

PRELATE CHEERED BY VISIT TO U. S.

Archbishop of York Predicts Irre-sistible Impact When Amer-ica Is Ready.

London, June 28.—(L. N. S.)—"I only wish that some of our war-worn defenders of civilization in France and Flanders could see those multitudes of stalwart men eager to take their share of fighting 'over there,'" declared the Archbishop of York, describing the impressions of a visit to the United States, to the Church of England Men's society. The archbishop continued: "Americans realize that the British are dying for them and for a cause which they know is their cause. You may be quite sure that the people of the United States are responding full-heartedly and loyally to the call of their president. They are just as disappointed as any of their allies that some of their plans take longer to be fulfilled than they had hoped. But it is needless to waste words about that. They are determined to make haste and to make good."

Impact to Be Irresistible
"None, who has seen the resources of the United States, can doubt that, once they have concentrated upon the war, their impact will be irresistible. New York, Providence, Boston, New Haven, Cleveland, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Harrisburg, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore and Pittsburgh were all visited and each and every city gave a keen impression of the wealth, kindness and enthusiasm of America."

"Never has this country, even in the early days of the war, seen such crowded assemblies or felt the stir of enthusiasm that animates America. Harvard, Brown, Yale, the University of Pennsylvania and Columbia, have sent their best sons into the army. I addressed the students of those institutions and they were deeply stirred by the recital of what our universities have done."

Visit Most Heartening
"Nor can one forget the multitude of workmen at Hog Island, where the great multitude of American workmen in the shipyards are meeting the call of 'ships and more ships.' It is most heartening to visit the great army training stations. With all of this practical energy there is a widespread responsiveness to the ideal for which the allies stand and which was so notably put by President Wilson."

"America will bring us a strong union, with practical forces and a high ideal. I wish I could bring my fellow countrymen in these anxious days some sense of the exuberant I felt in America's atmosphere of enthusiasm and determination. If our message to the United States is 'Make haste,' we need you, America's message to us is, 'Hold on; we are coming.'"

The French and Belgian babies milk fund received \$15 more Thursday from a man who liked whiskey well enough to offer a price of \$15 a quart. A party of three were arrested at a hotel on a charge of violation of the prohibition law.

SUPPORT GIVEN W. S. S. DRIVE BY INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYEES PLEASING

115 Laundry Workers, Mostly Girls and Women, Pledge More Than \$5500.

The support given the War Savings drive by industrial plants delights campaign leaders. Mrs. L. Gee, who has done much in organizing War Savings societies in industries, received a report this morning that 115 employees of the U. S. Laundry, mostly women and girls, had subscribed more than \$5500. At the Northwest Steel company, 1043 employees had subscribed \$40,622. A. T. Bofney, manager of the booth sales as well as of industrial organization, reported that \$45,000 in cash represented the receipts for the week at Liberty temple, and that all booths had reported a total of \$161,289.50 cash for the week.

Not only have the Columbia River Shipbuilding corporation employees subscribed so far \$41,000, but 150 boiler-makers have subscribed an average of \$52.70 each, reported A. G. Johnson, plant Y. M. C. A. secretary. The Columbia River corporation has furnished three members for the Limit club—A. McGregory, Marlon E. Butler and Mary Butler. From the Supply-Ballin shipyard came the report that of 650 men, 260 had signed the W. S. S. pledge with subscriptions aggregating \$16,260.

The first precinct report received by City Manager Frank McGrillis came from Captain H. D. Kilham of precinct No. 152½. There were 65 investors and \$3361.25 in pledges. Employees of the Multnomah hotel became 100 per cent perfect for the W. S. S. today when announcement was made that every one had signed up with pledges aggregating \$5640. Stamps sold to guests and others by the hotel cashier Thursday netted \$1732.50.

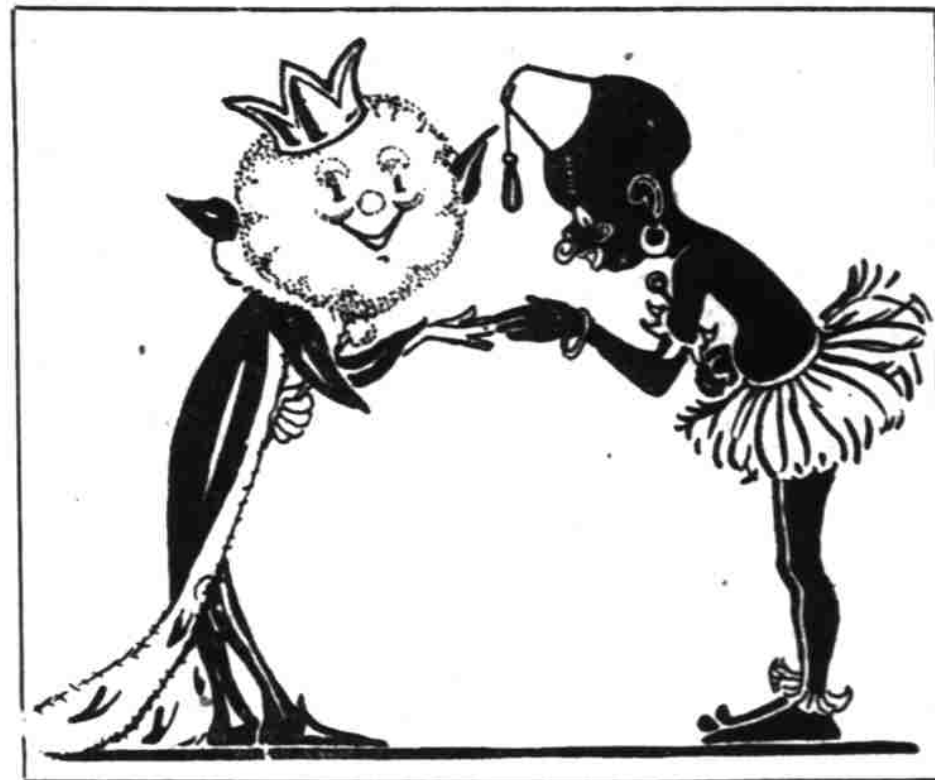
