

METZGER BOY HAS FOND MEMORIES OF STRAWBERRIES

Ralph Dustan Writes From Camp
in England Saying He Is Happy
but Will Be Glad to Go On.

PROGRESS OF U. S. PRAISED

Brothers Are in Infantry Now
Stationed in England; Plans
Trip to Scotland During Leave.

"Strawberries are ripe at Metzger and how I would like to be there," writes Ralph Dustan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Dustan of Metzger, who is with the infantry now stationed in England.

"But I am happier all around here and will be glad when we can get in the game over in France. England is beautiful at this season. It is certainly a picturesque country. The American delegation will be here today and as I am on duty where they come along I will get a good look at them. 'Quite smart,' the English would say.

"Uncle Sam's soldiers are pouring in constantly and it is an inspiring sight to see them file along, 10,000 strong, at one time, well trained and fit. I wonder if the people at home know what the government has accomplished in their one year of war?

"We were paid the other day and are all happy and won't be satisfied until we are broke. I am planning on a trip to Scotland on my next leave."

From another son of Mr. and Mrs. Dustan, Sergeant A. S. Dustan, recent letters also tell of camp life in England. He is also with infantry.

"Tonight," he writes, "Ralph and I are going out to dinner to an American lady's home. Her husband, a Spanish-American war veteran, is now in the American transportation fleet. They have four children, one girl of 21 years. Though she is of Scotch descent she sticks up for the Americans and the Scotchman on all occasions against the English Tommy. I think they are going to remove to America after the war and they want to go to Oregon. Her husband says that is the best state in the union, so, of course, we have no quarrel with him."

Corporal Seth Bailey of the 162d infantry, formerly a reporter on a Portland newspaper, writing to a friend in Dallas from "Somewhere in France," says:

"Of course I can't tell you where we are, but I'll say for one that I'm as close to the front as I care about being for the present. In other words, I'm in no hurry to get any closer. Although I'm not worrying about how close I get.

"We'll soon be wearing our service stripes and taking the usual seven days leave. Have seen Ray Pares, so don't care much about the leave, myself. I have seen several interesting places in France since coming over, and there are yet many more to see. But there'll be plenty of time to take in everything without rushing headquarters for necessary transportation.

"Had a nice trip a couple of days ago connected with my duties. I saw the now oldest cathedral in France and some of the old walls, yet preserved, which Caesar tore down in his mad career.

"Well, that's about all, only we're not yet isolated from the world. There isn't anything going on over here that we don't know about, anyway. In fact, I could give you some dope that would jar you from that little old dinky stool of yours at the high desk in the corner. She's some place!"

Prohibitive Tax on Pistols Is Urged

Representative Sisson Proposes Plan to
Check Spread of Crime; Would Re-
quire Weapon Stocks to Be Registered.

Washington, June 20.—(I. N. S.)—Prohibitive taxes on deadly weapons "for private use" were proposed to the ways and means committee by Representative Sisson of Mississippi today, not as a means of raising revenue, but to check the spread of crime in the United States.

Sisson urged a flat tax of \$5 on each deadly weapon manufactured, sold or displayed for sale, and in addition a 25 per cent ad valorem tax on the price at which the manufacturer sells his product to the trade. He listed as deadly weapons pistols, dirks, bowie knives, sword canes, stilettos and brass knuckles.

He would require each manufacturer to register with the collector of internal revenue and return an exact accounting of his output. The taxes would be paid in special revenue stamps.

DALLAS BOY ENDURES HARROWING NIGHT UNDER FIRE OF BOCHES

Harold Poling and Pal, of Engi-
neers, Lay Four Hours Before
Hun Lines in Rain of Shells.

Dallas, June 20.—A few weeks ago newspapers carried a story of how two American engineers, sent out on an especially hazardous duty, lay nearly all night in No Man's Land, while Boche guns of all descriptions, from hand rifles to heavy cannon, dropped their missiles of death all around them. It was a thrilling tale.

Now it develops that one of those heroes was a Dallas boy, Harold Poling, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. V. Poling. Harold, who is a member of an engineer regiment, has never mentioned the incident to his people in any of his letters, but the word of the exploit came to them through a letter from another boy in the same unit to a friend of the Poling family.

It seems that one night young Poling and another man were sent out into No Man's Land to cut some barbed wire entanglements surrounding a listening post. They had hardly commenced work when their presence was discovered by the enemy, who opened fire on the spot where the two American soldiers were supposed to be. For four hours that rain of lead and steel was kept up from every kind of a gun at the Hun's command. Back in the American trenches hope was given up for the safety of the two engineers, as it was inconceivable that anyone could live in such a veritable rain of death.

After four hours of ceaseless firing, the Boches let up and a short time afterward, just before dawn, Poling and his companion came crawling back to their own lines. They were literally plastered from head to toe with mud and filth, which had been splashed over them by the bursting shells as they lay flattened out behind the barbed wire fence. While terribly exhausted and nerve-racked from their experience, neither had received a scratch. When asked how he managed to escape, neither could tell, but Poling managed to gasp to the officer who greeted him, "Well, we got what we went after, anyway."

Later, in describing their experiences, the soldiers said every time one of the larger shells burst near them the concussion lifted them nearly a foot off the ground.

Harold Poling is a son of D. V. Poling, building secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Vancouver Barracks.

writes the following account of his experiences that put him there:

"Just a line to say that I am getting on fine, but can not write much, as I can not sit up yet without hurting too much.

"My worst wound is a compound fracture of right leg, only the small bone being broken. I also have a gash cut in right leg near the knee, a big bruise with small cut on right hip, a small cut on left leg at shoe top, and a hole in left thigh. No human ever got out of a hotter corner alive."

"Old soldiers say it was the hottest place they ever saw during the war. We went over the top on a raid after a machine gun at 3 o'clock in the morning. 'I volunteered and was given the place of honor (?)—first bayonet man—to lead the charge and, being narrow between the eyes I tackled the job (censored). I got within 50 feet of the line, where they cut me up with their hand bombs—potato mashers we call them, on account of their shape.

"I will write you an account of the fight when I get better."

Spokane Man Wants To Aid Jitney Fund

Rossman Reports Progress in Coopera-
tive Plan to Raise \$10,000 in Liberty
Bonds to Be Placed With City.

Jitney interests are making progress in their cooperative plan of raising \$10,000 in Liberty bonds to be filled with the city auditor before undertaking to operate buses on the city streets. The sum of \$7000 has already been pledged, according to E. W. Rossman, who is the moving spirit of the United Motor Bus company. The plan is to secure 100 members who will put up \$100 each.

Mr. Rossman today received a telegram from Spokane stating that an investor there had forwarded \$300 to the United States National bank of Portland to be added to the Jitney bond fund. The donor said an account of the fight when I get better."

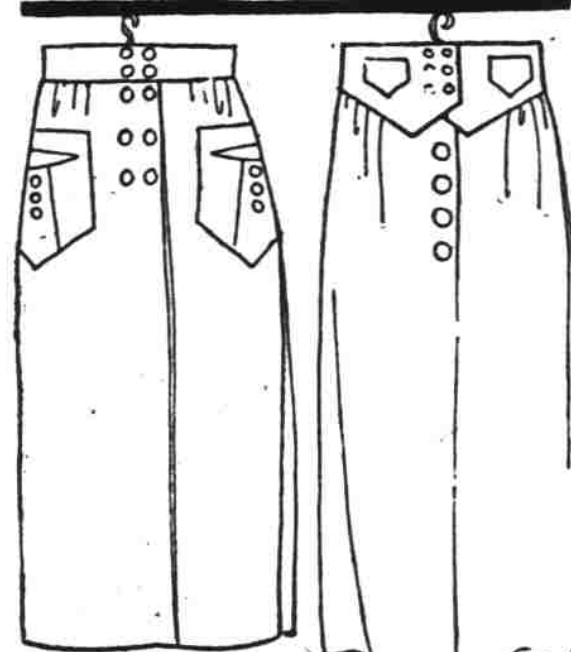
"We will ask the council to repeal the existing franchise governing operation of cars over fixed routes."
