Colored Men Arrested.—Five colored men were arrested at the North Bank depot Saturday by Officers Webster, Abbott and Schmidtke, who said they found 27 pints of whiskey in a railroad car the men were in. Winford is held in default of \$250 bail.

MOTORCYCLE OFFICER SPEEDS AND KNOCKS DOWN PEDESTRIANS

Mr. and Mrs. Tom R. Baldwin Injured by H. P. Taylor While Answering Call.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom R. Baldwin of 583 Crampton street were badly injured Friday night when they were knocked down by Motorcycle Officer H. P. Taylor at Milwaukee avenue and Glenwood street. Officer Taylor was responding to a fire alarm at the Sellwood mills, on Spokane avenue, and passed a streetcar in his hurry to answer the call. By so doing he struck Mrs. Baldwin and was thrown off the machine himself. Both men were knocked unconscious for a short time. Baldwin received a compound fracture of the leg and bad cuts about the head, and Mrs. Baldwin's collar-bone was broken and her head badly lacerated. The officer escaped with minor external injuries. The Clifford Entertainment Bureau, 131-133 Sixth st., is taking care of the injured. It is said that he alighted on his head when thrown from the machine, and it is feared that his brain may be affected. Baldwin is at Good Samaritan hospital. HUMANÉ SOCIETY IS WORKING TO RETAIN DOG POUND CONTROL

President Cowperthwait Says 66 Important Cities Follow This System.

Sixty-six important cities in the United States have placed control of dog pounds in the hands of their local humane societies, and Portland must remain among them.

This is the statement of Albert Cowperthwait, president of the Oregon Humane society, which has taken up cudgels to combat recent agitation to return control of the Portland pound to the city.

"The majority of the largest and best cities in the countries have given the humane societies charge of their dog pounds," said Mr. Cowperthwait, "and by taking the Portland pound from the control of the Oregon Humane society we feel it would be merely taking a step backward. It is Portland's wish to be classed with the best cities of the country," continued Mr. Cowperthwait, "and I believe our commissioners can see far enough ahead to acknowledge this and leave the pound where it is."

Among the larger of the 66 cities that have turned over the dog pounds to the humane societies, Mr. Cowperthwait cites New York City, Chicago, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Detroit, San Francisco, Manila, P. I.; Seattle, Boston, Kansas City, New Orleans, Spokane and Portland.

Other officers of the Oregon Humane society, besides President Cowperthwait, are: Mrs. F. W. Berry, vice president; Dr. E. J. Weitz, recording secretary; Mrs. F. W. Swanson, corresponding secretary; Raymond G. Jubitz, treasurer. Fred L. Olson is chairman of the board of trustees and Dr. T. L. Eliot chairman of the advisory board. C. B. Anderson is humane officer.

Petty Thieves Are Busy in the City

Police Advise Householders to Lock All Doors Before Leaving Home, and to See That All Tools Are Out of Sight.

Buy padlocks and lock your doors, your windows, your garage door, your barn door, your basement door, your automobile, your motorcycle, your bicycle, your dog, your cat and everything that you want to find when you return home.

Such is the advice of Portland police. Since the first day of June, 106 people in Portland have reported loss of personal property through theft. This includes house robberies, store burglaries and larceny of tools and packages from automobiles.

Chief of Inspectors Clark announced that a gang of pay thieves has been operating in the city since the last circus arrived June 3, and that he fears a new bunch may come with the next show.

Every lock twice before leaving the house," is the advice of Chief of Inspectors Clark.

The operators of automobiles are warned by the police to lock their cars at all times, and not to leave packages or suitcases when no one is present to watch them. Many tool boxes have also been robbed during the last two weeks.

Riot Starts in Rink On Discovering Sign

Where is the man in Portland that classes soldiers with yellow dogs? Or, rather, where is the person who put a sign up at the Oaks rink a few nights ago that read, "No yellow dogs or soldiers allowed in this rink?"

The proprietor of the rink was almost "mobbed" by 400 soldiers, who demanded an explanation. The tumult which arose when the crowd read the sign made it difficult to learn at first what the exact trouble was, but as soon as the manager learned the cause of the disturbance he took the sign down and joined in the search to locate the man who wrote it.

An emergency call was sent to police headquarters for men to quell a riot, but by the time the officers arrived the sign had been destroyed and all were happy to learn that the rink manager was not responsible.

EIGHT BATTALIONS OF STATE MILITIA ARE FORMED IN OREGON

Work of Training Rapidly Going Forward and Equipment Is Being Supplied Men.

Organization of eight battalions of state militia has been perfected by the general staff, Oregon National Guard and with officers commissioned the work of training is said to be going forward rapidly in all sections of the state. County courts, the adjutant general's office reports are joining willingly in the purchase of uniforms for all but the battalions in Portland and Salem, which are equipped and outfitted by the state. Counting the military police as one battalion, Portland is represented in the new militia organization by two battalions. Other cities designated as headquarters of the seven remaining units are, National Guard, La Grande, Bend, Ashland, Eugene and Hillsboro. The Salem battalion and the militia unit in Portland have been designated as the first regiment.

In addition to the militia organizations, which will not be subject to duty outside the state, one regiment of Oregon National Guard is being organized. The federalized Third Oregon, has been authorized and its active recruiting is expected to start within a short time. The guard regiment teaches not only the words but the pronunciation, which makes the French more vivid and more easily understood.

In addition to the eight militia battalions and the battalion of state police now organized, the adjutant general has applications from practically every important community in the state asking permission to organize militia companies, which would later be formed into battalions. In some cases companies are ready to be mustered in as militia and as soon as the authorities can take the proper action this step will be taken.

Fills in Blank Deed, Borrows on Land

H. C. Erwin, a real estate dealer, was arrested Friday night by Deputy Constables Rennie and Glose on a warrant charging him with obtaining money

under false pretenses proffered by P. H. Harth of 1041 Hassalo street.

Erwin is alleged, persuaded Harth to execute a deed in blank to property in Glenwood valued at \$2500, representing that he had a customer for it. He reported a sale later to Harth, but neglected to pay over the supposed purchase price and put Harth off a number of days with various explanations, the complaint avers. Harth says he discovered that Erwin had filled in his own name and recorded the deed and subsequently borrowed \$700 on the property by a mortgage.

Erwin is being held in the county jail under \$5000 bail.

Will Give Lecture At Summer School

Dr. William Bradley Otis of College of New York City Will Discuss Allen and Bolshevik Elements in America

Dr. William Bradley Otis, professor of English in the College of the City of New York, with 15,000 students, the largest for collegiate institution in the world, will lecture at the Reed college summer school July 1, 2 and 3.

Dr. Otis for several years has been lecturer in the famous public lecture system of New York City. He is now special lecturer on "The Issues of the War." Through these two sources Professor Otis has come into contact with the alien and Bolshevik elements in America's population.

He has some strong things to say of the danger from enemies at home—the anti-war Socialist, the pro-German, the pacifist, the I. W. W. and the Non-Partisan league.

Professor Otis is a direct descendant of James Otis, orator and statesman of the American revolution. He is a literary critic and is the author of a history of American literature.

The subjects that Dr. Otis will discuss are: "The Philosophy of Prussianism—Hell on Earth"; "Enemies in Our Midst—America Awake"; and "Poetry of the War—God Still Lives."

Willamette University, Salem, June 15.—The Willamette University Alumni association met in annual banquet Wednesday evening at the Masonic temple, where about 150 graduates, old and new, gathered around the festive board to talk over the achievements of the past and to renew their allegiance to their Alma Mater.

The special seats of honor were given to the classes of 1918 and 1868. Of the 15 who graduated 50 years ago, four were present and responded to toasts.
