

RUSSIA REALIZES POSITION, PLANS TO RESUME WAR

Nation Must Return to Fight or Go Under, Correspondent Comments After Close Study.

WORKERS TO ENTER ARMY

General Parsky, Formerly in Command at Riga, Outlines Plan to Be Used.

Stockholm, June 12.—(U. P.)—The action of the Bolsheviks in putting Moscow under martial law is probably due to the uncovering of a plot which was brewing when I left Russia, which aimed at the overthrow of the Bolsheviks by simultaneous uprisings in Moscow and Petrograd.

Prince Kropotkin, K. Savinkoff and a number of cadet party leaders were involved in the plot.
Plans for the formation of a Russian army of workmen and peasants were outlined to the United Press representative in a recent interview given by General Parsky, formerly commander of the Russian forces at Riga, but now military chief of the Petrograd district. "We are taking all measures possible for the defense of the country," he said, "as Germany can break the Brest-Litovsk peace treaty whenever she wishes. We have not yet fully developed a plan of training workmen and peasants, but in some places a tentative plan is in full operation."
"Universal military service is impossible at present. It will be possible only when order is restored. When the people are fully awakened and order has been re-established, we hope to organize effective resistance and regain Russia's sovereignty."
The new Red army is worthless and everybody in Petrograd realizes this. The return of Russia to the war is inevitable. Either this or Russia will become extinct. But before anything def-

inite can be done the Bolshevik must go, according to the opinion of most Russian observers. The moment the Bolsheviks go, a reunion of Ukraine and Russia is certain, a united front will be formed and the Brest-Litovsk treaty will be abrogated.

Sensational Exposures Promised
London, June 12.—(U. P.)—The forthcoming indictment of the ex-emperor of Russia by a Bolshevik tribunal promises big sensations, said a Petrograd dispatch to the Daily Express.
The Moscow soviet is busy collecting telegrams which the ex-emperor sent to European monarchs and to President Poincaré of France and it is reported that the erstwhile autocrat will be charged with entering into a verbal alliance with the Kaiser at a meeting in Potsdam palace against France and England.

The latest canard is that the former czar is at Riga and that the Germans are planning to restore him to power. The Russian bourgeois, it is reported, are awaiting the coming of the Romanoff dynasty in power again, "like a second Messiah."

Moscow Under Martial Law
Washington, June 12.—(U. P.)—Moscow is under martial law following the discovery of counter revolutionary movements there, said state department advisers Tuesday.

Wage Advance for Women in Effect

Minimum Figures Established and Hours of Labor Set by State Industrial Welfare Commission.

Minimum wage scale advances for women workers in mercantile, manufacturing and other classes of employment, adopted by the state industrial welfare commission, become effective today. The advances range from 25 to 30 per cent.
The mercantile employees' minimum is \$11.10 with a week of 50 hours. The minimum for apprentices is \$7.20 a week to \$9.60, according to classes. Employees of manufacturing, laundries and public service have a minimum of \$11.41 for a 54-hour week. Telephone and telegraph operators same as manufacturers; office work, \$48 a month, apprentice term one year; housekeeping minimum, \$1.61, with 54-hour week; maximum to be charged for board, \$3.20 a week, lodging \$1.60. This classification includes waitresses, attendants in ice cream stands, lunch places, chambermaids, janitresses, car cleaners and kitchen help.

FLAG DAY PARADE AND CELEBRATION WILL BE HELD FRIDAY EVENING

Elks Plan Interesting Patriotic Program; Flag Raising to Be Feature.

Headed by 1000 members of the Multnomah Guard, the big Flag day parade preceding Friday night's celebration at The Auditorium promises to be one of the spectacular war-time pageants of the season. The Portland lodge of Elks, in arranging the celebration, will use its ritual to enhance the speaking features of the program, while music and eloquence will abound.

The parade will start from the Elks' temple, Broadway and Stark street, and made up of guardsmen and Elks, will traverse the principal streets to The Auditorium, where extensive plans have been made for a rousing and impressive meeting.

The ceremony of raising the American flag will be participated in by the entire Multnomah Guard in front of The Auditorium, Colonel John B. Hibbard commanding.

Allied Flag Drill Feature

The Elks' band, under direction of John E. Owe, will play the "Star Spangled Banner" as the flag tops the staff. One of the spectacular features will be the allied flag drill by a battalion of school children, under direction of Robert Krohn, Charles Ringler, exalted ruler of Portland lodge, will preside. Charles F. Berg will give a brief history of the flag. Eloise Anita Hall will sing "Columbia," with Ralph W. Hoyt accompanying on the great organ. Louis J. Simpson will deliver the patriotic address. Colonel Robert Leader, Royal Irish Rifles, will speak on behalf of the allies. Dr. Stuart McGuire will sing the "Song of the Flag," and the audience will be asked to participate in some of the numbers during the program.

Celebration Open to Public

The celebration is a public, and The Auditorium is to have its doors hospitably open to the free entrance of the people. The Elks have charge of the celebration with Hamilton Johnstone, chairman, aided by Charles L. Maple, J. E. Saxon, C. A. Alphonse, A. E. McKinley and the officers of the lodge.
The parade is scheduled to start from the Elks temple at 7:30 p. m., and the exercises in The Auditorium to begin at 8:15. The Multnomah Guardsmen have special orders to assemble in the Armory at 6:30.

Gompers May Go On European Trip

St. Paul, Minn., June 12.—(U. P.)—President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor is seriously considering a trip abroad to fight forces threatening a division of labor bodies in the allied countries. His decision may be known while the annual meeting of the federation is in session here.

The American labor mission, recently returned from England, suggested Gompers as one of two men to remain in Europe for the remainder of the war, welding laborers together in a "win the war" spirit.

German atrocities were made vivid to delegates to the federation convention today by Professor A. G. Vanhecke of the Belgian labor mission. "Belgium will never submit to German domination," asserted Vanhecke, amid cheers.

Other missions and committees made their reports today.

"Tell the folks at home that they will never be ashamed of us."
This was the message given by American soldiers in France to members of the American Labor mission which has returned from Europe. The report of that mission was read before the convention Tuesday.

"Mothers of America, need feel no worry as to watchful care being taken of their boys," the report said. High praise was directed at the morality and morale of the American soldiers over there.

Approves \$690,000 Road Bond Issue

Salem, June 12.—Official notice was received today that the capital issues committee has passed favorably on the sale of \$690,000 of Oregon state highway bonds. It came in a letter from the committee to the state highway department.

The state highway commission had asked for approval of \$1,500,000 of bonds, to be sold from the \$6,000,000 road bond issue, but the capital issues committee refused to approve the full amount.

However, \$690,000 will enable the highway department to complete all contracts now under way as part of the \$6,000,000 road program. When completed these contracts will show an expenditure of approximately \$2,500,000. All of them will be completed this summer. They are located in Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Hood River, Jackson, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties.

Coos County Fires Take Valuable Logs

Marshfield, June 12.—Lack of rain has made the woods in Coos county extremely dry and losses of logs burned in different fires in the timber aggregate a large sum. A fire in the Buehner Lumber company camp at Tenmile lakes destroyed many good logs and logging engine. Almost every camp on the Coquille river has suffered loss of logs by the fires. It is seldom that the woods are dangerously dry this early in the season.

Mill Barn Is Burned
Sciofield, June 12.—The fire that has been raging in the vicinity of the Standard shingle mill, five miles from here, is under control. It caught in the mill several times, but was subdued. A barn belonging to the shingle company was the only building destroyed.

Reckless Driver Fined \$100
Reckless driving in the downtown streets cost Peter Lydon \$100 in the municipal court today. Officer O'Halloran arrested Lydon when he saw him endanger downtown traffic by running on the left hand side of the street and cutting corners in front of a moving streetcar.
