THE Oregon division of the woman's committee of the Council of National Defense, met Thursday in Central library, the president, Mrs. Charles H. Castner, presiding. More than 200 were in attendance at the general session of the committee held in the afternoon in Central library. Mrs. Castner reported her trip to Washington, where she attended a conference of the national body and said that the biggest thing she carried away from the conference was the conviction that woman's greatest work in winning the war is along the line of food conservation. She urged the various organizations to continue their work, but to make patriotic work foremost. She urged women to fit themselves for the various lines of work previously done by men and laid special stress on child welfare work.

PORTLAND will welcome next week its distinguished townsman, Dr. Esther Lovejoy, who, according to a telegram received by her husband, George A. Lovejoy yesterday, will leave Chicago Saturday and arrive in Portland Tuesday or Wednesday. Just how long she will be in the city is not known, but plans are being formulated on a basis of at least a week. Dr. Lovejoy left Portland several months ago for France to work under the American Committee for French Wounded and among the women and children refugees but her services were soon taken over by the Red Cross, and she comes with firsthand experiences of her work among these diseased and destitute people who are being turned back by the Germans, thousands of them being received every day at a vain, where she was stationed.

Her message is so thrilling and so illuminating that she has been in great demand in the large cities of the East ever since her arrival in this country, returning engagements being arranged wherever possible. Definite plans for her public appearances and for affairs in her honor while in Portland are not yet completed, as the time of her stay is indefinite. In cases where it is more convenient for anyone to pick some other day than the one indicated, their help will be gratefully accepted at any time.

All grade children picking moss for three hours on six Mondays following will be taken for a picnic supper to either the beach or the mountains. Sand Lake has been very busy with the moss-picking, as the whole community gathers at the Grange hall to work at it every evening. They have furnished about 40 sacks. A shipment of 65 sacks was made to Portland on Saturday. A telegram was received

War Time Recipes Are Given
Liberty Temple Kitchen Busy

A shelf full of reference books on cooking, furnished by the Portland libraries, is the latest addition to the food administration war kitchen in Liberty temple. All of the furniture and equipment of the kitchen are the donations of firms and individuals.

"We are well supplied with nearly everything now except milk," said Mrs. F. A. Percy, in charge of the kitchen, Thursday.

Mrs. M. E. Hawley, Thursday demonstrated a wheatless bread made of five different flours, a war sponge cake and a prune loaf to be used for a meat substitute. The recipes follow:

Over the top bread—One pint milk (scalded); one pint water; three tablespoons Karo; two tablespoons shortening; one tablespoon salt; three cups barley flour; one cup corn flour; one cup oat flour; half a cup rice flour or one cup boiled rice; half cup potato flour or one cup mashed potatoes; one yeast cake.
 Scald milk, add Karo, shortening and water. Add yeast cake dissolved in quarter cup lukewarm water; add flours (sifted together twice) and salt. Let rise, make into loaves, let rise about three-quarters of an hour and bake.
 War sponge cake—Three eggs; three-quarters cup granulated sugar; six tablespoons boiling milk; one tablespoon lemon juice; three eighths cup potato flour sifted together; one and one-half teaspoons baking powder; one teaspoon salt.
 Beat yolks to a lemon color; add sugar gradually, beating all the time; add lemon juice; alternate hot milk and flour (sifted); fold in well beaten whites. Prune loaf (meat substitute)—Two cups boiled rice; one cup grated cheese; one cup prune pulp; one and one-half tablespoons salt; one tablespoon Worcester sauce; one egg; pepper; one onion chopped; fine; one cup fine bread crumbs; two tablespoons parsley.
 Mix in order given. Shape in loaf, bake one hour.

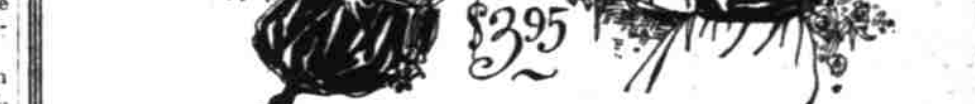
ARMY CAPTAIN'S WIFE GIVES VIEWS
