

EX-VICE PRESIDENT C. W. FAIRBANKS IS CALLED BY DEATH

Indiana Statesman Had Been Unconscious for 24 Hours Preceding Final Summons.

COMPLICATION OF TROUBLES

Critical Illness Had Endured for Three Weeks and Was Outgrowth of Nephritis.

Indianapolis, June 5.—(U. P.)—Charles Warren Fairbanks, former vice president of the United States, died at his home Tuesday night at 8:55 o'clock. The Indiana statesman had been unconscious for 24 hours preceding his death. All the members of the Fairbanks family, except a son, Major Richard Fairbanks, who is with the American army in France, were at the bedside.

The end came painlessly and followed closely the announcement Tuesday afternoon by Dr. J. A. McDonald, the attending physician, that the death of his distinguished patient was only a matter of a few hours.

The former vice president's death was due to a complication of troubles in the wake of nephritis. He had been critically ill for the last three weeks.

Charles Warren Fairbanks was a native of Ohio, but came to Indianapolis in 1874, shortly after his marriage to Miss Cornelia Cole, daughter of Judge P. B. Cole, of Marysville, Ohio.

Mr. Fairbanks was born on a farm near Unionville Centre, Union county, in May, 1852, being a son of Loreston M. and Mary A. (Smith) Fairbanks.

During his senior year young Fairbanks edited the Western Collegian, the college newspaper, and prior to his graduation he began the study of law. Early in 1874 he was admitted to the bar.

Soon after establishing himself in the practice of law in Indianapolis Mr. Fairbanks became an active factor in the welfare of the city and state. Although always an unwavering advocate of the doctrines of the Republican party, he never solicited to enter politics.

Mr. Fairbanks for many years shunned public life, preferring to devote his energies in a private way to the advancement of enterprises for public welfare and the improvement of conditions of general mankind.

He served as a trustee of Wesleyan, (O.) University for many years, and was an active director of the Consumers Gas company of Indianapolis, which eventually brought about a reduction in fuel rates of nearly 100 per cent.

In 1892 he was induced to accept the chairmanship of the Republican state convention and he delivered an address which was published as "The Campaign Keynote." In 1898 he was made the unanimous choice of the Republicans for United States Senator. He was a staunch supporter of William McKinley, and their friendship continued until McKinley's death.

In 1904 Mr. Fairbanks was elected to the vice presidency. In 1908 he was presented by his friends for the Republican presidential nomination and, although defeated, he was the only candidate who had behind him the solid support of his own state, besides which he received votes from a larger number of states than any other candidate except the nominee of the convention.

Five children, one daughter—who died several years ago—and four sons were born to Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Fairbanks. The latter died several years ago, was president of the Daughters of the American Revolution from 1901 to 1905 and was an influential factor in the affairs of the National Federation of Women's clubs and other organizations.

Tributes Are Paid.
Indianapolis, Ind., June 5.—(U. P.)—Tributes were paid to the memory of Charles Warren Fairbanks, former vice president, who died last night, by leading men of the nation today.

Messages of condolence were received from former Presidents Taft and Roosevelt, Charles E. Hughes and other leaders with whom Fairbanks was associated in political life.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed early today.

All immediate members of the family were at the bedside at the end except Major Richard Fairbanks, a son, who is with Pershing's expeditionary force in France. The other children are: Frederick of Pasadena, Cal.; Warren of Chicago and Mrs. J. W. Timmons of Indianapolis.

Klamath District To Assume Charges

Corporation Takes Over Construction and Drainage Charges Amounting to \$1,553,963.

Klamath Falls, Or., June 5.—Ratifying their decision made at a previous election several months ago, the members of the Klamath Water Users' association decided at the annual meeting on the adoption of the contract wherein the Klamath irrigation district, a public corporation, will assume the obligation to the United States for the construction and drainage charges heretofore borne by the Water Users' association. The construction charges amount to \$1,553,963. The following four directors were elected: O. T. Fitzpatrick, First district, Klamath Falls, term one year; A. L. Marshall, Poe Valley and Lost River district, term three years; G. W. Offield, Fourth district, Merrill and California, one director, term three years; Robert D. Cheyne, Fourth district, Klamath project at large, term one year. The Klamath Water Users' association will be dissolved as soon as its affairs can be legally closed.

Stage Route Opens
Klamath Falls, Or., June 5.—The re-establishment of a stage mail route between this city and Keno, Or., 19 miles, is announced by Postmaster Dail today. This route was discontinued at the advent of the Southern Pacific railroad nine years ago. The contract for carrying the mail was awarded to Lee Doten of Keno and calls for daily delivery. The stage will leave Keno in the morning, arrive at Klamath Falls at noon and return in the afternoon, beginning July 1.

who has been master of the state grange for the past eight years, for reelection. Opposition to Spence is centering behind J. J. Johnson of Multnomah county.

Nominations were made this morning, but the election will not be held until 7:30 o'clock tonight.

The Benton county delegation introduced a resolution demanding that the state emergency fund be authorized to the emergency appropriation of \$10,000 for the state line board.

All resolutions were referred to the resolutions committee for consideration and report before coming before the grange for action.

Substitute Prices Urged
A resolution was introduced urging congress to pass a law controlling the price of wheat substitutes and of finished products which must be purchased for the farm.

Mrs. Minnie Bond, state lecturer for the grange, submitted a report in which she gave statistics on the patriotic work of granges. She said:

"Thirty per cent of the granges reporting have purchased, as an organization, Liberty bonds of from \$50 to \$250.

"Twenty-five per cent of the members of families have purchased Liberty bonds.

"An average of two and one-half members from each grange reporting are now serving their country in the army and navy.

"An average of three families in each grange have given sons for the cause of democracy.

"Fifty per cent of the granges have organized Red Cross auxiliaries.

"One hundred per cent of the members are observing rules in food conservation.

"Seventy-five per cent of granges are purchasing Thrift Stamps.

Grangers' Loyalty Is Shown
"One hundred per cent of the members are observing rules in food conservation.

"Thirty-four per cent of the granges report shortage of labor, estimated at from 10 to 75 per cent.

"Seventy-six per cent of the granges have sent from one to 20 men to work in mills, factories and shipyards.

"On the above basis it will be readily observed that the granges of Oregon have about 600 of their young men serving in the army and navy, and about 600 working in shipyards, mills and factories, thus the farming industry, as far as the grange is concerned, has lost at least 1200 laborers.

"In many instances reports indicated that, with the help of women and children and neighbors exchanging work, it would be possible to get harvesting done."

PASS CREEK CANYON WILL GIVE BUT LITTLE TROUBLE THIS YEAR

Assistant Highway Engineer McCloud Inspects Grading and Approves Work.

Roseburg, June 5.—Assistant State Highway Engineer J. C. McCloud arrived here from Portland after an inspection of the improvement work being done on the Pacific highway through Pass Creek canyon. The greater part of the grading on sections of the road through Pass Creek canyon is nearing completion, and McCloud says that no further trouble from that section of the highway will be feared the remainder of this season. He will remain in this section of the state for the rest of the season and inspect the work being done from here south.

At Tillamook there are two bridges under construction over the South Umpqua river and the work of grading on the west side of the river is being rushed as fast as possible. This new section of the highway will eliminate the dreaded Roberts mountain, where several accidents have happened. The new road will have almost a water grade from this point to Ridge, a distance of 30 miles, and will probably be opened for travel late this fall. There are hundreds of tourists passing through this section now and all report the roads good and have encountered comparatively little, if any, trouble through Southern Oregon.

Boys of Eugene May Help Gather Fruit

Local Y. M. C. A. Plans Summer Camp on Goodpasture Island for Youth Between 14 to 18 Years, Strict Supervision.

Eugene, June 5.—There will be from 50 to 75 boys from 14 to 18 years of age in camp on Goodpasture island north of Eugene picking berries this summer. If the plans of the local Y. M. C. A. work out.

The local boy's secretary, acting with Paul Newmeyer, assistant state agent of the boys' working reserve, conferred with J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association and it was found that there will be work for 150 extra pickers during the berry and cherry season.

The boys will be under the direct charge of a manager and will be under strict control. The government will have nothing to do with sending out boys unless the Y. M. C. A. takes charge of the camps. Mr. Newmeyer said.
