

FIGURES GIVEN ON FREIGHT INCREASES AFFECTING PORTLAND

New Rates Become Effective on June 25 and Apply to and From Outside Points.

The new freight rates on exports and imports provided by order No. 28 of the Federal railroad administration have been announced by F. W. Robinson, chairman of the Portland district traffic committee. The new rates are effective after June 25 and apply to and from all transcontinental territory, including the southeastern states. The increase approximates 25 per cent of the previous rates on commodities named. New Ruling Lowers Draft Requirement

More men will be eligible to 1-A classification under the draft by revised regulations which have been received from Provost Marshal General Crowder by Captain J. E. Cullison, who has charge of the draft operations in Oregon under the adjutant general's office. There is a modification in the physical requirements, which are made less rigid, that will result in the changing of the status of many men under the draft and reexamination of many doubtful cases has been ordered. The qualification for a good soldier under the revised order follows: "To make a good soldier the registrant must be able to see well, have comparatively good hearing, his heart must be able to stand the stress of physical exertion, he must be intelligent enough to understand and execute military maneuvers, obey commands and protect himself, and must be able to transport himself by walking as the exigencies of military life may demand."

Sore Arms Prevail In Camp at Presidio

All of 1000 Men at Training Camp Recovering From Third Injection of Typhoid Prophylactic; Working Hard. Reserve Officers' Training Camp, The Presidio, San Francisco, June 21.—One thousand members of the R. O. T. C., including 171 Oregon Agricultural college men, here undergoing strenuous intensive military work, with the daily program occupying every minute of the day from 5:30 in the morning until 9:30 at night, received their third and final hypodermic inoculation of typhoid prophylactic Monday afternoon and have been drilling since with sore arms as a result of the injection of the maximum amount of the serum. The men are kept busy continually, the only time they have off being Saturday afternoon and Sunday. A feature of last Sunday proved to be a dinner party and entertainment provided for 82 of the members of the camp by the residents of Berkeley, which was terminated in a lawn party at the home of the mayor of Berkeley, followed by a visit to the University of California. Similar entertainments, furnished members of the camp through the Y. M. C. A., are a feature of the weekends here.

FUEL SURVEY WILL LIST NAMES OF COAL USERS AND NEEDS

All Consumers in Oregon, Except Household, Will Be Listed in Order of Necessity.

All consumers of coal in Oregon, except householders, will be listed and classified immediately by Fuel Administrator Holmes in accordance with the distribution program of the United States administration. The names of consumers and their needs and the kind of work their enterprises are engaged in will be gathered as rapidly as possible. The survey is being made in response to a request from Judge Edwin B. Parker, priorities commissioner, and presages the issuance of a preference list under which industries engaged in war work will be given the first call on available fuel. In a statement just issued the war industries board discovers the creation at this time of industries which will utilize fuel, materials and men which will not contribute directly or indirectly toward the winning of the war. The board, however, has not endeavored to classify any legitimate business enterprise as "non-essential" and later when the fuel preference lists are published every effort will be made to supply all industries with their requirements as nearly as possible. It must be borne in mind, however, that essential industries will have first call on fuel. The steps now being taken by the government indicate that Oregon, along with the remainder of the nation, will be forced to curtail fuel consumption.

Preparations Made For Fighting Fires

Kits Sent Out to Supervisors for Distribution to Various Rangers in Their Districts; Food Rations Also Sent. Preparations for fighting forest fires were taken Thursday when H. L. Plumb, forest assistant at the district forest office, sent out to supervisors in Oregon and Washington 11 ten-men emergency kits, 38 six-men kits and 42 two-men kits. The kits will be distributed by the supervisors to the different rangers in their districts. The kits contain a complete set of camping and cooking utensils and save time in reaching fires because they are ready for use and the men do not have to scurry about getting their own outfits. About 800 food rations to go with the two men kits have been ordered by Mr. Plumb and will be sent out as soon as they arrive. No food rations are furnished with the larger kits, since more time is taken for preparation and food can be purchased as it is needed. With the two men kits and their accompanying food rations, no time need be lost by the men in reaching the scene of the fire after receiving the alarm.
