MARION COUNTY STILL SHORT OF HANDS TO HARVEST FRUIT CROP

Situation, However, Said to Be Improving; Stores Will Close Half of Each Day to Help.

Salem, June 21.—The labor situation is looking better in Marion county, according to reports of government agents who are working with local people to get enough workers to save the cherry and berry crops.

A check was made Wednesday night of the requests for pickers and it revealed a shortage of 1164, when compared with the number of persons who have already signed up to go into the berry fields. But J. R. Coleman, the government agent here, says this did not take into consideration the many persons who have given verbal assurances that they would be on hand when the picking season actually begins.

ALBANY COUNTS ON ADDING TWO CONCERNS TO LIST OF FACTORIES

R. E. Bristol Plans on Moving Willow Craft Factory From Portland; New Firm Coming.

Albany, June 21.—Arrangements have been made by Albany business men for the removal to Albany of the Willow-craft factory of Portland, and this plant will be in operation by fall, it is stated. Another industry which is expected to do much toward the development of the city is the Far West Manufacturing company, which makes ladders, wheelbarrows and articles of a similar nature. The Albany Commercial club decided to secure this firm a loan of \$5000.

When the two plants are in full operation, they, with the Albany furniture factory and the Albany chair factory, are expected to make Albany one of the leading cities in the Northwest in the manufacture of furniture. The industries employ close to 200 persons. The Albany furniture factory and the Willow-craft factory at Portland are owned by R. E. Bristol.

Opposes Sunday Work Salem, June 21.—At a meeting of the Sunday school board of the First Methodist church of Salem Wednesday night a resolution was adopted urging the Methodist people to give the fullest cooperation in helping harvest the crops, but the resolution says the situation does not necessitate working on Sunday. The resolution says:

"In view of the urgent necessity for more workers to save the fruit and berry crops of the Willamette valley, we, the Sunday school board of the First Methodist church, urge as much of our people as possible to give the fullest cooperation in helping harvest the crops."

"We do not believe, however, that the time has come when it is necessary to work on Sunday and wish to record ourselves as opposed to making this use of the Sabbath day."

One of the Sunday school classes of the Leslie Methodist church has arranged to spend next Sunday picking cherries, and this is what prompted the action by the Sunday school board of the First Methodist church.
