ASSAULTS OF ALLIES POUNDING HUNS BACK

(Continued from Page One)

"Between the Ourcq and the Marne, an attack carried out by French and American troops enabled us to advance four lines about one kilometer in the region of Neuilly-la-Poterie and Bus-sières," the French communiqué said. "We took 270 prisoners, including 10 officers." (This refers to the advance made by American marines northwest of Chateau-Thierry. Staff dispatches report an advance of two to four kilometers, on an eight kilometer front.)

Hun Reports Ignore Americans
French troops, aided by tanks, advanced their lines west of Longpont (nine miles southwest of Soissons). The Germans delivered a series of local attacks between Rheims and the Marne. They were completely checked at Champlait (five miles north of the river), but occupied Bligny (three miles north of Champlait). A British counter attack regained Bligny.

Southwest of St. Euphrase (two miles northeast of Bligny), the French recaptured ground which the Germans had gained during the morning.

The German war office continues to ignore the presence of Americans on the Marne front. Referring to the French and American gains, Berlin said:

"On the battle front there were local engagements northwest of Chateau-Thierry and on the Ardre river."

Germans Claim 55,000 Prisoners
The Germans claimed that since May 27 they have taken more than 55,000 prisoners, 856 cannons and more than 2000 machine guns.

Field Marshal Haig reported the repulse of enemy attacks in the neighborhood of Loere, on the northern edge of the Flanders front, by French troops.

Lively artillery fighting was reported on the Italian front.

In the Balkans there was mutual cannonading between Lake Dolan and the Cerna.

HUN RAIDERS MURDER FOLK OF COUNTRYSIDE

With the British Armies in France, June 7.—(U. P.)—The German emperor and the freebooters about him continue to regard formal treaties as "mere scraps of paper," according to a letter just found on a prisoner.

Furthermore, there is every indication that the Archbishop of Cologne was used as a tool when the pope requested that the allies be asked not to bomb German cities on Corpus Christi day.

A letter written by a Cologne resident to a relative in the east, essentially admitted there would be no Corpus Christi processions or Whit Sunday processions.

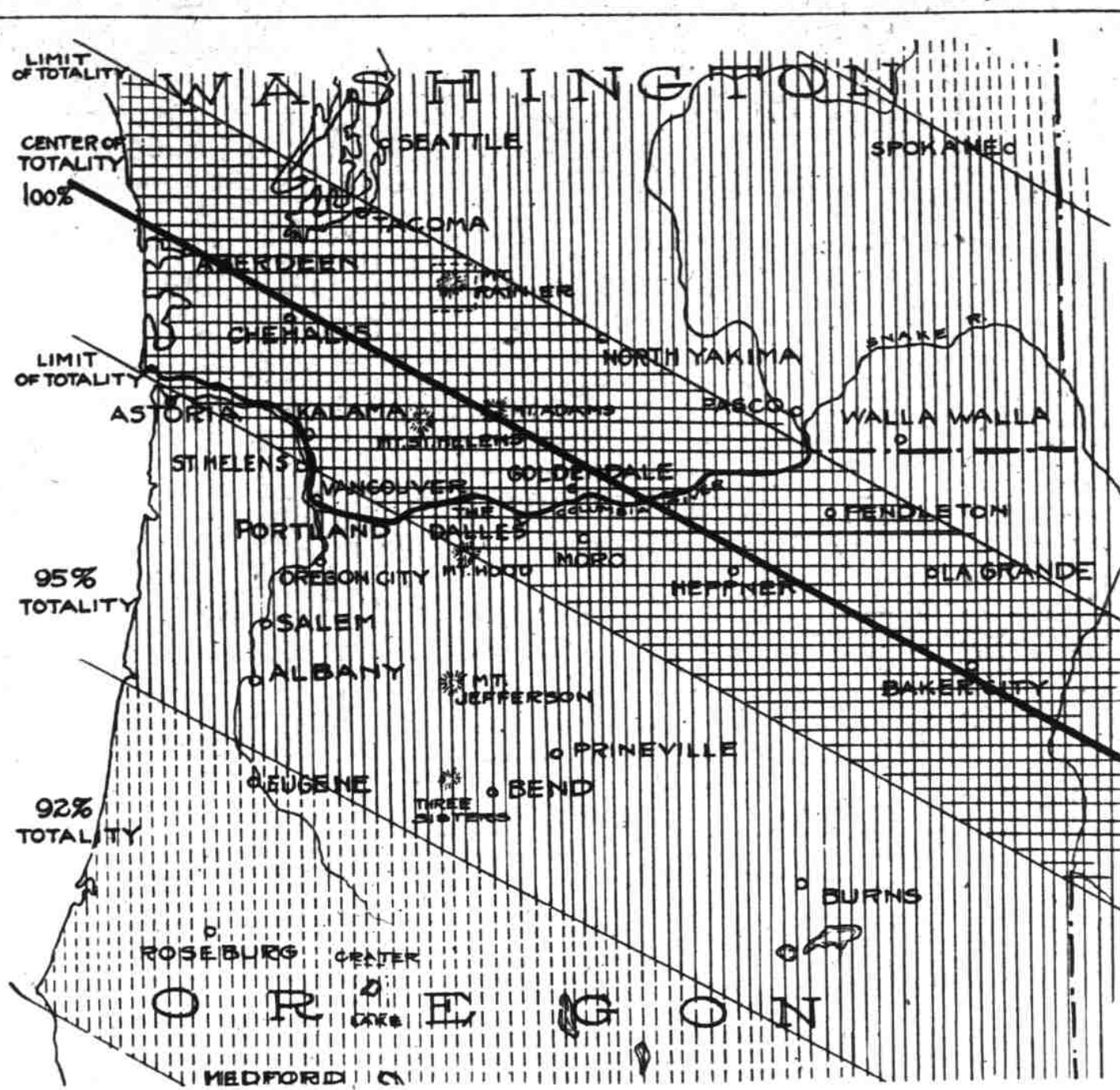

PATH OF TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN



The path of totality of the eclipse of the sun on Saturday is shown on the map by the parallel lines marked "limit of totality." Near the edge of these lines, just within the belt, the eclipse will have all the effects of totality that

will be seen in the center of the belt along the heavy black line, marked 100 per cent, the only difference being in duration of time. In the center of the belt, the sun will be totally obscured for about two minutes, varying in

length of time toward the edge of the belt, until near the limit of totality, the total eclipse will last but a small fraction of a minute.

The other lines shown on the map indicate the per cent of totality of the sun's eclipse.

Funeral services for Jefferson M. (Jeff) Thompson, veteran of the police department, were held Thursday afternoon at the Holman Undertaking establishment. Thompson was seized with quick consumption about two months ago. He left the department and went to Eastern Oregon for his health but died Sunday night in the Blue mountain region.

He joined the police department November 1, 1891. He was 56 years of age. Dr. Andrew J. Montgomery of the Portland Presbyterian church preached the funeral service and W. A. Burke of the Maccabees read an obituary. Those who survive are the widow, and two children, Clifford Thompson and Mrs. N. M. Jones. Interment was at Riverview cemetery.

A company of veteran police officers accompanied the body to the grave. Fellow officers were also pallbearers.

Samuel J. Mickley
The funeral of Samuel J. Mickley will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. from the Skewes chapel, Third and Columbia streets, under the auspices of the George Wright post, G. A. Wife of Colonel of Marines Ends Life

Mrs. C. C. Berryman Jumps to Death From Fire Escape on Eighth Floor of San Francisco Building.

Los Angeles, June 7.—(U. P.)—Colonel C. C. Berryman, United States marine corps, retired, early today recognized in the morgue the body of a woman who had leaped to death from a fire escape on the eighth floor of the Brack building late Thursday as that of his wife.

A clerk on the eighth floor of the building saw Mrs. Berryman's suicide preparations too late to stop her. Dropping a few notes with such words as "nerves," "headache," recorded thereon with pin punctures she went out to the railing and jumped. She was dead when picked up.
