REVISED RULES FOR  
EXAMINATION OF MEN  
FOR ARMY RECEIVED

New Standard Designed to Secure Greater Number of Men for Field Service.

Revised and standardized rules of physical examination governing entrance to all branches of the armies of the United States have been received by Captain John E. Cullison, chief of Oregon's war census bureau, and by him distributed to the many local draft exemption boards throughout the state. The revised rules not only cover the examination of drafted soldiers, but the examination of all men, volunteers and otherwise.

As explained in a preamble the new standard rules are designed to secure greater uniformity and efficiency in the examination of draft registrants and enlisted men and are to be considered as guides for the discretion of medical men rather than as strict unalterable conditions. Their object is held to be to get men physically fit, or men who can readily be made so, for the rigors of field service, or for special and limited service, and the determination of these questions is left largely to the judgment of examining officers and local boards.

Outlining the order and method of physical examinations the standardized rules prescribe numerous changes in former regulations whereby men formerly available only for limited military service are now to be found qualified for field duty. Minor changes are noted in the procedure of examinations that tend to let down the military bars so that class 1 of the conscript classifications may be considerably increased by future examinations and by the re-examination of some of those now deferred for physical reasons.

**Pastor Loans Field Glasses to Navy**

Grants Pass, Or., June 22.—Rev. Melville T. Wire, pastor of the First Methodist church of this city, is in receipt of a letter from the navy department accepting the powerful aluminum mounted hunting glasses which he sent them.

Mr. Wire's name will be engraved on the glasses and at the end of the war will be sent to him with a record of where they had been used. The department sent Mr. Wire a \$1 check as a nominal fee, as the government is not allowed to accept gifts.

Mr. Wire feels that he is not only doing a bit for his country but that he may receive a very interesting and worthwhile souvenir of the war.

2 DAYS ENJOYED BY  
BOYS IN CAMP ON  
CLACKAMAS RIVER

One Hundred Seventy-five Go to Gladstone and Then Hike Over Hills to Parkplace.

## BOYS CUT BOUGHS FOR BEDS

Local Camp Entertains Visiting Lads With Program at School House; Churches Are Scheduled.

Boy Scouts numbering 175, together with six scout masters and James G. Brockway, executive scout, chartered special cars a week ago to Gladstone, and from there hiked over to Park Place on the Clackamas river. There for two days they were the guests of the Park Place troop at the dedication of its new headquarters.

Many hikes are taken by the Boy Scouts, but never was there a hike quite like this one. In the first place, it was a special occasion—there are not always new buildings to be dedicated; secondly, school was just out and the boys had more time to go on such trips. The usual hikes number only between 75 and 100 persons. This time it was a place to go. The hiking was not strenuous nor long, for the train took them close to their destination.

They arrived at Park Place about 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

**Boughs Cut for Beds**  
The afternoon was spent in selecting a camp site on the Clackamas river and making camp. Each boy cut boughs and prepared his own bed, did his own cooking and furnished his own equipment. After supper the visiting scouts were all escorted to the school house of Park Place where the local scouts entertained them with a program of songs and a score entitled "A Country Cousin in Town," all acted out by the Park Place troop, and a moving tableau called "The Awakening of Columbia," written by the local scout master.

Sunday morning there was swimming and setting up exercises, after which they all went to church. A mistaken notion was current among Portland ministers, according to Mr. Brockway, that Boy Scout hikes on Sunday should be abolished since they keep the boys away from church. In fact, the boys go to church wherever they happen to be. At Park Place the churches were probably never so full as when they were visited by the Portland Boy Scouts. One church would not hold them all, so they divided up their number between the two houses of worship of which the town boasted.

**Scout Headquarters Dedicated**  
Following the services occurred the dedication exercises of the new scout headquarters. Before the frame building, constructed entirely by the scouts themselves, gathered the scouts from the two localities. The flag was raised and saluted, the oath of allegiance was taken and a short talk was given by Dr. Milligan of Oregon City.

Then there was swimming in the cool waters of the Clackamas river where depths were found suitable for every temperament. Exploring trips were also taken to the Clackamas cliffs, over the Hogback, to the Bulzards' cave and other romantic and interesting spots.

Dinner followed and in the late afternoon, residents of Park Place gathered with the Park Place troops on the banks of the Clackamas and joined in a real community sing, with the Portland scouts. Strains of old time and patriotic songs from hundreds of throats swelled in a volume of overflowing spirits and exuberance.

**Whole Community Turns Out**  
All Park Place knew the Portland scouts were coming and the local boys had so advertised the event that nearly everyone in the community turned out. Ice cream was served to the visiting scouts, and about 5:30, the return trip was made to Portland.

Out of town trips are taken by the scouts every few weeks and registration is taking place for the summer camp at Wahlam lake, at the head of the Eagle Creek trail, which is scheduled to open July 10.

**Trained Cats Cost Man Two Goslings**

Oakland, Cal., June 22.—Robert Tyson, assistant probation officer, is the owner of two felines, Clinkers and Cinders. They accompany him on his pre-daylight trip through his orchard. At the report of a gun they dash off to get their prey, seldom failing to return with a bird. To such a remarkable degree has Tyson trained the hunting instinct in the felines, that it is necessary to warn guests not to slam the doors in the house.

He explains that on one occasion the noise of a door slamming was mistaken for the report of a gun and the cats started out in search of prey. This mistake cost him two pet goslings.

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TWELFTH REUNION OF  
HENKLE FAMILY WILL  
TAKE PLACE JUNE 27

Descendants of Rev. Anthony Jacob Henkle Now More Than 700.

The twelfth annual reunion of the Henkle family will be held June 27 at the home of Mrs. J. E. Wyatt, two miles west of Corvallis. Announcements of this meeting have been mailed to over 250 families residing principally in the Pacific Northwest.

The members of this pioneer family meet each year at the home of some member, residing in Benton county. The program is rendered, a basket dinner served and an interesting business meeting held. Births, marriages and deaths during the year are recorded in the family record book. One hundred and sixteen members attended the 1917 reunion, coming from as far as Los Angeles.

The family is descended from Rev. Anthony Jacob Henkle, who came to America in 1717. He founded the first Lutheran churches in Germantown and Philadelphia.

Jacob Henkle Sr., descendant of the third generation, crossed the plains by ox team in 1853 with his six children and their families and settled in Benton county, near Philomath.

His family consisted of four sons and two daughters, Ichabod Henkle, Mrs. Christina Barker, William Henkle, Mrs. Mary King, Jacob Henkle Jr., and Andrew Jackson Henkle.

Andrew Jackson Henkle, honorary president of the Henkle association, is in his 90th year and resides with his family at Monksland, Or. He is the only member of the pioneer family now living.

Other members of the association are descendant from Abraham Henkle, a brother of Jacob Henkle Sr. A daughter, Mrs. Margaret Wood, and a son, Zebadiah Henkle, both now dead, with their families also settled in Benton county. The children of Miles Henkle, another son, later moved to the same locality.

The first reunion of the Henkle family was held October 31, 1907, at the home of Ichabod Henkle, on a donation claim near Philomath. The association has personal records of more than 700 direct descendants.
