Combination Sale of Feedstuffs Is Called Off by Government

Copy of telegram received by food administration this morning from Washington:
"Feeding stuffs section asks that general rule
No. 23 forbidding sales of foodstuffs be enforced in regard to all sales of wheat feeds in
combination with other feedstuffs, whether by
manufacture to wholesalers or jobbers, or by
the latter to retailers or by retailers to comb the latter to retailers, or by retailers to con-sumers. The rule shall not, however, be inter-preted to prevent a dealer or consumer from purchasing an assorted car of feed. Believe this by-products to seek their natural level or prices Rule No. 23, referred to, requires that com-Rule No. 23, referred to, requires that combinations of different foodstuffs must not be offered for sale at a special price, or that in order to buy certain foodstuffs at a special price the purchaser be required to buy at the same time a specified amount of some other foodstuffs.

The new rule, as set out in the above telegram, simply extends this old rule (covering foodstuffs) to cover feedstuffs. We are informed that wholesalers and others have been making a practice of offering combination jots to
