## MAYORS PROCLAIM DRIVE

Hope for Completing State's  
Quota Lies in Membership of  
"Limit Club."

### PROCLAMATION

In furtherance of the War Savings Stamp campaign, the campaign for conservation of labor and material, and the campaign for economy and self-denial in the purchase of unnecessary articles, Friday, June 28 is hereby officially proclaimed War Savings day in the city of Portland. All citizens are urged on this day to pledge themselves to practice economy and invest money which otherwise would be spent for unnecessary articles in War Savings Stamps. All are urged to take a solemn pledge to eliminate unnecessary buying in order that labor and material may be utilized for activities essential to the proper prosecution of the war.

Dozens of mayors of Oregon towns have issued proclamations designating June 28 as the time to make pledges to buy War Savings Stamps. These proclamations supplement the proclamation of President Wilson and are intended to call the attention of citizens to the day of the big W. S. S. drive.

Soldiers are among the strongest supporters of the War Savings Stamp and they are purchasing them freely. L. J. Simpson, who returned last night from Tillamook county, states that the 88 soldiers in the spruce camp at Miami bought \$3025 of the stamps on the last pay day and the soldiers indicated that they intended going as strong on the next pay day. If every citizen in Oregon would buy stamps in the same proportion as these soldiers in the spruce camp, Oregon would more than absorb its quota of \$17,500,000.

Mr. Simpson advised headquarters at the Liberty Temple that Tillamook county will go over the top with its quota. The county executive committee, organized Monday night, consists of G. B. Lamb, C. A. McGhee, F. C. Baker, Ed Gilbert, A. W. Bunn, P. C. Todd and Henry Cranshaw. The committee has designated a local chairman for every community in the county and Tillamook is already well organized. Similar reports have been received from Folk, Crook and Lane counties.

Either today or tomorrow City Manager Frank McCrillis expects to complete the formation of his flying squadron. The aim of this organization is to obtain pledges for the limit of stamps, \$1000, maturity value. Only by having a strong membership in the limit club will it be possible for Portland to subscribe to its quota. Special buttons for limit club members are now being manufactured and will be ready for delivery Thursday. They can be obtained at Liberty Temple and will sell for 25 cents each, the member to pay for the button. A dozen requests for the buttons have already been received.

## HUNS CLAIM THEY WILL BOMBARD U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(U. S. S.)—Threats of bombardment of the coast of the United States by German submarines are made in German newspapers, according to cable advices received by the state department today.

One paper says: "Scenes may be expected to follow which will cause the marrow in Wilson's bones to turn cold."

The newspaper states that the U-boats are causing such great destruction to United States shipping that the forced halt in the shipment of U. S. soldiers abroad is the decisive blow to French hopes for victory. Another report says:

"The United States is already trembling through fear of aerial attacks and the time is not far distant when the United States ports will be bombarded with German cannon."

## RESTRICTED WOOL DISTRICT FEARED

R. H. Ashton Asked to Suggest  
Rates That Will Enforce 250-  
Mile Division of Traffic.

Washington, D. C., June 19.—(WASH-  
INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—The government railroad administration has informed Representa-

tion Senator R. H. Ashton that it has asked R. H. Ashton, western regional director, to submit specific recommendations concerning plans for handling wool from the Portland territory in the so-called form, instead of in the case. If Mr. Ashton follows the report he has already made on the subject he will say that wool within a radius of 250 miles from Portland should be restricted to Portland or the Dallas for scouring. He has been asked to suggest the rates which he believes should be made effective to enforce this division of the traffic.

The Ashton 250-mile line would scarcely extend to the Idaho boundary, and if strictly drawn might restrict Portland to this limited territory by a rate barrier on the westward movement of wool in the grease from the state director, whereas the division of the wool industries board proposes to allow Portland to draw wool from as far east as Pocatello.

The Ashton line will, therefore, be watched so far as it relates to restricting Portland's territory. It is understood that contracts already made for the formation of his flying squadron will require practically all the wool as far east as Pocatello for filling orders at the western mills.

Laborers employed by the state highway department on the lower Columbia river highway quit work Tuesday because their pay for the last two weeks of May was not forthcoming.

The trouble will be adjusted today by the forwarding of the pay checks. The unusual delay was due to the system employed. Before the checks were issued it is necessary for two of the highway commissioners to sign the warrant. If the pay rolls do not come in before the monthly meeting of the commission there is delay in getting the necessary signatures.

To avoid this condition it has been suggested that a law should be enacted creating a revolving fund for the commission.

Willamina, Or., June 19.—The biggest real estate sale in this community in the past year took place last week when J. R. Fagerstrom sold his farm of about 48 acres to W. S. Bryant for \$8500. The sale includes the growing crop and Mr. Fagerstrom gives possession next fall. Mr. Bryant came from the Okanogan country last spring.

One of the fields, located at Riverside, Ill., will be known as March field, and the other field will be located at Americus, Ga. Major J. C. P. Bartholomew and Major C. H. Wash, respectively, will command the new grounds.

## SOCIAL HYGIENE PLAN OF OREGON TO BE PUT BEFORE CONVENTION

Portland Rotarians Will Seek to  
Have Program Made of  
National Scope.

Oregon's social hygiene program is to be made a national enterprise for military camps and civilians through the leadership of the international association of Rotary clubs.

Portland's delegates to the annual convention of international Rotary clubs, which is to be held at Kansas City June 24-29, will leave at 11 o'clock tonight in company with delegations from Victoria, Vancouver, Seattle, Tacoma, Everett and Bellingham, which will arrive here at 10:30 p. m. Local Rotarians have planned to shower the visitors with roses upon their arrival.

Six thousand delegates will attend the international convention in Kansas City, said Walter Whiting, executive secretary of the Portland Rotary club, this morning.

The plan to induce other states officially to adopt the Oregon social hygiene program, with particular reference to the improvement of conditions in the vicinity of military camps, has ready been taken up at the request of the national government. It was said, President Wilson has written a letter to the club urging their attendance and giving the convention his approval.

At the convention a complete exhibit of the Oregon Social Hygiene society's methods will be presented. Not only will the plan be adopted, it is predicted, but the delegations of various states will band themselves into group conferences, each to see that its state meets the government's offer to match dollar for dollar in appropriations for social hygiene work.

The Northwest delegation will leave Portland in two special cars.

Sale Lake City will entertain the delegations from the Northwest and California, New Mexico and Arizona for 36 hours, after which all will go on together in a special train to Kansas City.

Portland will be represented by C. B. Waters, president; Dr. G. H. Douglas, A. J. Balle, Dr. William Wallace Youngson and S. B. Cook.

## Streetcar Employees Discuss Increase

Question Discussed at All Night Meeting, But No Decision Reached; Present Contract Expires June 30.

Whether the present contract with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company is to be renewed upon its expiration June 30, or whether new demands as to hours and wages will be presented, is being discussed in meetings held by the platform employees of the company, members of Local 757 of the Amalgamated Association of Street & Electrical Railway Employees of America. At an all-night meeting in their hall at 208 1/2 Third street, the matter was discussed Tuesday night, but, according to officials of the union, no decision was reached and more meetings will be held to determine the course to be pursued.

"It is possible demands for more money will be made," said President Walker of the union today.

The company knows nothing of the rumored demands, according to President Franklin T. Griffith.

## BANK TO ENLARGE PRESENT QUARTERS

Northwestern Will Make Use of  
Space Now Given Over to  
Stores on Morrison Street.

Plans are being perfected for the enlargement of the quarters of the Northwestern National bank at Sixth and Morrison streets. When proposed alterations to the building are completed the bank will occupy in addition to its present quarters the store rooms facing on Morrison street now held by the N. Solomon jewelry store, Hyatt's talking machine store and the Portland Photo Supply company.

Under the new arrangement the lobby of the building will become the lobby of the bank. Partitions will be removed and the whole ground floor thrown into one room, with galleries along the east side.

The rapidly expanding business of the bank necessitates the enlargement of the banking room. Even with the additional space acquired by the proposed alterations, officials anticipate the necessity of still larger quarters during the next few years.

Difficulty in securing building materials and labor make it impossible for officers to state definitely when operations will begin. The marble used in the interior of the bank was imported from Italy and it is impossible now to secure more of it. Steel and other materials are also scarce. Emory Olmstead, vice president of the bank, announced today, however, that construction work will begin in the near future.
