

CROWDER HIGH IN PRAISE OF WORK OF DRAFT BOARDS

Provost Marshal General Reviews Work Accomplished in Year in Which Law Has Been in Effect

1,595,708 MEN CALLED OUT

Ten Million Youths Examined and Availability for Service to Their Country Is Determined.

Yesterday, the first anniversary of registration day, Captain John Cullison, in charge of the selective service division of Adjutant General Williams' office, received a telegram from Provost Marshal General Crowder setting forth the accomplishments of the military draft.

It shows that a total of 1,595,708 men in the United States have responded to arms through the selective service law. The total furnished the army to June 1, 1918, was 1,303,354. This month's call throughout the nation is 292,354.

General Crowder's telegram is as follows:

Draft Boards Win Praise

"One year ago occurred the first registration for military purposes of the nation. The nation's youth, ten million men, responded in single day. This accomplishment was nothing short of marvelous. The task of utilizing this enormous force seemed unachievable."

"But the work of classification of this great mass of manpower in such a way as to permit of its organization and molding into an effective army was entrusted to 463 local boards and 156 district boards, constituting a force of nearly 15,000 of the leading citizens of every community, who, assisted in their work by more than 100,000 patriotic volunteers, have performed a work that challenges the attention and elicits the admiration of all our people."

All Are Ready for Summons

"We will pause today, while another million of our youths enter the lists, and survey the results of the year's work. Each registrant has been examined and his availability for military service has been determined. In other words these millions of men have been classified in such a manner that the nation may now call for them to come forward into the army."

"We call on the large number that will not be filled immediately, whether the number be such as may be filled by those who have been found to stand in the first rank of availability or so great that men standing in the second, third or fourth ranks of availability must go forward. In other words, all these millions of men who one year ago were an inert mass have become a mobile army. Each has found his place and each in his proper turn has marched or awaits the order to march."

Great Army Next to Camp

"These results could not have been accomplished except through the devoted and unselfish labor of patriots. The local and district boards have scored an unprecedented triumph and have earned the undying gratitude of the nation. Their achievement is one of the great successes of the war."

"They have already sent into camp, including those under orders for June mobilization, an army of more than 1,500,000 men. They have already produced as soldiers one man out of every six registrants and the world stands in profound astonishment as it views this accomplishment."

Much Work Yet to Be Done

Compensated poorly, if at all, except by the gratitude and affection of their neighbors and of the nation at large, the boards have labored incessantly through the enervating heat of last summer, only to find a still greater task awaiting their unceasing devotion throughout the rigors of the following winter. Then, having accomplished the classification, they found themselves confronted with the mobilization of millions of men, and accurately and promptly they have performed and are performing this labor. Much work yet remains.

"Today the new men of 21 are being registered and must be immediately classified. On the first of next month the local and district boards will be invested with the still further responsibility of

preventing idleness and of unproductive employment which is not effective to the nation in the emergency. Some boards will review their work and correct those inequalities which have been unavoidable in so tremendous an undertaking."

Nation Has Full Confidence

"The nation, however, with full confidence in the men who have performed these great tasks in the past, faces the future without foreboding. The splendid work of our local and district boards and of the other great volunteer army of assistants, has filled us with admiration."

"They have been tried and found true and so long as this war may last our people are happy in the complete assurance that this great organization will not fail the nation."

COUNTY ANSWERS U-BOAT RAIDERS

Deschutes Decides to Sell \$55,000 Over Allotment of War Savings Stamps.

Deschutes county has answered the German U-boat raiders on the Atlantic coast by a determination to sell \$55,000 more War Savings Stamps than the allotment for that county.

News of the undersea pirates destroying American vessels off the Maryland and New Jersey coasts was received in Bend Monday. That night the W. S. S. county committee met and surveyed the situation. Deschutes county had been allotted \$70,750 of stamps to be sold this year and the committee's statistics showed that about \$45,000 remain unsold and this was the sum expected of the county when the big drive of June 28 is held.

In view of the activity of the jackals of the sea, killing American men and women and sending liners, schooners and tankers to the bottom of the Atlantic, the committee concluded that Deschutes county can do better than raise a total of \$70,750. The committee unanimously agreed to go the allotment made by the state director \$55,000 better and set the mark for Deschutes county at \$125,000. Robert W. Sawyer, writing to the state headquarters, declared that the \$125,000 will be raised without doubt.

Whether the U-boats will have a similar effect on other W. S. S. county committees remains to be seen, but one result of the sea pirates on the Atlantic seaboard is a brisk demand for the War Savings Stamps in Portland in the past three days. School children report that they have had less difficulty in selling stamps since the submarines appeared than at any time for several weeks past.

Alleged Forger Arrested

Charges of forgery and larceny have been placed against Robert Reilly, a timekeeper at the Columbia River Ship-

building company, who was arrested Tuesday by Detectives Snow and Leonard. It is alleged that Reilly stole a \$70 check payable to T. S. Hawkins and a \$26 check payable to J. T. Parkinson and that he forged the names of the payees.

Sugar Cheaper Now Than Last August

During the first year of the war the United States consumed more than four million tons of sugar. The wholesale price of refined sugar in this country at the present time is \$7.30 per 100 pounds, as compared with \$9.15 last August. The regulated wholesale price of sugar in various foreign countries makes an interesting comparison:

An increase of 1 cent per pound in the price of sugar in the United States would take at least \$2,185,820 out of the pockets of American consumers in one year.

London, June 6.—(L. N. S.)—Giuseppe Petrinella, an Italian banker reputed to be worth \$50,000,000, whose brother was recently arrested charged with trading with the enemy, has committed suicide, said a Central News dispatch from Rome today.

STOCK SHOW AT UNION IS OPENED

Standards of Exhibits High and Attendance Big; Chariot Race Is a Feature of the Day.

Union, Or., June 6.—The first day of the Union stock show was fully up to former years in point of attendance and stock exhibits and in some respects was ahead of former years.

Stock Judge E. A. Trowbridge of Columbia, Mo., a man of national reputation as a judge of stock, is here and began the work of stock judging early Wednesday.

The afternoon program was largely given up to track events, including relay, Roman chariot, pony and other races.

The exciting chariot race was between the G. A. Smith and John Spain teams and was won by Spain in a fraction more than 59 seconds, with the Smith team just a fraction of a second behind. This was considered the best chariot race ever run on this track.

The showing of live stock includes draft, road and saddle stock from some of the leading breeders of Eastern Oregon, as well as some of the finest lots of racing stock ever shown here. Everything today indicates that Thursday will be a great day in point of attendance. The American Shorthorn Breeders' association has sent \$300 to be applied as prizes for Shorthorn stock, and the association and stockmen have raised the amount to \$900 for the same breed for prizes.

A plate glass window in the city is filled with trophies for the stock show, the finest lot ever offered by the association, and including several beautiful trophies donated by President Farrel of the O-V. R. & S. road and a fine cup by the Oregon Horse Breeders' association. Many other prizes are offered, as well as ribbons of a high class. The racing prizes are as liberal as in any previous year and attract horsemen from all over this part of the country.
