

SOLDIER IN FRANCE SAYS HAND SOAP COSTS \$1.40 CAKE

Merwyn Garner Writes Mother He Received Package, but That Soap Sent Was Missing.

ANXIOUS TO HIT FRITZ AGAIN

Oregon Regiment, of Which He Is Part, Suffers Casualties, He Writes, but New Men Fill Gap.

Merwyn Garner, with the field artillery in France, and known to be with a part of the Oregon regiment now at the front, tells some interesting things in recent letters to his mother, Mrs. T. H. Garner, 410 East Fifty-eighth street. He speaks of receiving packages containing canned milk, cake, peanut butter, "All of which come in handy—but I did not get the soap you say you sent and that is very expensive here. I paid as much as seven francs or \$1.40 for a cake of hand soap in a small village. That is one of the things that is very scarce."

"Biddle Bishop (known in baseball circles especially)," he continued, "has been sick with grip for a few days. An epidemic is going around here. I am well and anxious to get at Fritz again. We do not expect to be in our present position very long."

"We have lost a few men since we came over, but the regiment has been brought up to full strength with new men. The new hat is hard on the eyes when the sun shines. We are hoping to get back our old service hat, which affords some protection from the sun."

"Well, this is Mothers' day and millions of men on land and sea are paying tribute to their very best friend on earth. Many mothers have lost their sons in this glorious battle for democracy and freedom, but I am sure it is not in vain that we are fighting. I, for one, am glad to have the opportunity to do my share in this great war. I surely do not regret offering myself to help defend our country against such a barbarous and unprovoked enemy as Germany has proven herself conclusively to be. If you people over there could only see the results of German Kultur and barbarism as we see it here you would redouble all your efforts at home effectively to fight the Hun."

"It was hard for me to believe some of the atrocities accredited to the Germans, but I have seen some with my own eyes and I think you will agree that this Hun spirit it would be the greatest blessing the world has ever known."

"They will never get a chance to take me prisoner for I am always going to have one shell left for myself. God pity any Americans who are taken prisoners by them. My heart goes out to the mothers throughout the world who have lost their sons in this war and who cannot receive a letter written them this day, which is set aside for them. But I am sure those mothers are proud to have given their sons in the fight for right against might."

PORTLAND BOY IN TRENCHES

Beryl Breithaupt Visits German Trenches; Meets U-boat at Sea.

"I am in the trenches now trying to get eight of 'em," Beryl writes Privately Beryl Breithaupt, who is with the regular U. S. marines in France. Extracts following are taken from a letter written to his mother, Mrs. C. W. Klippel of 102 Front street, Portland.

He continues: "I don't believe there is one within 500 miles from here. We have watches to put in and some working parties and between the guards and working parties it keeps a fellow pretty busy. I was out on patrol on No Man's Land night before last, but nothing happened. Fritz must have been home for the week-end. With the exception of artillery fire over our heads there isn't anything doing with us. The way the little towns around here, the original stone houses, are now leveled to the ground is something fierce. Only parts of walls are still standing. All along the front it is the same. The war has certainly torn this part of the world to shreds and I hope we get a chance to tear Kaiser Bill to pieces this summer. We know both about the duration of the war here, and in my opinion nobody else does. There is plenty of company at nights here. Great big fat rats are wild, not caring whether they walk on your face or not and there are just lots of cooties. It is great sport to watch them play tag."

"About the submarine I wrote about two months ago, we think the Germans got him—anyway he didn't bother us any more. The thing that bothered us was that he interrupted our Christmas dinner."

A clipping from the Daily Mail printed in Paris and which has been forwarded by Portland boys in the service is reprinted below. It appeared in the column devoted to "Latest American Mail News—Interesting Items From the Home Papers."

"Names of six streets in a new section of the city of Portland (Or.), laid out by a German property owner, will be changed. Frederick street will become Heig street, Kant street will be changed to Pershing, Rhine to Foch, Frankfurt to Albert, Rhone to Joffre and Bismarck to Emmanuel."

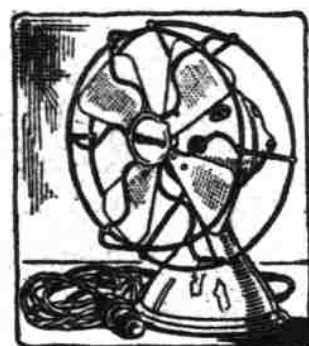
