

DRY LAW VIOLATORS ARRESTED IN MAY IN PORTLAND NUMBER 43

Two, Convicted for Third Time,
Sentenced to Two-Year
County Jail Terms.

Forty-three violators of the prohibition law were arrested during May by officers of the war emergency squad, according to the report of Lieutenant Thatcher to Chief of Police Johnson. From the 43, over 350 quarts of whiskey were seized and confiscated. The squad arrested a total of 306 persons and jail sentences imposed upon them total 2016 days, and the fines total \$2724.54.

During the past month the officers of this squad have been doing special government work in conjunction with the military police in an effort to make Portland a clean place for soldiers from Vancouver to visit.

Two persons arrested last month were convicted the third time for violation of the prohibition law and were sentenced to two years in the county jail.

One noticeable feature of the May report is that but three persons were arrested on statutory charges of a serious nature. Other arrests made are: Fifty-one for being connected with a Chinese lottery game, \$1 for disorderly conduct, 3 for maintaining a nuisance, 2 with opium in their possession, 9 for selling opium, 58 for gambling, 3 for larceny and 2 for carrying concealed weapons. The other arrests include persons charged with having morphine in their possession, reckless driving, violation of the manhood ordinance, slacking, drunkenness and violation of the idlers' ordinance.

U. S. Wants 25,000 Doctors at Once

Need Is Imperative for 30,000 Medical
Men to Take Care of Army of 5,000,000
Men; Commissions Given.

The war department is calling for more doctors. Eighteen thousand are now enrolled in military service according to Dr. E. F. Tucker, member of the medical division of the State Council of Defense, but the need is for 25,000 at once. Portland is asked to furnish 10 medical men for the navy and 37 for the army.

Doctors enrolling are required to pass a physical and technical examination given by officers of the war department and no person over 55 years of age will be accepted, Dr. Tucker states. There should be at least one doctor with every 1000 men, Dr. Tucker believes, and with an army of 5,000,000 the government would require 30,000 doctors on that basis.

Medical officers are given commissions from first lieutenant to major, depending on their ability and experience.

The medical branch of the State Council of Defense has the following members: Dr. J. C. McCusker, Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie, Dr. E. F. Tucker, Dr. Boyden of Pendleton, Dr. C. L. Holt and Dr. H. J. Jeffers.

OREGON'S ARMENIAN RELIEF PLAN MAY BE MODEL FOR COUNTRY

Ben Selling, Head of Movement,
Is Asked to Tour East to
Tell Methods.

The Oregon plan for Armenian relief may be made a model for the nation. Ben Selling, head of the Oregon committee for Armenian relief, has been asked by the national committee to tour the East, as soon as the Oregon campaign is finished, telling how it was done here. J. J. Handsaker, manager of the campaign, will be transferred to another state. The Oregon campaign will be extended until the entire state has been covered county by county.

Dr. M. G. Papazian will begin a three weeks' campaign at Klamath Falls Friday. Nearly every Oregon community has responded generously and it appears that Oregon's quota of \$150,000 will be exceeded. The national committee has also asked for samples of literature used in the Oregon campaign and announces that it will make wide use of the "life saver" device originated by the Portland Ad club in connection with the national campaign in November.

Dr. Ward McHenry, pastor of the Mt. Tabor Presbyterian church, has been appointed Armenian relief secretary for Alaska in recognition of his services as assistant to Mr. Handsaker. He will sail for Juneau the last of July.

Campaigns for Armenian relief are under way in Harney and Tillamook counties. Three cablegrams, copies of which have been received by Mr. Handsaker, indicate the fearful conditions which the contributions to Armenian relief in this country are intended to relieve.

"Constantinople, May 3.—Our agents forced to curtail credits to women, many of whom die for lack of nourishing food. All centers plead earnestly for larger appropriations."

"Persia, May 9.—Dogs, dead animals, grass and even human beings are being eaten."

"Jerusalem, May 10.—Twenty thousand individuals being helped. Government transporting 1500 Armenian refugees Jerusalem to Port Said. Employment provided for all. Funds low."

Public Market to Get Good Delivery

Wells-Fargo Agent Promises to Take
Care of Perishable Goods and Will
Probably Establish Central Depot.

Salem, Or., June 5.—Prompt delivery service for perishable goods shipped by express to the public market in Portland will be maintained by the Wells Fargo Express company, according to assurances given the public service commission by A. H. Peterson, general agent for the express company. He offered an appeal to the commission and to C. A. Bigelow, city commissioner of Portland, for the incident complained of by Bigelow, which was the failure of the company to deliver packages to the market on the ground that express wagon drivers had been arrested for violating the traffic ordinance when making their deliveries. He says the solution of the difficulty probably will be the establishment of a central depot for the public market and make all deliveries there.

Brownsville Gets Train
Salem, Or., June 5.—The public service commission received notice today from the Southern Pacific advising that additional passenger train service had been restored to Brownsville.

Some time ago one of the passenger trains from Portland to Brownsville was discontinued, so far as the Brownsville end was concerned. The train reached Lebanon in the evening and laid overnight there, going out the following morning.

The train will now reach Brownsville in the evening and will leave on the return trip the following morning. This gives Brownsville two passenger trains daily.

Chain Letters Not Approved for Sale

National War Savings Committee An-
nounces That It Is Not Back of This
Method of Selling Stamps.

The United States treasury department sends out the following notice relative to the use of chain letters in the sale of War Savings Stamps: "Chain letters, which in the past have been used to get funds for worthy purposes and some unworthy ones, have been started by some enthusiastic workers for the sale of War Savings Stamps. The treasury department has officially disapproved their use and the national war savings committee wishes the public to understand that these letters were not instigated by the committee."

Since America entered the war the chain letter has been used with varying success by several patriotic organizations, but the stigma attached to this method of collecting funds on account of past abuses robs it of its efficacy in a great measure.
