DECISION IN SEATTLE  
FISH MARKET CASE IS  
OF INTEREST LOCALLY

Case in Washington Court Along Lines Similar to That Now Pending Here.

A copy of the decision of Judge Everett Smith of the superior court of King county, Washington, wherein the right of the city of Seattle to conduct a municipal fish market was sustained, has been received by Deputy City Attorney H. M. Tomlinson, who is handling the suit now pending in the local courts to put the fish market run by the city of Portland.

Most respects the Seattle case is similar to the Portland issue and Deputy Tomlinson is confident that the local suit will end in a victory for the city. In the Seattle case complainant brought suit to enjoin the market. He appeared as a taxpayer and a private fish dealer. He contended that the municipality had no right under its charter to engage in the fish business and, further, that the market was working a personal injury to his own business.

Judge Smith held that the city was within its rights; that the war emergency made the market necessary, that the order of the federal food administration for the city was imperative and that the municipal market had been instrumental in obtaining a reduction in the cost of fish.

Mr. Tomlinson will file the city's answer to the suit pending here next week. He will endeavor to show that war emergencies make the municipal fish market a public necessity.

**IVAN DE MARCEL ARRESTED**  
Dancer's Answer to Draft Board Leads to Vagrancy Charge.

Ivan de Marcel, exponent of dancing, was arrested Friday on a vagrancy charge by Special Agent Walter F. Geren. Marcel was convicted recently in the municipal court on a charge of false advertising and fined \$100. He was in a recent letter to the officials of local draft board No. 2, Marcel claimed deferred classification and asked to be transferred from class 1A to class 5H on the ground of "moral unfitness" for military service. Under the latter classification Marcel would be exempt entirely from military service.

According to Mr. Geren, before a man can assert that he has his demand for a deferred classification as he had previously been passed as physically qualified. In default of \$500 bail on the vagrancy charge, Marcel is now held in the county jail.

**AUTOMOBILE OWNERS**  
ASKED TO TAKE MEN  
IN UNIFORM FOR RIDES

Two Hundred Needed by Y. M. C. A. Each Week and at Once as Boys Will Soon Leave.

Put a soldier or sailor in your automobile.

Two hundred automobile owners are wanted every week by the Y. M. C. A. to give the soldier and sailor boys a trip around the city or over the Columbia River highway before they leave for France.

"Last week," declares J. H. McCoy of the Y. M. C. A. secretarial force, "we sent out 80 men in automobiles and we had need of at least 120 more cars to care for the boys who were anxious to go, but had to spend their time walking the streets or sitting lonesomely and discontentedly around the lobby of the Y. M. C. A."

Many of these boys, according to Mr. McCoy, are from Eastern states, and unless they are given the opportunity now to see the city, and particularly the highway, they may never get to see it, as men are being removed from Vancouver constantly.

One boy writes Mr. McCoy from a cantonment: "I am seeking a little automobile ride for next Sunday if there is any chance. The Columbia River highway is the trip I would like before I sail for France."

Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays are the days the soldiers gather at the Y. M. C. A. Persons with automobiles should telephone the Y. M. C. A., stating the number of men they can take and the time they wish to leave. Mr. McCoy will provide the men and see that they meet the machine wherever the owner desires. If persons want to take out men from their old home states in the East, that can be arranged also.

"It is always better to telephone ahead than to call at the Y. M. C. A. unannounced," says Mr. McCoy. "If the boys know somebody is coming after them they will wait, otherwise they are apt to stray away."

The Y. M. C. A. also makes appointments for dinners for the boys in private homes.

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**U. OF O. DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE AWARDS TWENTY-ONE DECREES**

George Earl Fortmiller Wins Double Honors; All Seek to Serve Nation in War.

Twenty-one students of the University of Oregon College of Medicine were awarded the degree of doctor of medicine in the lecture hall of Central library Friday evening. The class was presented to President Campbell of the university by Dr. S. E. Joseph, dean of the medical school. The address to the class was made by Frederick V. Holman, Ph. B., whose subject was "The Relation of a Physician to the People." The music during the evening was rendered by an orchestra under the direction of George E. Jeffery.

The honors of the graduating class went to George Earl Fortmiller, who was awarded both the Saylor medal, for the highest scholarship during the four-year course, and the anatomy medal for the best work in that department. The presentation was made by Dr. Joseph, who commented upon the honors accompanying the winning of the medals.

Sixteen of the class have been made assistant surgeons in the United States naval reserves, three already on duty being awarded degrees in absentia. Those present were the uniforms of first lieutenants and will report for duty June 17. The other five members of the class have been awarded the honors of the class. Three were held up for physical reasons and the other two are women, who are not admitted to the navy.

**Bootlegger in Haste To Get Out of State**
