

NUNN AND ROSS RAISE MONEY BUT CANNOT USE IT THEMSELVES

Highway Commissioners Would
Buy Truck by Selling Junk;
State Fund Gets Cash.

Salem, Or., June 11.—State Highway Engineer Herbert Nunn and G. Ed Ross, secretary of the state highway commission, are resourceful, and particularly so when it comes of raising money to buy needed equipment for the highway department.

The department needed a new auto truck, but the highway engineer did not feel like buying it from the funds on hand. Anyway, he hit on a better scheme. While the price of a new truck, he would sell some old 16 pound rail-road rails which were on hand and unused and buy an auto truck with the proceeds.

The rails were purchased by the department three or four years ago when new at \$22.50 per 100 pounds. Secretary Ross took the matter of selling the rails up with several junk dealers and got a bid of \$40 per 100 pounds. At that price the rails would not bring enough to buy the truck.

So, between the manipulation of Ross and Nunn, the junk dealers got to bidding against each other for the rails, raising the next high bidder \$1 or 50 cents at a time, until the price offered was run up to \$62.50 and \$68. At that price the rails would net about \$5000, and they were sold.

Congratulating themselves on their cleverness, Nunn and Ross were about to pick out the new truck when they learned that the law requires all money obtained under such circumstances from the sale of state property to be turned into the general fund of the state. It could not be used by the state highway department.

So the dream of the new truck for the state highway department went glimmering, but at that the scheme was clever, as it netted the state \$5000, which will come in handy when the legislature meets next winter and begins to delve into the strong box of the state for funds to meet the high cost of government.

The fire burned only the old Smith saw-mill and the headquarters of the Overall laundry. The Portland Lumber company, the Klennan & Kern Shipbuilding plant and the Northwest Box factory were not burned by the fire. They were, however, in the danger zone.

Smith, executive manager for Oregon of the Third Liberty loan, officiated at the raising of the Oregon Liberty loan honor flag, has been promoted to the grade of first lieutenant in the 347th field artillery, Camp Lewis, according to word which has been received here.

Wedding Tour Ends; Coos Doctor Dies

North Bend, Or., June 11.—Dr. G. E. Anderson, prominent Coos physician, formerly of Portland, died here this morning of blood poisoning. He was married only a week ago to Miss Margaret Gill, a teacher in the North Bend schools. They started in their automobile on a wedding tour. Dr. Anderson had an infected finger and driving the machine irritated it and caused severe blood poisoning. He was brought home Saturday and death followed.

Jury Allows \$2500 In Playground Case

A jury in Circuit Judge Campbell's court returned a verdict against the city of Portland for \$2500 in favor of Camillo Cimoni in the condemnation suit begun by the city to acquire possession of the Cimoni property in Marquam gulch for playground purposes. The city valued the property, which consists of one lot and three small houses, at \$1500. Cimoni demanded \$5700.

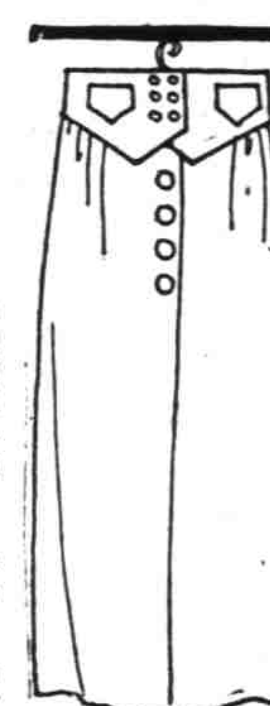
