One of New Draft Men, Hermogenes Carbonell, Sends in His Name From Philippine Islands.

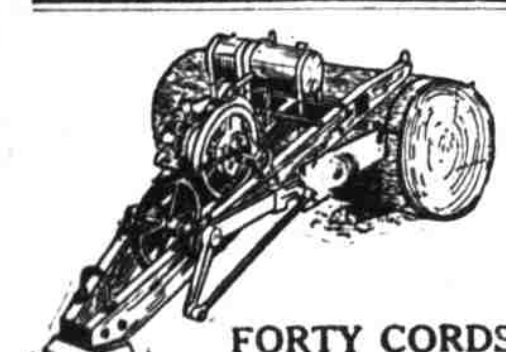
LIST ANNOUNCED BY BOARD

OREGON BOY GETS RAPID PROMOTION IN REGULAR ARMY

Captain Eldon P. King, Son of Judge Will R. King, Recently Advanced From 1st Lieutenant.

IN SERVICE LESS THAN YEAR

Don R. Cather, Associate of King's, Is Captain of Engineers in France.

Eldon P. King, an Oregon boy, was recently promoted from first lieutenant to captain in the regular army. He was 23 years of age when his captaincy became effective and had been in the service considerably less than a year. He is with the Sixty-second regiment, infantry.

Captain King's home is Ontario, Or. He was born in Baker, this state, and for several years lived at Salem when his father, Judge Will R. King, was a member of the supreme court. He is a graduate of Hill Military academy, this city. Shortly before this country declared a state of war existed with Germany, Mr. King successfully passed the examination open for civilians for commissions in the regular army, and was appointed second lieutenant. Upon completing a course in the officers' training school he was commissioned first lieutenant, and his record with his regiment earned him his present title.

A little over a year ago Captain King was associated with another Oregon young man, Don R. Cather of Portland, in a special government investigation in the West. Mr. Cather, who is an engineer, was also successful in entering the army before the outbreak of war and is now captain in the engineering corps of the regular army. Captain Cather has recently returned to this country from France on special assignment.

Sergeant Will Goodrum of Marshfield, Or., now with artillery in France, makes the following appeal for more letters from home for the boys at the front.

The following is an excerpt taken from a letter written to his brother, George Goodrum:

"George, I consider news to the boys over here from home and friends is as essential as food. It keeps them in good spirits, and where there is spirit there is health, action and everything. For instance, there was one case in our own battery. After the mail started to come in and out of us got from one to 15 letters. This one boy did not get a line. Well, this happened two or three times. Honestly the kid got sick. However, it was not the fault of the boys and friends. They had sent his mail to another address and when he did get it, he suddenly recovered. I am of the same opinion as our general, who made the following statement in one of his talks to us recently: 'They talk about guns and explosives, but if they lived in one of these God-forsaken little villages behind the front they'd realize that it's guns plus the letters from home that's the thing that's keeping them going.'"

Tacoma, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—George Hazzard, 74, who says he is an old soldier, was arrested here today. Hazzard is said to be wanted in Palo Alto, Cal., on charges of having worked a "pension swindling game."

Number of Standard Tires to Be Reduced

Washington, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Standardization of automobile tires and sizes will result in only 16 standard types and sizes on the market by November 1, 1920, the war industries board announced Friday.

Voluntary action on the part of tire manufacturers has been responsible for a reduction from 287 to 33. This number is to be gradually reduced to nine standard types and sizes, as follows: "Plain and non-skid, 16 1/2 inches; straight side, plain and non-skid, 31 by 4, 34 by 4, 34 by 4 1/2, and straight side, plain and non-skid, 31 by 4, 34 by 4 1/2, 35 by 4 1/2, 36 by 4, 38 by 4 and 40 by 8."

Spearman to Serve 4 Years; Fined \$1000

Baker, Or., June 29.—Charles Spearman, who was convicted last week of 180 counts for shooting and killing his father-in-law, William Roseberry, was sentenced Friday by Judge Gustav Anderson to the penitentiary for a term of not less than four years and not more than eight, and to pay a fine of \$1000.

Sebastian Blecher, who pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, was given a sentence of from one to three years.

DRAFT BOARDS FINISH SENDING OUT LAST OF NEW QUESTIONNAIRES

Registrants Are Advised to See Lawyers Who Will Help Them in Preparing Answers.

Yesterday saw the completion of the sending out of questionnaires by local draft boards, to the men of 21 years of age, who registered June 6. Beginning Tuesday, 25 per cent have been mailed out each day. The questionnaires must be returned within seven days of the time of mailing, Sundays excluded.

The questionnaires differ slightly from those sent out last fall, and registrants may obtain assistance in filling out the blanks from the legal advisory board members, who may be found at their offices or homes.

The experience of the boards last fall was that only a few men were able to fill out their questionnaires without some assistance, and the men are requested to go to the advisory board members for aid, rather than to the local draft boards, since they are busy with other matters.
