

'QUICK' BREADS WILL BE PUT ON MARKET BY BAKERS OF PORTLAND

New Offering to Contain No
Yeast and at Least Two-Thirds
Flour Substitutes.

Portland bakers, not to let the housewives get ahead of them, agreed at a special meeting held Thursday at the Chamber of Commerce, to produce all the "quick" bread that the public will consume. The first offering of the new bread will be placed on the market Monday.

The new bread will be baked without yeast and will contain at least two thirds substitute flour, mainly corn meal. The baking will be done in pie tins and sold on paper plates, since the bread will be inclined to be crumbly, say the bakers.

At the beginning, one-pound plates of the "quick" bread will retail at 20 cents, the wholesale price being 15 cents, these prices being necessary, claim the bakers, because of higher cost of substitutes and the added expense in equipment and delivery. The bakers hope, however, that a large demand and lowering of the price of substitutes will later enable them to sell at a lower price. H. H. Haynes, chairman of the bakers' division of the food administration, expressed the hope that everyone wishing to conserve wheat will turn to the use of the new bread and overlook for the first few days any variance in appearance or texture, since the loaf is still in the experimental stage.

The quick breads will be inclined to harden the day after baking, and to restore the freshness, the housewife is advised to place a dampened cloth over the loaf and warm in the oven.

Confessed Assassin Ruins State's Case

New York, June 7.—(I. N. S.)—"I was a killer at \$75 a week, but once in a while the boss would slip me something extra—something for myself," Joseph Esposito, alias "John Henry," testified in court Thursday, that he was a hired assassin. He turned state's evidence in the trial of Giuseppe Terranova, for the murder of Joseph De Santis, a rival gambler, and Charles Lombardi. Terranova was accused of engaging four "killers" to rid himself of his rival, the slaying of Lombardi being an accident, Esposito claimed. At the conclusion of Esposito's amazing testimony, Judge Crane directed the jury to acquit Terranova, as the state's witnesses were reputed accomplices.

Suffrage Has Helped, Says Mrs. Pankhurst

New York, June 7.—(U. P.)—Working conditions of English women are greatly improved since suffrage has been granted them, Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, famous leader of the militant suffragists of England, declared here Thursday. Pay is better, she said.

E. Crimmins, one time noted Tammany leader. He will receive \$4000 a year allowance until he comes of age.

Japanese Deny Pact After War Desired

Tokio, June 7.—(U. P.)—Japan has never dreamed of an after-the-war pact with Germany, declare resolutions passed by the Shunjuikai, an organization of representatives of newspapers and news agencies in Tokio.

Japan will "adhere to the sensible Anglo-Japanese alliance," declared the resolutions, and will cooperate with the allies in the prosecution of the war against a common enemy.

The resolution was brought about by rumors that Japan might be looking forward to a post-bellum pact with Germany.

Fish Hatchery to Be Enlarged Soon

Astoria, Or., June 6.—State Fish Warden Clanton is here to inspect the Klaskan river salmon hatchery preparatory to extensive improvements. The fish commission recently expended over \$7000 in the purchase of new land to increase the capacity of the hatchery to 10,000,000 fish. Improvements will be made later to increase production to 20,000,000 fish annually.

During the past few days 2,000,000 salmon fry were liberated in various streams and there are 2,500,000 in ponds now awaiting liberation. The fisheries department is said to have enough early salmon in racks to guarantee securing not less than 50,000,000 eggs this fall.
