BRONSON WINS PRETTY SOFT "MEDAL" IN BOUT WITH ALEX. TRAMBITAS

Muff Sends Roumanian Down for Count of Nine in Fifth Inning and Long Count Helps Vanquished to Escape a Knockout; George Ingle Beats Lee Morrissey All the Way.

BESIDE each other in the Foundation shipyard work Muff Bronson and Alex Trambitas, and daily they talk over the wrongs of Lithuania and Roumania while building ships for France, but you'd never know they had passed a pleasant word by the terrific lacing Muff gave Alex last night, including a nine-second knockout in the fifth round. Muff and Alex met once before and Alex was given a decision over the Lithuanian, but Wednesday night Bronson whaled the tar out of his young rival from gong to gong. Alex didn't have much space for counsel between rounds, for it took all the time of Gray Jack Fahie and Brother Valley to get him in shape for the succeeding round. Maybe Alex can't fight after 11 o'clock, and maybe Bronson has profited a lot by the hard work at the Foundation yards. Muff never looked better. He was stronger than Alex and he hit harder and truer. He figured the Roumanian to a dot and the wild right crosses of the past were nil. The only wild punch from Bronson's right blew some of the claret off Alex's beaver just as the bell rang in the sixth.

From the first round, after a clip on the chin, Alex joined the great and growing class of foot-racers. In doing his turn around the 66-lap track, sometimes two jumps ahead of Bronson, Alex lost his balance and fell out of the ring several times. At times Bronson would throw her into the high and race after Alex and catch up with him, and there would almost be a wreck. Right crosses, straight lefts and stomach punches with both the right and left and Alex hunting refuge among the Leifry tenantry.

Work Does Muff Good
Bronson appears to be immeasurably stronger under the influence of swinging a hammer or jug than a joist or whatever it is he does for Charley Swigert. He evidently had Trambitas figured as a cup-custard hitter, for he stuck out his jaw on several occasions invitingly. Young Mr. Trambitas has a left hand, but you'd never know what for unless to lift a foot of pavement. Alex has been reading the war news, evidently, and he has learned that a successful general doesn't leave his vulnerable point open, hence the spectacle of Alex gluing his right hand to his chin almost continually.

In the fifth round Bronson felicitated Trambitas out, and started a right cross. Alex saw it coming and tried to duck away. It landed solidly on the mastoid process, to-wit, just back of the ear and a little hunch on the neck. Down went Alex on his face and tummy.

Alex Got Long Count
Bronson was ready to slip over the knee punch, but before Jack Grant held him off so that he wouldn't charge too soon. In watching Bronson behind him and Trambitas prostrate in front, Grant got a good long count. Alex took nine of the belated counts and then got off from a crouching start. The bell saved him from a knockout, for he was wobbling around the ring with glazed eyes, trying to get an earful from Gray Jack and an eyeful of Bronson. Between the two he was as busy as a cricket on hot stove.

Bronson chased Alex from here to Camadero and back in the sixth round, and once both went out of the ring, but he couldn't quite hang the grape on the Roumanian. Bronson didn't lay a keel last night, but it was the easiest "medal" that he has won in many a long day.

Ingle Beats Salt Laker
George Ingle beat Lee Morrissey all the way. He hit the harder punches and more of them, and he made the Salt Laker fight the kind of a battle that he wanted. Morrissey is rather clever and a good blocker, but against Ingle's awkward attack and defense he did not show up as well as expected.

Early in the battle Ingle put the case opener on Morrissey's ear which didn't do it any good. George is a stiff puncher and none of them wants to close in with him. Morrissey is a clean fighter on the Ingle style, which appears to be popular in Portland from the hand the Seattle man always gets when he enters the ring here.

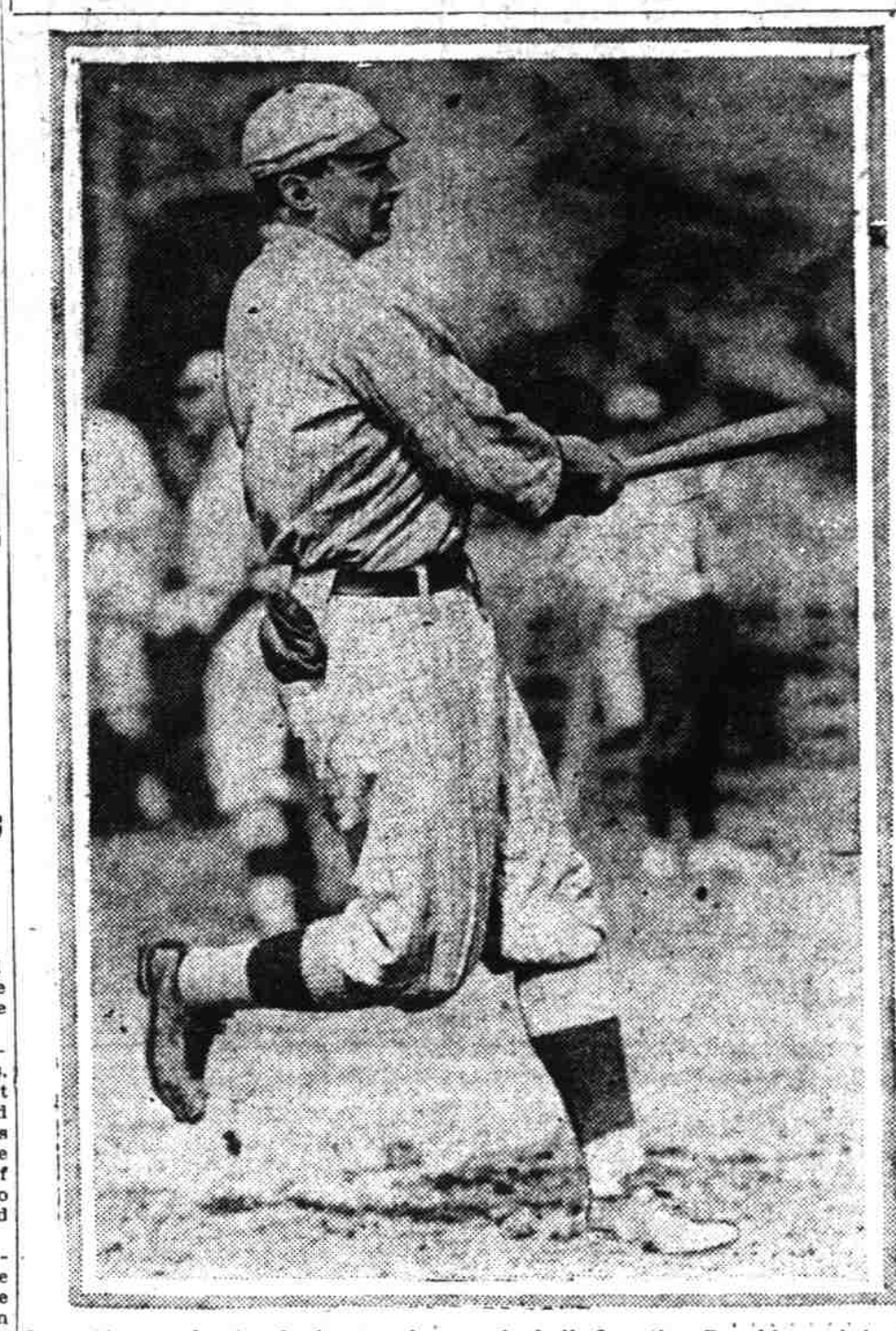
