysterious plague which resembles influenza, has spread to Morocco, according to a dispatch received here today. The Spanish garrison there has become affected.

Table d'Hote Meals To Be Introduced

Washington, June 3.—(I. N. S.)—Table d'hote meals are to be introduced in hotels throughout the country as one means of simplifying the food consumption to produce more for the allies. This was announced by the food administration Sunday. Voluntary conservation, which will eliminate steaks and roast beef from the menu except two or three times a week and do away with nearly 100 other food items, is being extended to the hotels and restaurants.

Man Is Sought as Result of Stabbing

Portland police are seeking Dan Schullo, who is charged with stabbing Ike Redden Sunday night. According to the police, Schullo went to the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Redden at Thirtieth and Marshall streets, and a fight between the two men resulted. Mrs. Redden formerly was Mrs. Schullo. Redden was taken to the emergency hospital and a small knife wound in his side was dressed.

Lieutenant Baker Killed
San Francisco, June 3.—(I. N. S.)—News of the death in Italy, June 1, of Lieutenant Livingston Baker, prominent here, who was killed in a fall from an airplane, was contained in a cable received by his sister, Miss Marion Baker today.

CARS FORM SERIOUS PHASE OF BIG FUEL PROBLEM OF TODAY

Miss Durning Returns From Fuel Conference in Chicago, Where She Was Oregon Delegate.

"The car situation is the most serious phase of the fuel problem at the present time," asserted Miss Margaret S. Durning, executive secretary to Fuel Administrator Fred J. Holmes, who returned Sunday night from Chicago, where she has been attending the meeting of the International Railway Fuel association, held under the auspices of the United States Railroad association and the United States fuel administration to discuss the fuel problem and car situation.

"Situated as we are," continued Miss Durning, "we have no idea of the seriousness of the fuel question in other portions of the country. We have plenty of coal here, the only thing needed is cars to haul it out, and, unless we get the cars, suffering during the coming winter will be greater than it has ever been in the past."

Many suggestions were made at the conference for relieving the car shortage, but no definite action was taken. Addresses were made by many of the leading men of the country along the line of railroading and mining. Fuel administrators or their representatives from all over the country were present, as well as mine operators and their agents and officials from all the railroad companies.

"It was a wonderfully constructive meeting," said Miss Durning, Monday morning, "and gave me a more comprehensive idea of the real problems to be solved than I have ever had heretofore."

Among the speakers at the conference were P. B. Noyes, director of conservation; John P. White, former president of the United States Mine Workers, now handling the labor situation for the fuel administration; and Harry N. Taylor, vice president of the Central Coal & Coke company.

Miss Durning attended the conference as Fuel Administrator Holmes' official representative.

More Coal Needed This Year
Washington, June 3.—(U. P.)—Coal needs this year will be 100,000,000 tons in excess of production last year. Fuel Administrator Garfield estimated today.

Estimates of bituminous and anthracite coal for the year beginning April, 1918, are placed at 735,000,000 tons, the total production last year being about 635,000,000 tons.

Name Plate Stolen Off Janitor's Door

Many Other Petty Robberies Are Reported to Police, Largely in Apartment Houses in Various Parts of City.

Mr. Thompson reports that someone stole the janitor's name plate "right off the door and the name plate took several plants from the flower boxes in front of the building. Detectives are after the man who stole the janitor's name plate."

MINISTERS TO ASK FOR BIBLE STUDY IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Sunday Night Is Set Aside for Special Presentation of Bible for School Study.

Sunday night was set aside by the Portland Ministerial alliance at its final meeting of the season at the Y. W. C. A. auditorium this morning for a special presentation of the appeal of the Bible as worthy of recognition in the public school curriculum.

For some time, according to Rev. H. L. Cox, secretary of the alliance, ministers have felt that the study of the Bible in some way should not be entirely excluded, as is now done under the law.

To wit the sentiment of the people as a whole, Rev. Joshua Stansfield, pastor of the First Methodist church, proposed that the special appeal be presented in all churches.

The alliance elected these officers: Dr. Joshua Stansfield, president; Rev. Wilhelm Pettersen, pastor of the United Norwegian Lutheran church, vice president; Rev. L. C. Poor, secretary-treasurer.

J. E. Brockway, executive secretary of the boy scouts, replied to a complaint made by some ministers that the Sunday bibles of the scouts interfere with attendance at Sunday school and church.

He showed that it was part of the rules of the organization that no bibles should be undertaken before Sunday school and church unless regular Sunday school service was held on the trip.

Dr. Benjamin F. Battin, international organizer of the "World Alliance for International Friendship Through the Churches," spoke briefly of the organization of the alliance and urged attendance at the mass meeting at The Auditorium Tuesday at 8 p. m. when the moral aims of the war will be discussed.

200,000 Refugees Flock Into Paris

Paris, June 3.—(U. P.)—Nearly 200,000 refugees, mostly women and children, have arrived from the Marne districts and have been sent into Normandy and Brittany.

American motor trucks are aiding in transporting thousands of refugees from the city into the country districts to the northwest. The scenes at the stations are pathetic. Paris citizens meet the children and aged persons with gifts of food and clothing.

Schwab Will Visit Pacific Coast July 1

Seattle, June 3.—Charles M. Schwab, managing America's shipbuilding industry, is to visit Puget Sound July 1 to survey the shipbuilding situation in the Northwest, according to a telegram received here Sunday. Charles F. Pies, president of the shipping board, and Charles W. Cutbell, an attorney for the Emergency Fleet corporation, will accompany him.

Cadet Killed in Fall; Body Is Incinerated

Fort Worth, Texas, June 3.—(I. N. S.)—Cadet Harry J. Webster of Grand Rapids, Mich., was instantly killed today when his airplane fell to the ground. His body was incinerated after a fire broke out when his plane collided with one driven by Cadet Robert Cox, Cox, whose home is in Terre Haute, Ind., was not fatally burned.
