Trouble Looms Ahead—Roy Gilmore paid his fine of \$47 for speeding and has served his one day in jail, and he has now been released to the Seattle authorities who hold a grand larceny warrant against him. Gilmore was arrested on the Linnton road Saturday night by Officer Hornek while driving his automobile 47 miles per hour. Detectives Feltner and Graves have been working on the case and they report that numerous complaints have been received against Gilmore since his arrest. The latest report is that he is alleged to have used the name of a wealthy Seattle coal dealer to buy auto supplies and that he sold the accessories after purchasing them nearby. When the Seattle officials are through with Gilmore the Mount Vernon, Wash., authorities want to try him on the charge of attempted larceny of an automobile from a dealer of that city.

Train Nearly Wrecked—Reports have reached police headquarters from the Union Pacific railroad stating that the western limited train, which was nearly wrecked Monday as it passed through Montavilla. The letter states that children are suspected of placing three iron bars and large rocks on the track. The engineer did not see the obstructions in time to stop, though the engine pushed the obstructions safely out of the way. The railroad department has asked that the police department take steps to prevent a recurrence of the incident.

G. E. HAMAKER HEADS
DEMOCRATIC COUNTY
CENTRAL COMMITTEE

John L. Day Steam-Rollers Opponent
and Is Named Chairman
of Republican Organization.

G. E. Hamaker and John L. Day will wield the gavel over the Democratic and Republican county central committees for the coming two years. Mr. Hamaker was elected chairman of the Democratic committee and Mr. Day the Republican committee at meetings held Tuesday night.

The election of Mr. Hamaker was a quiet and decorous event, unmarked by strife or tumult. There was but one candidate and he was elected by all the votes.

The election of Mr. Day was also more or less quiet, the main interruption being the protesting squeals of J. D. Abbott, who wanted to be county chairman, and Ferdinand E. Reed, Charlie Lockwood and a few others who conferred in the thought, emitted just before the Day steam roller hit them. After that there were more or less unanimous votes, cast to the roll of an extra heavy seismic ground swell.

The Abbott forces went to the meeting girded up for battle and with a plan to throw out the big bulk of the Day committeemen on the ground that they or various reasons were not qualified to serve. Ferdinand E. Reed, one member of the breedantial committee, was supposed to prepare the bomb, and did, but Mr. Day, who was presiding, pulled the fuse by not paying attention to Mr. Reed's report and letting the Day committeemen vote to adopt the Day credentials' committee report certifying that the Day boys were fully qualified.

It would have been a real interesting and not so harmonious meeting if Chairman Day had not rumbled his tank over every hostile political gun who started to shoot into the Day trenches.

When the time came to nominate and elect a chairman both Day and J. D. Abbott were placed in nomination. When the count had gone half through the precincts and the vote stood 39 for Abbott and 159 for Day, the Abbott warriors rose from the trenches with their hands up, yelled "kammer" and were interned for the remainder of the war.

The newly elected chairman was empowered to appoint an executive and campaign committee of 11 members, to be reported at the next meeting of the full committee. The chairman was also directed to appoint a special committee of five members which should be given the task of recommending candidates, for election by the committee to fill vacancies in various precincts of the county.

WIDE FIELD OPENING
FOR WOMEN WORKERS
AS RESULT OF WAR

City Employment Bureau Fills
Many Diversified Calls for
Feminine Help.

War drafts and the demand for skilled men in the industries are opening up a wide field for women workers according to the records of the public employment bureau at the city hall. The women workers are receiving more pay for their services than ever before and their entry into industries to take the places of men has demonstrated their fitness to fill the bill, it is said.

Among the more hazardous occupations in which the women have ventured is that of window washing. It is no uncommon sight now to see one of these intrepid adventurers, equipped with safety devices, clinging outside of a skyscraper. The washers wear the new-fangled "feminine" and the ease and assurance with which they perform their work is a surprise to many of the men folk.

Window washers get \$75 a month to start with. One firm has employed 10 women.

Shipyards Employ Some
Three women will, in another two or three years, be employed in considerable numbers at the local steel and wooden shipyards. In the prediction of some of the yard bosses, already they are being employed in small numbers at one of two of the wooden yards, where their work is confined to weaving oakum.

As elevator operators the women have "made good." In the past six weeks the bureau has placed eight of these operators in positions.

It is almost impossible to supply the demand for domestics in Portland. The ruling wage of \$40 a month does not tempt this class to any great extent.

In May the employment bureau for women filled 215 positions. The office is in charge of Mrs. C. M. Ryerson and Miss Maud Egan.

Continued demand for men in the various industries is indicated in the report of A. B. Brown, director of the employment bureau at 247 Davis street. During May, 6411 positions were filled on orders totaling 7719. The shipyards took 2173, 104 were placed on farms and 1855 were given general work.

Logging camps are calling for waitresses and a number of these positions.

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Additions to Salmon
Hatchery Planned

State Fish and Game Commission to Spend \$7000 on Klaskanine Plant, Which Is Devoted Solely to Salmon.

Enlargements to the Klaskanine fish hatchery, largest in the state and devoted entirely to the propagation of salmon, were promised on the departure Tuesday of Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton. Approximately \$7000 will be spent on improvements to the hatchery, the state fish and game commission has announced.

First work undertaken will be on a tract of land recently condemned at Olney. Additional feeding grounds will be established and improvements will be made to the present hatchery buildings and equipment. Master Fish Warden Clanton left Tuesday to take charge of the work.
