Elsewhere the pre-sure is low, the most important depression being central in western Canada. Precipitation has occurred on the north Pacific Coast and at a few places in the northern Plains region, upper Mississippi valley and New England. The temperature is above normal except over small areas east of the Mississippi river. The excess in temperature is most pronounced on the Pacific Coast, fair weather may be expected in Portland and its vicinity tonight. and Tuesday, with lower temperature tonight. 
