

ITALIANS ADOPT ALLIES' WAR CRY

"They Shall Not Pass," Shout Gallant Fighters as They Hack at Austro-Hungarians.

London, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—The Italians have captured Cossulunga, on the Asiago plateau, driving back the Austrians. It was learned this afternoon from an authoritative source.

The Austro-Hungarians on the Piave front are reported to have crossed the railway south of Nervesano on a two mile front. (The railway runs southward from Vittorio through Treviso to Venice.)

The total number of Austro-Hungarian prisoners captured by the Italians since the offensive began last Saturday has been increased to 12,000, said a New agency dispatch from Italian headquarters today.

Rome, June 22.—On the lower Piave Austrians have succeeded in freighting armored cars and field guns across in boats, but none of their craft is large enough to transport their heavy guns.

The work of the Italian, British and American airmen is most effective. A number of British aviators, after harassing their bombs and machine gun cartridges, hovered a few feet over the enemy, dropping spare parts and tools.

The Italians have made further gains on the Piave front.

Premier Orlando is supremely confident of the outcome of the battle.

"Our soldiers have been fighting constantly for days but they are not yet tired out," declared the premier. "The men shout 'They shall not pass,' as they fight."

High tribute is paid to the Czechs, Slovaks, who are fighting with the Italians and who are said to be contending "with lion hearted bravery."

An official statement issued by the war office last night says:

"In the Montello sector the pressure of the Austro-Hungarian army has continued strong, but everywhere they were held by our troops. We counter attacked constantly. Attempts by the enemy to advance toward the west and south were broken up. Many of these attempts centered in the district west of Verena station. On the Piave the struggle was concentrated in some sectors West of Cervignano the enemy was repulsed completely. Farther south, in the Sagrado-Zenon sector, the combat was waged with great bitterness and we advanced into positions we had previously held."

The Austro-Hungarians have sustained great losses.

It is learned on good authority that the Austrians have already used up 35 of their 59 divisions on this battle front. The bulk of the Austrian reserves are said to be in the rear of the lines in the mountains (Asiago plateau sector).
